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Poultry Notes.

A FEW SUGGESTIONS WHAT TO DO WITH

WINTER COMING ON.

Whether it be farm poultry or poultry

on a city lot, give the hens a warm

house for the winter if you expect them

to lay.

Lay out a feeding plan which seems

reasonable, like bringing eggs in view

of all the food this winter.

Give the hens a thorough cleaning

and painting or whitewashing before

winter commences, and then keep it

clean all winter. A good disinfectant

would also be a wise thing to

use.

Don't forget that green food and meat

are almost necessary if you expect to

get any eggs in the winter. Chop

up some green food and meat scraps

and feed them to the hens. Cabbage

and turnips are good, too, and

succulent leaves like lettuce, or almost

any kind of vegetable, are good.

Pullets will undoubtedly lay some

when they reach the proper age and the

right condition of maturity, but don't

forget that feeding and care have a

great deal to do with getting them up to

the proper condition of maturity. They

won't lay very much unless they have

the right kind of food.

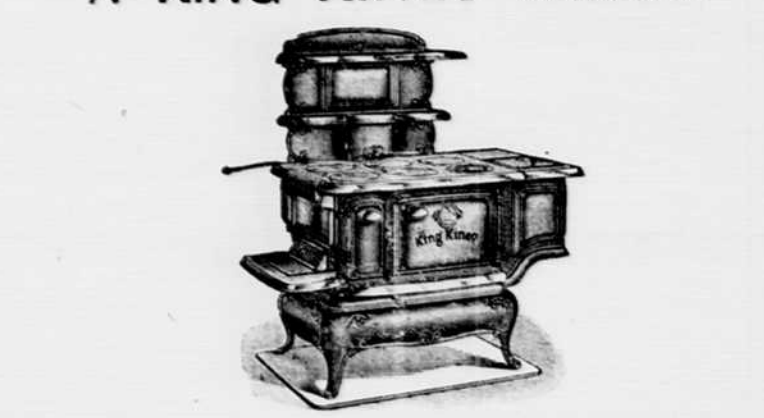

Pie Pointers and Pies.

PIE PASTE.

Sift into two cups of pastry flour one tablespoonful of salt, and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of baking powder. Mix into the flour evenly one-half cup of lard. Wet with enough ice-cold water to give the right consistency to roll. When rolled out the first time take a level tablespoonful of butter and spread it over the rolled paste. Then fold twice and roll out again. Repeat this process once more and the paste is ready to be used.

One of the essential things to remember is to have the ingredients for the paste as cold as possible, particularly about the water be ice cold.

Never put pie paste directly on the fire. If it is necessary to it to stand for a short time, fold in a cheesecloth, place in a covered dish in a cool place.

In baking a pie with two crusts be sure to moisten the edge of the under crust with water before putting on the upper crust if you would prevent your pie from running over.

If the pie plate is dusted with flour before the paste is laid on the plate there will be no difficulty in its easy removal.

The oven should be piping hot when the pie is first put in it. Then the heat should be moderated after the first three or four minutes. All egg and milk combinations should be cooked at a low temperature.

In making meringue for pies beat the whites of three eggs until stiff, add gradually four tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and flavor with either lemon, vanilla or nutmeg. The meringue of thick should be cooked about eight minutes in a moderate oven. If it is to be used before thoroughly done the egg will liquify; if the meringue is tough it has been cooked too long.

In making a pie with two crusts be sure that incisions are made in the top crust in order that the steam may escape.

When making pies if you will grease the pie plate with a little butter it will make the bottom crust brown and flaky and thus prevent the crust from becoming soft. The pie can also be removed much more easily from the plate if this is done.

CUSTARD PIE.

Three eggs, two-thirds of a cupful of sugar, one pint of milk, a saltspoonful of salt, a dash of grated nutmeg. Beat the eggs with the sugar and add the salt. Pour into a plate lined with a little of the milk and melt. Beat this up with the eggs and sugar, add the salt and the rest of the milk slightly warmed. Flavor with a teaspoonful of vanilla, pour into a plate lined with a rich crust and bake the same as custard pie. When cold cover with a meringue.

CHOCOLATE PIE.

The juice of one lemon, one large cupful of sugar, two-thirds of a cupful of salt, a dash of grated nutmeg. Beat the eggs with the sugar and add the salt. Pour into a plate lined with a little of the milk and melt. Beat this up with the eggs and sugar, add the salt and the rest of the milk slightly warmed. Flavor with a teaspoonful of vanilla, pour into a plate lined with a rich crust and bake the same as custard pie. When cold cover with a meringue.

LEMON PIE.
