Eligible Labor Surplus Areas for Bidding on Federal Contracts

The U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, recently released a list of labor surplus areas. The list, which became effective October 1, 2005, and remains in effect through September 30, 2006, contains the Maine counties of Piscataquis, Somerset, and Washington.

An area is classified as a labor surplus area when its average unemployment rate was at least 20 percent above the average unemployment rate for all states (including the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico) during the previous two calendar years.

The national average unemployment rate during the period of January 2003 through December 2004 was 5.8 percent, making the qualifying rate for labor surplus area classification 7.0 percent (5.8 percent times 1.2).

Employers which are located in labor surplus areas can be given preference in bidding on federal procurement contracts. The purpose in providing such preference is to help direct government procurement dollars into areas where people are in the most severe economic need, i.e., areas with the highest rates of unemployment.

In addition to the basic labor surplus area classification criteria, the U.S. Department of Labor may also classi-

fy as surplus areas jurisdictions in which unemployment increases significantly due to "exceptional circumstances." Such circumstances result from major plant closings or cutbacks, contract cancellations, or such catastrophic events as fires, floods, and other major disasters.

In order for an area in Maine to be classified as an exception, a petition must be submitted by the Maine Department of Labor indicating that the area has had an increase in unemployment which was not temporary or seasonal and which was not adequately reflected in the previous two-year reference period used in preparation of the annual listing.

People are classified as unemployed, regardless of their eligibility for unemployment benefits or public assistance, if they meet all of the following criteria: 1) they were not employed during the survey week; 2) they were available for work at that time; and 3) they made specific efforts to find employment some time during the prior four weeks. Persons laid off from their former jobs and awaiting recall and those expecting to report to a job within 30 days need not be looking for work to be counted as unemployed.

⁴ The unemployment rate is calculated by dividing the total number of unemployed by the total civilian labor force and is expressed as a percent.

Area Analyst's Corner

Central Maine Ken Bridges (207) 624-5199

Ocean State Job Lots, a discount retailer with 80 stores in New England, is opening its first Maine store in the former Ames building in Belfast. The University of New England is interested in building a College of Pharmacy in Camden. The college would invest nearly \$30 million in a new campus if \$10 million in local funding could be raised. Inland Hospital has canceled its plan to build a new \$120 million hospital in Waterville, while MaineGeneral Medical Center proceeds with plans for a \$100 million expansion at its Thayer unit. Freedom residents are debating a proposal by Competitive Energy Systems to build several electricity producing wind turbans.

Western Maine Gerard Dennison (207) 753-9045

Target built a new 124,000 square-foot retail store across from the Topsham Fair Mall. The store opened on March 1, 2006 and employs over 100.◆In Bridgton, Hannaford Brothers opened its new 36,000 square-foot supermarket on Route 302 with 100 jobs in early March.
◆Nichols Trailers of Wilton was awarded a \$13 million two-year contract from the Department of Defense to produce more than 1,000 trailers to be shipped to Iraq. The trailers are made to be towed behind a pickup truck. The contract will mean 10-12 new jobs for welders, laborers, and fabricators.

North/East Maine Craig Holland (207) 941-3076

Georgia-Pacific announced that it will cease pulp and tissue making operations at its mill in Old Town. The company indicated that over the next several weeks employees will wind down operations at the mill. GP said that the more than 400 people working at the mill will receive two months of full pay and benefits. Interested buyers are currently touring the mill for potential purchase. Plans by Dover-Foxcroft-based Pleasant River Lumber Co. to open a \$17 million spruce mill operation employing 70 people full time in Enfield will be delayed a year. Company officials indicated they need

Colgate-Palmolive purchased 84 percent of **Tom's of Maine**, the natural healthcare products company, for \$100 million. No layoffs or job cuts are anticipated in the near future. Tom's employs 170 people in its Kennebunk offices and Sanford production facilities. Starting in May of this year, **JetBlue Airways Corporation** will be operating in Portland. JetBlue will fill the need created by the leaving of Independence Air. The number of jobs to be created is not yet available. **DM Technologies** of Sanford has received a \$400,000 Department of Economic and Community Development business assistance grant. Presently employing three people, the company plans to hire 28 new employees.

Maine Unemployment Rate 4.6 Percent in February

State Labor Commissioner Laura Fortman announced that the preliminary seasonally-adjusted February unemployment rate for Maine was 4.6 percent. This compares to a January rate of 4.5 percent and a rate of 4.8 percent for February 2005. The national unemployment rate for February was 4.8 percent.

The slight increase in the seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate between January and February resulted from an increase in the number of active labor force participants, with both employment and unemployment increasing. The number of employed Maine residents increased by 1,700, while the number of unemployed Maine residents rose by 500.

Between February 2005 and February 2006, the unemployment rate edged downward from 4.8 percent to 4.6 percent. The number of Maine residents employed rose by 12,900, while the number unemployed fell by 1,100.

The number of seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs in Maine was 611,400 for February, compared to 611,300 for January and 611,200 for February 2005. Between February 2005 and February 2006, job gains were registered in professional and business services, local government, health care and social assistance, construction, and other services. Offsetting the job gains, losses were recorded in manufacturing, financial activities, and leisure and hospitality services.

"While the number of nonfarm wage and salary jobs in Maine was nearly unchanged over the past year, the number of Maine residents employed continued to grow," said Commissioner

Fortman. "In addition to nonfarm wage and salary jobs in Maine, resident employment includes the self employed, agricultural wage and salary workers, domestics, and Maine residents working for out-of-state firms."

Other New England states reporting their seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for February include Vermont, 3.5 percent; New Hampshire, 3.5 percent; Connecticut, 4.5 percent; Massachusetts, 5.0 percent; and Rhode Island, 5.1 percent. The adjusted national rate for February was 4.8 percent, up from 4.7 percent for January and down from 5.4 percent for February 2005.

The not-seasonally-adjusted Maine unemployment rate for February was 5.6 percent, up from 5.3 percent for January and down from 5.8 percent for February 2005. The unadjusted national rate was 5.1 percent for February, unchanged from January and down from 5.8 percent for February 2005. Not-seasonally-adjusted February unemployment rates for Maine counties ranged from 3.9 percent in Cumberland County to 9.9 percent in Washington County.

Not-seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs in Maine rose by 2,300 between January and February to 591,700. State and local government and private educational services jobs increased as nonprofessional school staff and college workstudy students returned to work after the holiday break. These gains were partially offset by seasonal losses in retail trade and construction.










Unemployment Rates, Seasonally Adjusted



Unemployment Rates for Maine



Total personal income is the income received by all persons from all sources, that is, from participation in production, from government and business transfer payments, and from government interest. Personal income is the sum of net earnings by place of residence, rental income of persons, personal dividend income, personal interest income, and transfer payments. Net earnings by place of residence is earnings by place of work—the sum of wage and salary disbursements (payrolls), other labor income, and proprietors' income—less personal contributions for social insurance, plus an adjustment for residence. Personal income is measured before the deduction of personal income taxes and other personal taxes.

Per capita personal income is personal income divided by the resident population as of July 1.
