

Portland Me.

Dec 8th 1863

I enlisted in the service of the 2d & the 31st of April 1861 and on the 10th of October 1861 I was promoted to 1st Luit ⁱⁿ "G" 5th Me Vol. we layed in camp near Alexandria Va until the spring of 1862 when we began a very tedious campaign under McDowell and then was sent to McDeavitt at York Town and at the evacuation of that place we were sent up the York river and landed at West Point Va. and on the twentieth ^{out} of May we had a severe engagement I had charge of the skirmish line and was complimented by Brig^d Genl Storck, up to the 27th of June we were constantly up upon the march or on picket or working on the banks on the 27 we fought at Gains Mill we lost very severely Col J wounded Lt Col Heath killed and the Regt fell back ~~with~~ about $\frac{1}{4}$ of mile except my company. I held my advanced position until night and then file back, and was very highly complimented by Genl Bartlett, for bringing my men in intact order.

Now began the change of base to Harrison's Landing, continually marching and fighting during the time that the battle was raging at Malvern Hill I was sent into the woods ^{with my co} as skirmisher to protect the flank of the army I remained there until the whole army had passed and arrived at H.L. 3 hours behind the whole army, since then we have fought at Crampton Gap Md, Antietam Md, Fredericksburg 3 times, at Gettsburg and at Williamsport Md.

The records of our Regt show 18 Battles and skirmishes where some part of our Brigade has suffered

I have had the honor of being called upon
by Briga and Wright my Genl Glacum, Brigd
of Genl Jackson Brigd and Battall to drill
my company, and it is known to be the best
in the Corps as far as skirmishing.
