Interesting to Wives.

As a general rule it is most economical As a general rule it is most economical to buy the best articles. The price is, of course, a little higher, but good articles always spend best. It is a sacrifice of money to buy poor flour, sugar, molasses, cheese, lard, &c., to say nothing of the injurious effect upon the health.

Of West India sugar and molasses, the Santa Cruz and Porto Rice, are consider.

Santa Cruz and Porto Rico are considered the lest. The Havana is seldom clean. White sugar from Brazil is very good .-Refined sugars usually contain the most saccharine substance; therefore there is probably more economy in using crushed loaf, and granulated sugars, then we should at first suppose.

Butter that is made in September and October is the best for winter use. Lard should be hard and white; and that which is taken from a hog over a

year old is the best. Rich cheese feels soft under the pressure of the finger. That which is very strong is neither good nor healthy. To keep one that is cut, tie it up in a bag that will not admit flies, and hang it in a cool, dry place. If mold appears on it,

wipe it off with a dry cloth. The best rice is large, and has a clear, fresh look. Old rice sometimes has little black insects inside the kernel.

The small white sago, called pearl sago is the best. The large brown kind has an earthy taste. These articles, and ground rice, tapioca, &c., should be kept covered. The cracked cocoa is the best, that which is put up in pound papers is very often good.

Shells are apt to be musty. Try a quarter of a pound before buying a quan-


