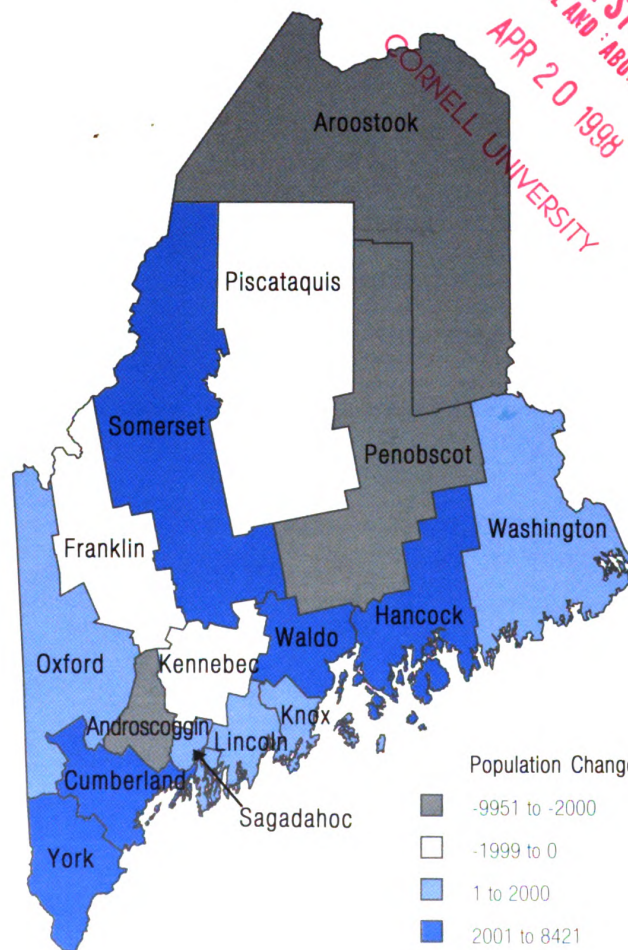
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Change in Population of Maine Counties July 1990 to July 1997



Maine's population increased by 10,799 between July 1990 and July 1997. Ten of Maine's sixteen counties recorded gains ranging from 560 in Washington County to 8,421 in York County. Losses ranged from 108 in Franklin County to 9,951 in Aroostook County.

The demographic components of population change consist of natural change and net migration. Natural change is defined as births minus deaths. Net migration is the difference between all forms of migration into and out of an area. In five of the six counties recording population losses, the net outmigration of population between 1990 and 1997 outweighed the natural increase. Piscataquis County had a slight natural decline and net outmigration.

¹ Civilian labor force, employed, and unemployed estimates are by place of residence. Current month estimates are preliminary; prior month and year-ago estimates are revised. Items may not add due to rounding. All data exclude members of the Armed Forces. MSA stands for Metropolitan Statistical Area.

² Total employment includes nonfarm wage and salary workers, agricultural workers, unpaid family workers, domestics, the self employed, and workers involved in labor disputes.

³ People are classified as unemployed, regardless of their eligibility for unemployment benefits or public assistance, if they meet all of the following: they were not employed during the survey week; they were available for work at that time; and they made specific efforts to find employment some time during the prior four weeks. Persons laid off from their former jobs and awaiting recall and those expecting to report to a job within 30 days need not be looking for work to be counted as unemployed.

⁴ The unemployment rate is calculated by dividing the total number of unemployed by the total civilian labor force, and is expressed as a percent.

⁵ Kittery-York is the five-town Maine portion of the Portsmouth-Rochester PMSA which includes towns in both Maine and New Hampshire.

Area Analyst's Corner

Central Area

Responding to requests from industry leaders, the University of Maine at Augusta plans to offer associate and baccalaureate degrees in financial services. Majors in banking, insurance, and investments will be offered. The University and industry leaders believe the program will help the state attract new businesses. The National Marine Fisheries Service announced that the 1997 Maine lobster harvest was 46.3 million pounds, smashing the previous record of 38.9 million pounds. However, based on the large catch, lobster fishermen fear that current plans to reduce the number of traps allowed per fisherman from 1,200 to 800 may be lowered even more.

Western Area

Bath Iron Works (BIW) was awarded a \$2.1 billion contract from the U.S. Navy to build six Aegis class destroyers. The multi-year contract which is the largest in BIW history, calls for two vessels to be built in 1998, one each in 1999 and 2000, and two in 2001. This contract to build six of the Navy's premier destroyers will help maintain current employment levels at BIW.

North/East Area

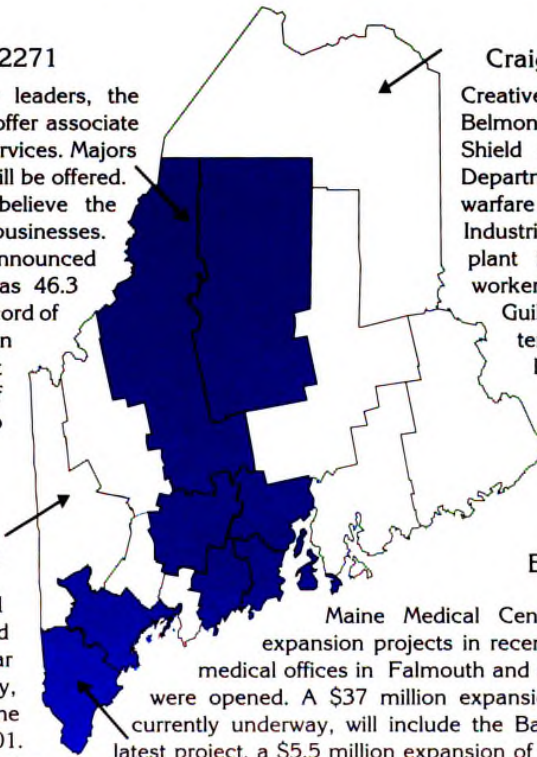

Creative Apparel Associates based in Belmont, Maine, in conjunction with Tex-Shield of Germany, has won a Defense Department contract to make chemical warfare suits in Eastport at the vacant Guilford Industries facility. When fully operational, the plant is expected to employ 100 local workers replacing the jobs lost when the Guilford closed last year. MBNA will temporarily occupy the former Brooks Drug Store in Presque Isle, while their new building, just off Route 1 south of the city, is constructed.

Southern Area

Maine Medical Center has undertaken a number of expansion projects in recent years. During 1996 and 1997 new medical offices in Falmouth and an ambulatory center in Scarborough were opened. A \$37 million expansion to the main hospital building, is currently underway, will include the Barbara Bush Children's Hospital. The latest project, a \$5.5 million expansion of the Family Practice Center located in Portland's East End, will begin in May. Future plans include a 400-car parking garage on Congress Street.

Unemployment Falls in February

State Labor Commissioner Valerie Landry announced that Maine's seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.5 percent in February from 5.0 percent in January.

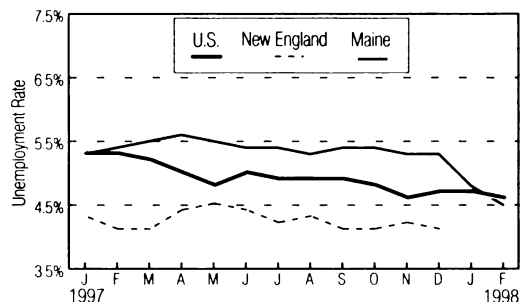
"The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate declined as nonfarm wage and salary jobs rose by almost 3,000 between January and February," said Commissioner Landry. "The unemployment rate also declined over the past year, from 5.4 percent in February 1997 to the current rate of 4.5 percent."

Over the past year seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary employment increased by 14,000. All of the major industries recorded gains, with the most significant increases registered by services and retail trade.

Other New England states which have reported their seasonally-adjusted February unemployment rates include New Hampshire, 2.8 percent; Massachusetts, 3.3 percent; Vermont, 3.5 percent; and Rhode Island, 4.8 percent. The adjusted national rate for February was 4.6 percent.

Maine's not-seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate was 5.9 percent in February, down from 6.3 percent in

January and 6.8 percent in February 1997. The unadjusted national rate was 5.0 percent in February, down from 5.2 percent in January and 5.7 percent in February 1997. Not-seasonally-adjusted unemployment rates for Maine counties ranged from 3.2 percent in Cumberland County to 13.7 percent in Washington County.

Not-seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs rose by 4,300 from January to February, with most of the gains in state and local government due to the return to work of nonprofessional school staff and college work-study students after the holiday break. Educational services rose seasonally by 1,600 as

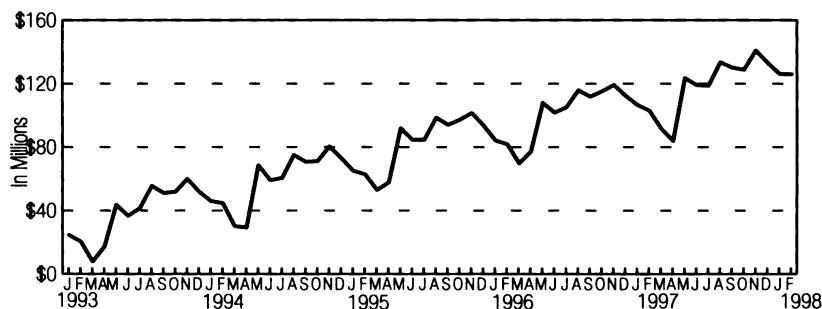

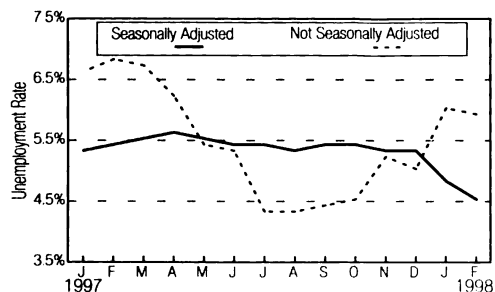
Monthly Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund Balance



private colleges geared up after the holiday. Retail trade fell seasonally by 3,300.

Over the year, not-seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs rose by 14,100. Services rose by 6,500, largely in business services, social services, and health services. Retail trade increased by 2,400; finance, insurance, and real estate rose by 1,800; and manufacturing increased by 1,200.

Unemployment Rates for Maine

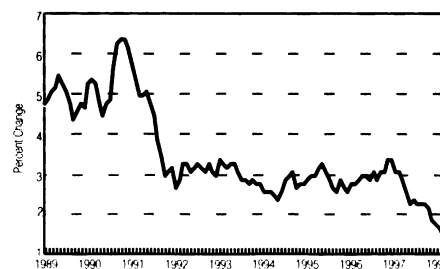


U.S. Consumer Price Index for all urban consumers (CPI-U)

Domestic workers in private households, proprietors, the self-employed, and unpaid family workers are excluded. Estimates measure the number of jobs by industry. Current month's estimates are preliminary; prior month and year-ago estimates are revised. These estimates are benchmarked to March 1995. As a measure of reliability, the March 1995 benchmark revision for total nonfarm wage and salary employment was .04 percent lower than the original sample-based estimate.

² Regular teachers are included in summer months whether or not specifically paid in those months.

* Where an employment estimate is not entered, either the data is not available in sufficient detail for publication or is nondisclosable by law.

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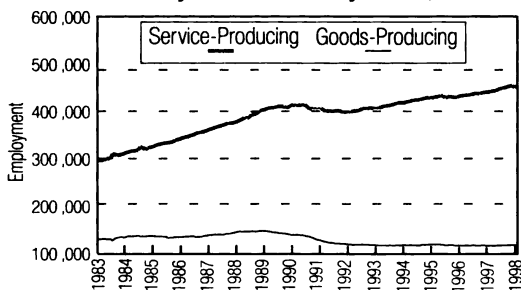

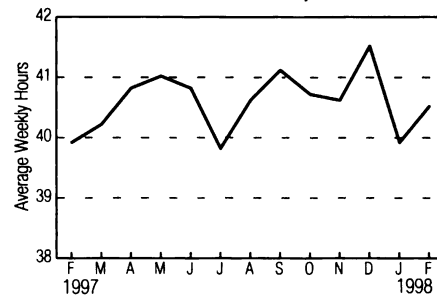

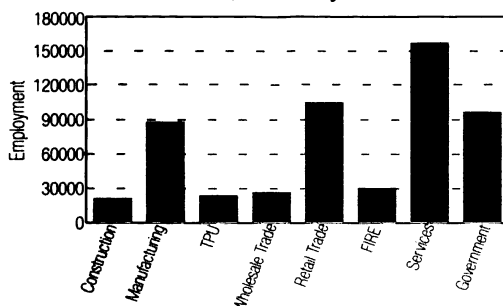
Nonfarm Employment by Sector
January 1983-February 1998, Maine¹



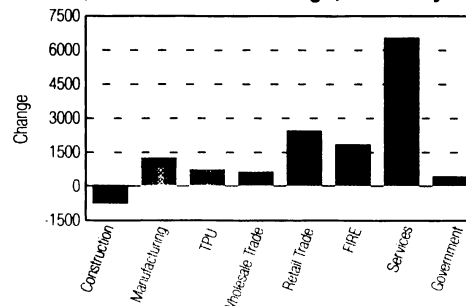
Hours Worked by Manufacturing
