The Automobile Law.

It is of interest to all, whether owners
of automobiles or not, to know the main
points of the automobile law which will
into effect the first of January. To put
this information into convenient form,
the Maine Automobile Association has
prepared the following explanation of
the principal provisions of the law:

A-L-M Standard. Year begins Janu-
ary 1st and ends December 31st. Cars
registered between October 1st and
December 31st, of any year, half regular
fee. Secretary of state will replace lost
plates at 25 cents each.

Operator's license. Operators must
be licensed annually—fee \$2.00—but un-
licensed persons may operate when ac-
companied by licensed operator, if learn-
ing to operate and intending to apply for
license. All licenses issued previous to
January 1, 1912, are void.

Excess of cars. A car can be sold
and another purchased of same power
without extra fee by applying to sec-
retary of state and paying \$2.00 new
number plates. If new car is of greater
power, there must be paid the difference
between the first fee paid and the fee of
the new car. If before the first of Aug-
ust of each year, a higher power car
is exchanged for one of lower power,
one-half of the difference is re-
quired. In each instance \$2.00 must be
paid for new plates. When a car is sold,
secretary of state must be notified to
whom sold.

Residents are allowed 30 days in
the state without registering their cars
provided operator is licensed and car
registered in another state and number
plates displayed. If they remain longer,
they are required to pay same fee as
residents.

The secretary of state, Augusta, Me.,
is the proper officer to apply to for reg-
istration or information.

Speed. In open country outside cities
and villages, in built up places, the
speed at all times must be reasonable
and safe, having due regard to the traf-
fic and the character of the road. When
passing a car, must stop if occu-
pant raises hand.

Licenses revoked. Any person oper-
ating a motor vehicle under the influ-
ence of intoxicating liquor, or who uses a
car without the authority of its owner, or
operator, or who is convicted of any of
the crimes of Taxe and Smell. Full size

erected on right hand side of road,

"Stop" must be reduced to 5 miles.

General Management of Sheep.
In discussing the management of a flock
of sheep the topic naturally divides into
three divisions—the housing, breeding,
and feeding, the last of which is the
most important perhaps at the present
time. The prerequisite for satisfactory
housing is a building which is well ven-
tilated and free from drafts, it should be
the lightest and freest from moisture.
The sheep is naturally equipped for cold
weather and will stand most any degree
of cold so long as it has a place to stay
in that is dry and sheltered. Plenty of
room should be allowed each sheep at the
feed rack. Crowding results in the
smaller and weaker sheep not getting
their share of the food, and if the ewes
are heavy with lamb, abortion and other
difficulties may be caused.
