Maine's Labor Market Undergoes Change in the 1990s

During the economic boom of the 1980s, employment in Maine expanded in all occupational groups, creating job opportunities for people across the spectrum of education and skill levels. Widespread occupational job growth resulted from most industries posting job gains. Several high-paying manufacturing industries increased employment despite overall manufacturing job losses.

Since 1989 net job growth has been limited to professional and technical, and service occupations. Employment in managerial, sales, and clerical jobs has declined slightly, and the number of blue-collar production, construction, operating, maintenance, and material moving jobs has plummeted. This new dynamic is mainly due to reduced defense-related shipbuilding and submarine repair following the end of the cold war; the construction downturn; and continued restructuring in several industries, including paper manufacturing and wholesale and retail trade. This labor market trend presents a new reality for workers displaced from good-paying construction, manufacturing, or wholesale trade industries. Skills developed through years of experience in carpentry, plumbing, welding, or machine operating often are not directly transferrable to growing industries such as health or business services. Furthermore, many of these workers lack the education or background for entry into high-paying professional or technical occupations. As a result, employment alternatives for many individuals are limited to service occupations which have relatively low skill requirements and low pay, and often offer only part-time work schedules.

The table below presents occupations with the largest job losses and the largest job gains between 1989 and 1994, with the employment change in the 1983 to 1989 cycle:







UI Initial Claims


UI Intrastate Weeks Claimed








Unemployment Insurance Benefit Payments in Millions (Total includes Maine's Portion of Extended Benefits)
