Between 20,000 and 40,000.

A Survey of the Field in the Em-

pire State.

With Some Cheerful Intelligence

New York, Nov. 4.—Republicans at State

headquarters were jubilant last night.

They had reason to be. The last poll of the

State had revealed surprising returns.

Whereas a month ago they would have been

satisfied with a bare majority for Harrison,

the news that reached them from all quar-

ters was of such a cheering character that

positive predictions were made by such as

leading politicians as ex-Senator Thomas C.

Platt and General John N. Knapp, chairman

of the State committee, that General Har-

rison would capture New York's electoral

vote from 20,000 to 40,000.

Harrison's victory was a foregone conclu-

sion. He has hereafter refused to express my

New York, Nov. 4.—Elaborate arrange-

ments have been made for collecting the

Presidential vote election night. In New

York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania the

returns will be collected by the Associated

Press alone. In all other States, the work

will be done by the Associated Press and

Western Union Telegraph Company acting

together. In all States except Ohio, the vote

will be compared with the Presidential vote

of 1884. In Ohio the comparison will be

made with the vote for Governor in 1887.

A complete re-districting of the State makes

it impossible to collect the vote by the

cable. Returns of New York city will be

collected by O'Rourke's City Press Associa-

tion, which will have a special building for

general buildings, as many polling stations

have been sub-divided since 1884, but con-

siderable doubt exists as to whether the
