THE WARS OF OUR COUNTRY

The Confessions of a Fakir.

I never even guessed that I was a seer until the spur of poverty drove me into prophecy. The thing happened to light dealer in prophesying machines at an address in Brooklyn of all places—and he sold me an outfit for a low price. Advice he gave free.

"Look wise," he said. "Stand 'em a line of hot talk full of big words. The machine has been seen by millions of Americans, and trusted implicitly by hundreds of thousands. It is to be found at nearly every seaside and mounted on a tall tube that speaks from a pedestal. The head was wrapped in a turban, and the dreamy eyes peered afar into the future over a scrubby plantation of black oriental beads. That head was my familiar, and I was Abdul Aziz Khan. He was captured as a spy and would have been hanged but for the French General Lafayette's intervention. As it was, he escaped and proceeded to avenge his humiliation. Johnson and the Butlers invaded Pennsylvania with their horde of Tories and savages, accompanied by the famous Mohawk chief Brant. The present shaped the valley, twenty-one miles long, was populated by farm folk and laborers and was defended by one fort, whose garrison was chiefly made up of old men and boys. Down upon this valley swept Indians and Tories, burning and slaying. From one end of the district to the other. Hopelessly outnumbered and cut off from all means of escape, the fort's garrison surprised and overpowered under promise that their lives and those of the women and children who had been taken within the walls should be spared. But as soon as the gates were opened the Indians rushed in and murdered every one they could find. Mothers and wives were slaughtered like sheep. Men were put to death by unspeakably horrible tortures. The affair was so much more atrocious than among the English, that Johnson and the Butlers gave out a report that the Indians had broken away from their white master's control. How little truth this statement contained was proved not long afterward when Walter Butler and his Indian-Tory followers attacked Cherry Valley, in Otsego county, N. Y. The village surrounding the fort was burned, the ill defended fort itself was captured, and the garrison of soldiers and their families were taken. Prisoners were taken, many of whom were reserved for later tortures. Following on this Johnson and Butler made a wholesale raid on the whole section, Mohawk valley, killing their former friends and neighbors, burning their property and committing their usual abominable crimes. They advanced down the valley as far as Johnstown, and even Albany was menaced. But a patriot force (made up largely of the very men whose families and acquaintances had most suffered from such raids) marched against the invaders, killed Walter Butler and his garrison, and the Tory rabble reeling back through the winter forests to Canada, broken, routed, smashed.

So ended Indian warfare in the east.

An Optical Illusion.

Did you ever try to see through your hand? The long, beautiful man-of-war pennant is very inspiring to an American as they feel that full length from the masts of our naval vessels.
