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



Total employment includes nonfarm wage and salary workers, agricultural workers, unpaid family workers, domestics, the self employed, and workers involved in labor disputes.

People are classified as unemployed, regardless of their eligibility for unemployment benefits or public assistance, if they meet all of the following: they were not employed during the survey week; they were available for work at that time; and they made specific efforts to find employment some time during the prior four weeks. Persons laid off from their former jobs and awaiting recall and those expecting to report to a job within 30 days need not be looking for work to be counted as unemployed.

⁴ The unemployment rate is calculated by dividing the total number of unemployed by the total civilian labor force, and is expressed as a percent.

⁵ Kittery-York is the five-town Maine portion of the Portsmouth-Rochester PMSA which includes towns in both Maine and New Hampshire.

The Kennebec Regional Development Authority is onethird of the way towards having enough towns sign on to the
Oakland Superpark concept. The Authority has to reach
a \$3 billion threshold in aggregate property valuation of
participating communities. G.M. Pollack has selected
Rockland as the site for its ninth Maine store. Governor
King, local legislators, and businesses celebrated the
grand opening of the Augusta and Skowhegan
CareerCenters on March 19. A new \$1.6 million
business park in Madison got a shot in the
arm as changes in grant formulas will reduce
the town's cost by \$160,000.

The Lewiston-Auburn area February unemployment rate of 4.3 percent was the lowest February rate in 40 years. More than 900 new jobs are expected in the Lewiston-Auburn area during 1999. Anticipated new firms are Home Depot, Office Max, Pizza Hut, Fox Ridge Golf Course, ICT Telemarketing, and Flagship Cinemas. Expansions are expected by New Fab, Crystal Spring Bottling, ENEFCO, Schooner Estates, Falcon Rule, Diamond Phoenix Corp., FISC, Penmor Printers, Brink's and Telemark.

North/East Area

Two paper mills announced temporary shutdowns due to a weak market for paper products.

Champion Paper of Bucksport, a major producer of lightweight coated magazine stock, will shut down two of their four paper machines for one week. Earlier this year, Champion shut down their entire operation for one week due to a lack of orders. Bowater Corp. will completely close the East Millinocket and Millinocket mills for two weeks. The Bowater mills in Maine produce newsprint for the printing and publish-

Maine Medical Center will build a \$13 million, 50,000-square-foot research facility, the Center for Molecular Medicine, in Scarborough. Fairchild Semiconductor Corp. is forming a joint venture with the Shinsho Corp. in Tokyo to market Fairchild's semiconductors and other electronic components in Japan. In a move to increase efficiency, Vishay-Sprague will close their plant in Concord, N.H., and consolidate production at the Sanford facility. The company produces capacitors used in electronic equipment such as computers, telephones, and pacemakers.

February Unemployment Rate Fell to 3.4 Percent

State Labor Commissioner Valerie Landry announced that the seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for Maine fell slightly to 3.4 percent in February from a revised estimate of 3.5 percent in January.


"In comparison to February 1998, the seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate dropped from 4.7 percent to 3.4 percent. The number of people unemployed dropped by 7,700," said Commissioner Landry.

Between January and February, seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs increased by 1,100. Most of the gain was in services and government. Over the year, nonfarm jobs rose by 14,500, with more than half the growth in services industries. Additional job gains were recorded in retail trade; construction; finance, insurance, and real estate; wholesale trade; and transportation and public utilities.

Other New England states reporting seasonally-adjusted unemployment rates for February include New Hampshire, 3.0 percent; Rhode Island, 3.9 percent; and Vermont, 4.2 percent. The adjusted national rate for February was 4.4 percent.

The Maine not-seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for February was unchanged from January at 4.7 percent

and down from 6.0 percent in February 1998. The unadjusted national rate was 4.7 percent, down from 4.8 percent in January and 5.0 percent in February 1998. Not-seasonally-adjusted unemployment rates for Maine counties ranged from 2.4 percent in Cumberland County to 10.9 percent in Washington County.

Not-seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs rose seasonally by 4,500 between January and February. State and local government and educational services jobs increased as a result of seasonal gains in educational institutions after the winter break. Retail trade fell seasonally by 2,500. Construction dropped by 500 as winter weather reduced building activity.





Between February 1998 and February 1999, not-seasonally-adjusted nonfarm wage and salary jobs rose by 14,000. Services increased by 8,700, largely in social services, business services, health services, and other services. Retail trade rose by 2,700; construction added 2,000; finance, insurance, and real estate rose by 1,500; and wholesale trade and transportation and public utilities each rose by 700. Manufacturing and government jobs declined over the year.


Unemployment Rates for Maine








Hours Worked by Manufacturing Production Workers, Maine²
