The average annual pay of all workers covered by State and Federal Unemployment Insurance (UI) programs was \$26,939 in 1994, a 2.2 percent increase over the 1993 national average, according to preliminary data released today by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor. The annual pay of private

industry workers, who comprise 83.6 percent of the nation's employment, rose 2.2 percent in 1994, while pay for government workers rose 2.5 percent. In 1993, the increase in pay for government workers (3.1 percent) had outpaced that of private sector employees (1.5 percent)

Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, the District of Columbia led the nation with an average annual pay level of \$40,919 in 1994. The District of Columbia has reported the highest average pay level since 1987. Connecticut had the percent

District of Columbia has reported the highest average pay level since 1987. Connecticut had the highest pay level among the states in 1994 (\$33,811), followed by New Jersey (\$33,439), New York (\$33,438), and Alaska (\$32,657). The 1994 pay levels of these five highest ranking jurisdictions ranged from 21 to 52 percent more than the U.S. average of \$26,939.

South Dakota's average annual pay was the lowest

South Dakota's average annual pay was the lowest among the states during 1994-\$19,255, followed by North Dakota (\$19,893), Montana (\$20,219), Mississippi (\$20,382), and Arkansas (\$20,898). These states have posted the five lowest annual

average pay figures every year since 1988. The 1994 average annual pay levels of the bottom five ranked states were 22 to 29 percent less than the U.S. average of \$26,939.

Michigan experienced the largest percentage increase in pay from 1993 to 1994 (4.5 percent), followed by the District of Columbia (4.4 percent)

and Alabama (3.6 percent). Idaho, Iowa, Mississippi, and South Dakota tied for the next highest increase (3.5 percent). A total of 15 states and the District of Columbia had increase of 3.0 percent of higher. This was in contrast to 1993, when just three states and the District of Colum-

bia had such increases, and the highest was 3.3 percent.


For the seventh straight year, no state reported a decline in average annual pay. Nevada's 0.9 percent increase in average annual pay was the smallest for 1994. Alaska had the next smallest increase (1.0 percent), followed by Vermont (1.1 percent) and Oklahoma (1.3 percent). California, Montana, and Wyoming each had the next smallest increase, 1.4 percent.




Selected Employment Security Activities


Nonfarm Placements
