To Massachusetts Fruit Growers.

At the recent meeting of the Massachusetts fruit growers, Mr. Geo. A. Coadman of Boston, the widely known expert and reporter on foreign markets, gave a paper on the fruit markets in which, in his characteristic brusque manner, he told the fruit growers many truths they will do well to heed. From the paper as given in the Ploughman we call the following paragraphs:

THE MARKET.

The outlet for a part of our apple crop in Europe is increasing every year, as there they are growing less yearly and cannot produce many of the varieties that can be successfully cultivated this side of the Atlantic. As a matter of course, there are occasional seasons, like that of last year, when they have fairly good crops in Europe, but their fruit, and whatever they yield, is inferior varieties and prices being low, makes it unprofitable for shippers of American or Canadian apples during such periods. As a result, the market is flooded with inferior varieties, and the price of our own fruit is depressed.

THE SEASON.

Drawing to a close has been a very unsatisfactory one to all concerned. Speculators have made little or no money, notwithstanding the fact that the early part of the season. In fact, there has been a great deal of money lost. The apple industry in New England, and in fact, the whole country, is in a state of depression. The market is flooded with inferior varieties, and the price of our own fruit is depressed.

TOO MANY POOR APPLES.

Perhaps another statement I make will astonish you still more, and that is that the amount of apples produced in late years throughout the whole country is greatly over our home requirements as well as any foreign demand on anything like the standard of quality of New England growers. The period has passed when anything in the shape of an apple can be picked, and the market is flooded with inferior varieties, and the price of our own fruit is depressed.

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Sawdust in Manure Injured Land.
