Dear Sir,

While I was Chaplain of the Maine 5th I received a Commission from the Gov. & Council, to act as Commissioner for Maine troops & their aid soldiers in the field, in legal matters, which required judicial sanction, in signing deeds-making affidavits &c &c

Having served three years with the Maine 5th & being numbered out with that Rgt. at the expiration of term of service, I was elected & commissioned by Gov. Seymour, as Chaplain of the 121st N. Y. Rgt. This Rgt. belonged to the 2^d Brigade, the same to which the Maine 5th was attached. I am, as it were, in my old home, in the midst of familiar faces & with officers & men with whom I often officiated, when with the Maine 5th.

My home is still at Gorham, Maine, & my family is now residing there. My franchise is

Here, & I am bound as a resident of Maine . . .

My object in writing is to learn whether my
commission, was quasi Justice of the Peace, by
the Special Act, holds good, in my new position?

There was no limitation expressed in the commission
itself - & some of the old Fifth are still in the field,
now assigned to the 1st Maine Veterans.

I do not make the enquiry, as though it were any
favor to myself, but for the interest of others from Maine
now in the field.

By confirming with His Excellency, Gen. Long - you
will learn his opinion, & if my commission holds
good, I shall be ready to do all in my ^{power to} aid the
Maine Soldiers - now, as before, without fee or reward.
