If to these we add the votes of the Southera Republican States, viz :

we have now a total of 149 votes, while the required number is 159. It is certain therefore, that the election of Grant and Colfax requires the Republican party to carry one or several of the doubtful States Upon the heavy electoral vote of New York (33). Pennsylvania (26), and Ohio (21) de pends the result of the contest. The Re-publican party must win if it carries either. The Democratic party may win if it carries them all.

The Republicans cannot carry either New York. Pennsylvania or Ohio, without thorough organization and systematic work in every county and school district, and es pecially in every ward and precinct of our large cities. The great names of Grant and Collex are not sufficient. The person al interests of Republican politiciaus and office-seekers working for flieir own elec tions are not sufficient. Public meeting and speeches, and a few torch-light pro-cessions and weekly meetings of clubs are not sufficient.

It would indeed be a glorious adjunct and powerful aid in such a campaign if the Grand Army of the Republic, the Boys in Blue, and where these organizations are not formed, the veteran soldiers of the war. acting on their own motion, should in a solid body turn out at. stated intervals du ring the five menths which will intervene before the election, and evince their deter mination, by the electron of their most honored and successful Chief to the highest of-fice in the gift of the people, to consum mate the peace for which they fought un-der the leader through whom they conquer ed. As the Democratic party will probab ly place in nomination a politician whose merit is that he never voted a man or a dollar to carry on the wa .always denoun ced it in terms which if true would have been degrading to all engaged in it. The veterans of the war could in no better or wiser manner make their influence felt than by uniting in public and universal public demonstrations, processions, and meetings in favor of their Chief. They began this policy at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Couvention at Chicago, and we hope they will per-fect their organization, so as to have conventions and processions of soldiers and sailors in every town and haulet in the

Let there be a thorough and early organzation of Clubs. appointment of commit-tees. and canvassing and registration of voters in every town and ward. We should not delay until Fall. The Summer months must be actively improved. Many doubtful voters may be lost by being neglected till late in the campaign, or won hy being waited upon and brought within the pale of healthy influences. Individual influ ences will go further with the coubtful men than public meetings.
