

Camp 4th Maine Regt.

March 25th 1864

Mr Perkins. Sir. I am thinking
of trying to get a commission
in one of the new regiments,
and as you are the most in-
fluential Union man in our
town, I have taken the liberty
to address you.

There is very poor pr-
ospect of our company being xxxx
stated filled at present, and it
will be impossible for me to get
mustered on my present commis-
sion, until the company numbers
eighty.

A portion of our Regt will be
mustered out of the service on
the 15th of June next, which
will leave us but a handful of
men, we shall be too weak then
to hold our organization, and

shall be broken up, and distributed among other regiments, which will reduce one to a private again, and I shall find myself among strangers.

In view of these things our officers advise us to apply for commissions in some of the new regiments. I should like to have you send a request, with six or eight influential names, to our representative to use his influence with the Governor. You can state the case to him. How I have been holding a commission some six months, with no prospect now of being mustered.

I should like a 1st Lieutenant's commission in the 31st or 32^d.
