

I William Flanagan of Bangor in the County
of Penobscot and State of Maine hereby on oath
certify and say that on or about the 17th day of
June AD 1861 I started under contract with Gen
Berry then Colonel of the 4th Maine Regiment
to take charge of the baggage train of that
Regiment when that regiment first left Maine
for the field - I took charge of a part of the
train at Bangor & the whole at Rockland
I was with said Regiment in the above-named
capacity in its march from Maine to Merdean
Hill near Washington and so continued do-
ing duty as aforesaid with said Regiment &
under the aforesaid contract with Gen Berry
& under his direction as Col aforesaid until about
the 9th day of October AD 1861.

I have never received any pay for the ser-
vices so rendered from any source whatever
in whole nor in part -

The circumstances under which I returned
home & left the service which I was rendering
under the contract aforesaid are as follows to wit

~~On~~ before noon the said 9th day of October aforesaid
I was notified by Gen Berry then Colonel as aforesaid
that he had been instructed by some officer
whose name & rank I now do not remember but
whom I understood at the time had authority - that
men not regularly enlisted would not be further
employed by the U.S. Government or that there would
not be further need of men who in the pressing need at
the time, of the Government, had been hired, and were
not in the regular service of the U.S. - Gen Berry
then said he might find other employment for
me & gave me a regular voucher approved by
Gen Howard upon which to obtain my pay -
and directed me to present it to a certain officer
in the Quarter-Masters department at Washington
who sent me to another officer to receive my pay
This second officer sent me to still a third officer
who it seemed was obliged to make some further
inquiry and being out of employ & short of funds
I returned to General Berry who assured me he
would see the officers aforesaid at Washington and
secure ^{have} forwarded to me my pay - I then left for
home and soon afterwards I am informed & believe
the duties of Gen Berry were of such pressing nature

that he had no time or forgot to secure my pay
as aforesaid -

I therefore never having received any pay
for my services rendered as aforesaid & on account of
my distance from the rest of the U.S. Government
& the greater facilities which my State have for collecting
such claims of said U.S. Government - & the contract
under which the service was rendered being
made ~~was~~ directly with the State of Maine & for its
honor in getting one of its finest Regiments into the
field - I respectfully submit that my claim should
be adjusted at first by said State of Maine -

I, W^m Flanagan of Bangor in the County of Penobscot and State of Maine hereby on oath certify and say that I was employed in 1861 by Gen Berry then Col of the 4th Maine Reg of Vol's to take charge of the Burroage train of that Regiment at fifty dollars per month - That I went with a part of the train from Bangor & the whole from Rockland and was with said Regiment doing duty as Train Master from the 17th day of June AD 1861 to the 2nd day of October AD 1861 and my wages amounted to the sum of one hundred and seventy five dollars - I was then discharged and I received from Gen Berry a certificate or bill in regular form signed by Gen Berry & approved by G. A. C. Howard then Brigadier Gen'l of our Brigade - said Bill or certificate was certified to by Isaac Abbott of Rockland Quartermaster of said 4th Regt Maine Vol's - and directed to Capt Adams Chief of Quartermaster Department in Washington - said Bill or certificate was approved by Col F H Nelson of my Reg't and — Quartermaster of Brigade I delivered said Bill or certificate some time last Spring to A. H. Briggs Esq of Bangor with instructions to take the best measures to secure my pay which I had never received from any source whatever through the agency of the State of Maine — said

Briggs delivered said Bill or certificate or bill
to Augustus C Smith Esq^r late of Bangor de-
ceased who knew was an attorney almost exclusively
engaged in prosecuting & securing claims before the
Governor & Council & U.S. Pay Agents at Augusta.

I had frequent conversations with said Smith
about said claim & bill or certificate and know that
he had it & was expecting to present it to the Govr
& Council for allowance —

Mr Smith was taken sick & suddenly died
some time in the summer of 1864 and his papers
and all places, ^{where such a paper would be likely to be left} both at Bangor and Augusta
have been thoroughly searched and said bill or
certificate cannot be found — And I hereby certify
that the foregoing is the substance of said Bill or
certificate — It was about the size of 1/2 sheet
of paper such as this affidavit is made on and was
a printed blank filled up —

& I believe Gen Howards approval was endorsed on the back
of the same — I have searched and caused to be searched
all papers & places of which the late A.C. Smith had control

find it - I know Mr Wm Flanagan & have known
him for twelve years as a respectable man of good char-
