Buildings Burned on Stevens Farm.

NO ONE THERE, AND THERE WAS LITTLE CHANCE TO SAVE ANYTHING.

The buildings on what is known as the George W. Stevens farm, near the Stony Brook road about two miles from South Paris, were destroyed by fire Friday afternoon. The place, which was the property of the late Thomas N. Stowell, was purchased only a short time ago by Nelson P. Cummings and Henry L. Cummings and family were occupying a portion of the house.

On Friday afternoon there was no one in the buildings. Mr. Cummings was away at work, and Mrs. Cummings and the children, soon after dinner, had gone to B. Y. Russell's to call. It was between 2 and 3 o'clock when the fire was discovered, apparently in the oil shed, according to those who first saw it.

There are no neighbors very near, and only a few within a half mile, and the buildings, though they did not burn very rapidly, were pretty well on fire before any one reached the place. By breaking out windows a small quantity of household goods were saved from two rooms, but most of the contents were burned.

The destruction of the buildings was complete, hardly an ember being left. There was no stock at the place, and no farming tools. In the bank was some hay belonging to Almon Churchill, he having bought the standing grass this year and stored the hay.

Although the Stevens farm is one of the "old places" of the town, the buildings were burned were built with a generation to replace the old ones, and the Stevens family have been there since 1920.
