Dear Sir.

As you have expressed to me your deep interest in the Maine Fifth, I have thought it might not be amiss for me to communicate, once more, some facts as to its general condition.

You have been informed as of the great improvement of the Regt. prior to our leaving Camp Franklin.

Since then, we have been placed in new positions - in new encampments - on marches - & under fire -

Through the public papers, you have been informed of our landing at West Point, & from skirmish

~~will be firing.~~

On that occasion, the Maine Fifth was assigned to an important position - to the front - in the word - with none between them & the foe - but Co. K. & G., who were deployed as skirmishers. This position they occupied for several hours, & then retired, agreeably to orders, in unbroken line.

At one time, the Reg't. was exposed to peculiar peril, & would have been decimated had it not been for the coolness & sagacity of Col. Jackson - They were moving over the crest of a hill, & his prompt order was "Down" - & no more was it obeyed than a heavy volley, aimed at them, passed directly over their heads. Only four were wounded - one of whom, Stephen Morse of Portland, Co. G. died that night. I have already made known to you my opinion of Col. Jackson, as a disaffectionist & the consequent improvement of the Reg't. but it gives me pleasure to add

say testifying to his coolness, sagacity & bravery - He has the confidence of the whole Regt - officers & men - They want him to be their Leader - & are ready & willing to occupy any position of peril, if he is their commander - Gen. Stocum said to me, the evening of the battle, "The Maine Fifth had done nobly to day - Col. Jackson has crowned himself with honor."

I improve the occasion to express my opinion of Major Scammon - Faithful to every duty in Camp, a on Picket, he is bold & undaunted in the face of the foe - He is a thorough soldier, & a true man - & deserves well of his State & of his country - I wish every Regt from Maine had as good a Colonel as Major Scammon -

Our Adj'tant, Lieut. George Grafton was never placed under fire before - but has won golden opinions from his Regt, for his prompt & fearless

discharge of duty on the 1st inst.

Surgeon Mitchell was engaged
in his labor on that day - He with the
Surgeon of the 18th of N.Y. (belonging)
to our Brigade) dressed wounded on
the field - in the rear of the baggage-
ment - before they were sent to the
General Hospital, which was at the
encampment of the Fifth - Dr. Birch-
ett has been officious in his actions -
but as I know of no hospital ar-
rangements more complete than
his - Our Brigade Surgeon (Dr.
Bunn) & Dr. Hamilton the Medical
Director of the Division have an ex-
alted opinion of his Medical & Sur-
gical skill.

The Captain improves the occasion to
say that the Colonel does all in his pos-
sessment to sustain a Regimental service on
the Sabbath - & so it is with the other Field Offi-
cers, whom temporily in command.

Had more paper & a better writing place
than the end of my vestre, I might add
more in justice to officers & men.

But I am admonitor & hold myself bound
which I do, with the assurance of the respect &
affection of your friend & steward ever
