LARGE AUDIENCE HEAR ILLUMINATING DISCUSSION OF CAMPAIGN ISSUES.

New Hall was filled to its full seating capacity Monday evening of last week to hear addresses on the issues of the campaign by Hon. William T. Haines of Waterville and Hon. John F. Swasey of Canton.

A notable fact about the audience was that while there were a few women present, and a small number of men, the greater part of the audience were voters. That they were there to give attention to what was said was evident. While there were no great outbursts of enthusiasm, such as we sometimes read of, a good measure of applause was given the remarks of the speakers, and everybody listened with close attention. Not more than twelve or fifteen people left the hall until the speaking was concluded after 10 o'clock. It was a most satisfactory meeting, and it shows that the voters are interested in the campaign, and are thinking about it. A number were present from Paris Hill, West Paris, Hebron, and other places.

Walter L. Gray, Esq., chairman of the Republican town committee, presided at the meeting, and shortly after 8 o'clock Haines and Swasey began their addresses.
