Cold Weather Duties.

With the first cold days of early fall, the housekeeper commences to formulate plans to make her family comfortable for the coming winter, and her duties become more exacting, because so much depends upon the atmosphere of the house. In the summer the normal person lives so much out of doors, windows and doors are constantly open; there is no care as to the heating of the house; social duties are of an informal character, and one takes in more easily. The gradual approach of winter brings such a change, from a house constantly open to the fresh breeze and direct sunlight to a room almost constantly closed, that a little advice on how to keep the rooms sweet, well ventilated, and properly heated, will not be unprofitable. Healthful animal or vegetable life cannot be sustained without fresh air in plenty. With the first chilly days we are apt to forget this and keep the windows carefully closed against the cold. Living in rooms that have not a proper supply of pure air lowers the vitality and makes one feel the cold more. It is an error to think a house can be kept warmer without fresh air than with it.

After the sleeping rooms the first thing in the morning. Have at least one window in the upper hall in which a ventilator can be placed; or if that be inconvenient, have a strip of board about four or five inches wide set under the lower sash. This will give fresh air without a draught, and is a good plan to have in sleeping rooms, when one fears an open window. Always keep rooms warm, while the others are being aired, then give them a thorough airing with fresh air, when the first rooms are comfortable. The kitchen with its doors should be opened to the sunshine at every opportunity. It is a good plan to have a kitchen window opened always a few inches at the top. Then from the opened door there comes a draught that carries the impure air out of the window.

Fall cleaning need not be as energetic as that of spring. The walls need to be wiped down, as they have been exposed to dust, the result of opening doors. Screens should be taken down, cleaned thoroughly, and wiped with oil, to prevent rusting while in storage.

Although electric lights and gas are in general use, they have not altogether supplanted the kerosene lamp as yet, and in fact there are many housewives who prefer the old style lamp. But unless a lamp is kept in clean condition, it will furnish a poor light, and give off unpleasant odors. Therefore lamp cleaning becomes a part of each winter day's routine, and the best time for the task is in the morning, since filling by artificial light has been the cause of many a serious accident.

See that the fruit cellar is properly cleaned and in fit sanitary condition for housing the winter's supply. An even temperature should be maintained. As much fruit is lost through a foul cellar as by imperfect sealing.

The care of the plumbing is an important duty. The housekeeper should see, at least once a year, to the thorough flushing of all pipes. The best time for this is after the morning's work is done. After the mid-day work is done, and again at night, the pipes in the kitchen sink should be thoroughly flushed with hot water, if possible. Once a week put half a pint of washing soda in an old tea can, place on the fire until the soda is dissolved, then pour the water in the pipes, reserving two quarts of it for the kitchen sink.

Food in Tin Cans.
All of the trouble that the housewife has with canned foods is caused by imperfect tin cans or difficulty in opening the can. Occasionally the solder used in making the can does not run evenly, causing a very slight hole which allows the air to gradually leak into the can, resulting in an accumulation of gas and spoilage of the contents. Such cans always show the pressure of gas by puffing or swelling at the top or bottom.

Before opening a tin of canned foods of any kind, whether they be packed in glass or not, you should examine the top and bottom, and if they are convex or puffed it is a sure indication that the contents are spoiled and should be discarded.

If the can is perfect you can be sure that the contents are in perfect condition. In opening remove the label so that you can see the seal on the side of the can; lay the can on its side and insert the can-opener right next to this seal and you can see the seal on the side of the can. Now hold the can firmly on the table in an upright position and work the can opener away from the seal until you have cut entirely around the can. You will then be able to turn back the entire top, and if the can is held firmly there is no danger of cutting the hands and the fruit will not be mutilated when it is poured from the tin.

Notes.
TO OPEN FRUIT JARS
The best way to open a fruit jar without using a knife to loosen the top, is to take a hot stove lid and place it on top of the cover for two or three minutes. This will allow the top's seal to easily unseal and will not injure the food in the least. The metal top in this way can be used again and again with no fear of the fruit's spoiling, while if a knife is used for the purpose, it is likely to make the metal cover uneven, so that it will not fit smoothly upon the grooves of the jar.

IN MAKING A WHOLE FISH
Nearly all housewives know how very difficult it is to remove a baked fish from the pan without breaking it. If, however, it is laid upon a piece of rough cotton cloth and then placed in the pan and baked, it can be removed easily and slipped from the cloth to the platter. We have baked fish more frequently since I learned this.

HOUSEHOLD USES FOR KEROSENE
Blood stains saturated with kerosene and then dipped in boiling water can be easily removed without injury to the goods. Windows cleaned with kerosene have a beautiful gloss. Sewing machines will be like new if plentifully oiled with kerosene. Kerosene oil is also the best and most economical for cleaning the tub and lavatory, while dust mops and cloths dipped in kerosene and hung in the air for a while will keep them free from dust and shake out far better than when the different recommended oils are used.

TO SAVE THE WEAR OF RUBBERS
I always had trouble with the heels of my rubbers wearing out, while the uppers were practically new. Now I have my rubbers fitted carefully to my shoes and place an old piece of rubber or velvet in the heels with new wax and find they give much longer wear.

CARE OF TEA KETTLE
Wash out the tea kettle once a day, and twice a week, scour with the cleansing agent best adapted to the material of which the kettle is made.

Mix store blacking with a little ammonia to prevent its burning off.

Add a few drops of ammonia to the bluing water to whiten the clothes.

Wooden Shoes in the United States.

In this country beech is the favorite material for wooden shoes, the manufacture of which has reached considerable proportions in the United States according to the department of agriculture, which has just issued a bulletin on the use of the wood. These shoes, 60 to 75 cents a pair, and are good for two years. They are worn by those who have to work in cold or wet places, such as tanneries, breweries and distilleries, and by workmen in steel mills and glass factories who must walk on hot grates or floors. Farmers, too, are classed among the users.

Beech wood is put to a very much wider range of uses than the average person would be likely to suspect. The department has sent out into hundreds of articles from hobby-horse rockers to butchers' blocks. We walk on beech floors, and beech is used for crutches, benches, barrels, play with beech toys, sit on beech chairs, and in dozens of other ways use articles made of beech almost every day of our lives. It is from from beech that the wood especially for articles which come in contact with foodstuffs, and beech meat boards, skewers, lard tubs, butter boxes, sugar hogs, and refrigerator dishes, spoons and scoops are widely used.

Only one species of beech grows naturally in the United States, but for uses in this country have a wider commercial range. It extends from the Gulf of Mexico into eastern Canada, and in practically every place where it grows it is out for market. The total yearly output of beech wood in the United States is approximately 500 million board feet.

Ex-President Taft on Missionaries.

Many books have been written that contain criticisms of missionaries. National observers, and sometimes even foreign ministers, have felt called upon to assert that missionaries are unsafe as counselors, and that they are useless in their efforts to substitute an alien religion for one with which people have been satisfied for thousands of years.

I do not wish to pronounce perfect everything that missionaries have done. No doubt there are among them emotional persons and persons of little judgment. But with very few exceptions, they are men of high character, high intelligence, high standards of living—persons who are willing to make personal sacrifices for the cause they represent. They are men who know well the characteristics of the people with whom they deal. They learn their language, they study their peculiarities, and they train themselves to conciliatory methods. The very history of their broadened activities shows their practical methods. The bishops, and the heads of missions in the various countries, are trained diplomats, and have learned much of statesmanship in their study of native conditions. I know many instances in which the greatest self-restraint and tact have been exercised in order to prevent an outbreak that would make us a cleavage between governmental authority and the representative missionaries as could hardly be closed for a decade.—Ex-President Taft in The Youth's Companion.

Great Number of Lofly Mountains.

The mountains of California rising more than 13,000 feet above sea level which are not considered sufficiently noteworthy to attract the attention of the general public, according to the United States Geological Survey. Any one of these mountain peaks, or the head of a mountain range, is a great deal higher than the highest of the United States, would of course be visited by millions of people. But California has 70 additional mountain peaks more than 13,000 feet high, which have been named, or 130 in all, as well as a dozen rising above 14,000 feet.
