



THE CROPS OF THE COUNTRY -The Department of Agriculture has issued a re-port on the condition of the crops in July, and we select the following paragraphs concerning cereals and fruit. Corn - The most remarkable fact in con-

nection with the corn crops of the present year is the great increase of its average in the South, the difference in the unmber of acres between the present and the proceed ing year being more than two millions and a half. A slight decrease is approximation the Eastern seaboard States, resulting from the unpropitious character of the re-cent cold and backward Spring, which sad-ly interfeted with the planting. A careful ly interfered with the planting. A careful estimate of the average shows a decrease of 49,609 acres in Maine, Newhampshire, sured." The drought in the South has retarded omewhat the growth of corn. but its condition in that secton is generally good. In the West the average is high. with the exception of Ohio and Indianna, where the weather has been somewhat unpropitinus and the storms destructive. In the East. on the last of June, the growth was small, but the hot weather of July has brought a large portion of the crops in splendid con-dition. Wheat—the condition of wheat as shown in the July return, is above the average for last year in all the States except Vermont, Connecticut, the Carolinas, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Texas and Nebraska -The season been peculiarly favorable to the growth and ripening of this great cereal crop in all except the Southern States. Ryc, oats and barley promise abundent crops. No seri-ous drawbacks are reported, and few complaints of bad condition are received. Potatoes.so unexceptionably unproductive last year, are in an unusually fine condition. and the average is increased in every State except Rhode Island, the natural re sult of extremely high prices for last year's crop. Fruit is variable. Apples and peaches are less promising than usual. Vermont, New Jersey, Delaware, Mary-Vermont, New Jersey. Delaware, Mary-land, Virginia, Aakanas, Miasouri Iow a Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and West Vir-ginia, made a worse record than the other States as to apples. —Penches will be less abundant than apples. New Jersey. Mary land and Delaware promoting but half a crop and Illinois and Michigan showing a considerable action. considerable reduction. A fair promise of grapes is indicated.
