**FRUIT BRAN COOKIES.**  
My family did not care for plain bran cookies. The formula for these cookies calls for one-half cup of butter, creamed with one cup of brown sugar, two tablespoons of cream, (or milk), two well beaten eggs, and two and one-half cups of bran. The mixture is then baked in a shallow pan.

**STRAWBERRY CASSEROLE.**  
One pound of round steak (or more, if family is large) cut up into pieces for serving, salted, peppered and rolled in flour. Lay the pieces in a earthen baking dish and cover with a thick layer of vegetable oil. Put this in the oven and bake for two hours. The meat will be cooked so tender that it can be pulled apart by the fork. The oil will make a gravy, so that when the meat is done the gravy is ready to serve also. The baking dish must be tightly covered.

**KILLERLYN CAKE.**  
Cream half a cup of butter with one cup of fine granulated sugar. Add one cup of milk and two and one-half cups of pastry flour that has been sifted with four teaspoons of all purpose flour. Add one teaspoon of vanilla and three drops of almond. Beat thoroughly and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs. Bake half an hour in a moderate oven. When the cake is cold, cover it with white icing. When this is done, make more frosting, flavor it with vanilla and color it with red and blue vegetable coloring. Put this on the cake, forming shamrocks. On the top arrange chocolate pistachio nuts and a tiny sprig of holly and a red and white striped ribbon. The cake is then ready to be served.

**SCALLOPED TOMATOES AND ONIONS.**  
Peel half a dozen small onions, slice them thin and saute in butter or oil without browned onions. Peel and slice some ripe tomatoes, pour an earthenware dish with buttered bread crumbs, then add a layer of onions; continue in this order, having the last layer crumbs, and bake forty-five minutes in a moderate oven. Color the top with red and white tomatoes may be used for this dish.

**TAPIOCA PUDDING.**  
One-half cup of pearl tapioca, one cup of granulated sugar and two quarts of milk will do, add sugar to taste. Boil the tapioca in water for one hour, then add the sugar and milk, and cook for two hours. The pudding is then ready to be served.
