Seasonable and Tested Recipes.

PLANKED HALIBUT, ST. VALENTINE'S.

(To serve eight). Select a solid piece of halibut, cut the entire width of the fish and below the opening in the body. It should be about two inches thick and weigh nearly three pounds. Trim the ends, rinse in cold water and wipe dry. Put a fish sheet thoroughly rubbed over with fat in an agate baking pan; on the sheet dispose half a dozen slices of onion, and on these lay the fish. Squeeze the juice of half a lemon over the fish, dot with butter or strips of fat salt pork and pour around a full cup of broth. Cook about thirty minutes. Have the oven hot, at first, then let cool to a very moderate heat. Bake six or more times with the liquid in the pan. Season with salt when half-cooked. Transfer the fish to a hot, hardwood plank. By lifting the end of the sheet from the pan, it may be easily pushed from the sheet to the plank in perfect shape. Pipe hot mashed potato (there should be about three pints of mashed potato) around the fish. Brush over the potato with the beaten yolk of an egg, diluted with one or two tablespoonfuls of milk. Set the plank into a hot oven to brown the edges of the potato. Spread the fish with butter, creamed and mixed with lemon juice and blue-chopped parsley. Then lay the onion slices between the fish and potato with hot peas, seasoned with salt, black pepper and butter, and string beans seasoned as the peas. Set boiled onions at the end of the plank. Finish with flowers of cauliflower across the center of the fish. To change the color, use shreds of green pepper in place of the pimiento, and beans, cut from butter, in place of the carrots; string beans may be used the whole length of the fish on both sides and peas in heart-shaped timbale cases (critter batter) may be disposed above the fish. Serve drawn butter sauce or Hollandaise sauce in a bowl. Additional onions should be served in a separate dish.

For other occasions other shapes of carrot or beet may be selected.

HOLLANDAISE SAUCE

With a small wooden spoon beat half a cup of butter to a cream; beat in the yolks of two to four eggs, one at a time; beat in one-fourth a teaspoonful, each, of salt and pepper. Set the dish over boiling water; add half a cup of boiling water and stir vigorously until the mixture thickens a little, lifting the saucepan from the water occasionally, set in cold water and curdle; turn into a cold dish and beat in the juice of half a lemon. If preferred, start out with half the butter, and beat in the last half by degrees. With four yolks the sauce is of the consistency of mayonnaise.

MOCK HOLLANDAISE SAUCE

Cook two tablespoonfuls of vinegar with four five peppercorns, in a tiny saucepan, till the vinegar is reduced somewhat (two or three minutes). Pick out the peppercorns; add one-fourth a cup of ordinary white or cream sauce and set over hot water. Beat one-fourth a cup of butter (or substitute) to a cream; beat in the yolks of two eggs, one at a time, and beat into the white sauce; when the egg is cooked beat in two tablespoonfuls of butter, a little at a time, one-fourth a teaspoonful of salt and the juice of half a lemon.

TURNIPS OF FRESH WITH OYSTERS OR SHRIMPS

Use any fish from which fillets may be taken. Flounder is good, cod or haddock may be used. Two slices, cut half an inch thick, gave eight fillets. Have some pieces of carrot; dip them in melted fat, and roll each fillet around a piece of the carrot. By slipping the carrot in fat before use, it will dip into the fat when the fish is cooked. Run a wooden toothpick, dipped in fat, through the ends of the fillets to hold them in place. Set the fillets in a greased pan. Have ready fish broth made by cooking the trimmings, bones, skin, etc., of the fish with a few slices of carrot, onion and celery, covered with cold water, and set over hot water. Pour broths around the fillets. Let cook in the oven about fifteen minutes, basting two or three times with the fish broth. Heat a pint of oysters to the boiling point in their own broth; drain off the broth and use with what is needed of the fish broth in making a cup of cream sauce. Add the last, beat in one or two tablespoonfuls of butter, a little at a time. Add the oysters to the sauce and keep hot. Shrimps may be used in place of the oysters. Shape well-seasoned mashed potato in round cakes, egg-and-bread crumbs and fry in deep fat, or simply dip the edge of the cake in flour-chopped parsley. Set a turban on each potato-shape, fill the open center with the oysters and sauce, and serve at once. Serve remaining oysters and sauce in a separate dish.

CREAMED OYSTERS IN SWEDISH TIMBALE CASES

Pour one-fourth a cup of cold water on a pint of fresh-oyster oysters; look over, by one, to remove bits of shell. Heat quickly to the boiling point, drain and cut in halves. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter; in it cook two tablespoonfuls of flour and one-fourth a teaspoonful of salt and pepper; add three-fourths a cup of the broth and one-fourth a cup of cream, and stir until boiling; serve hot in the cases.

SWEDISH TIMBALE CASES

Beat two eggs yolks; add half a cup of milk and stir in three-fourths a cup of flour, sifted with half a teaspoonful of salt. Beat vigorously, adding a few more drops of milk, if the batter be too thick. When the mixture is done, it should be very thin, delicate and crisp. To use heat the timbale iron in hot fat, lift from the fat and drain, then dip in the batter, hold in a small cup—half an inch of the top of the iron; return at once to the fat to cook until the case is crisp and highly colored. Shake from the iron to a tin lined with soft paper to drain.

COLD MEAT WITH CHINESE LETTUCE

Cut cold, roast beef tenderloin or roast lamb into thin slices; set these, one overlapping another, down the center of a serving dish, with heads of Chinese lettuce cut in quarters as a border around the meat. Serve Mayonnaise or Russian salad dressing in a bowl; ordinary lettuce may be used in the same way.

PRESSED CORNED BEEF

Cover a piece of corned beef with cold water, let heat gradually to the boiling point, then let simmer very slowly about six hours or until very tender. Shake to a brick-shaped bread pan and cover with a board bearing a weight. Let stand some hours or overnight. Serve, cut in thin slices, with a thick slice of pickled cabbage, pressed without disturbing the shape; with other cuts the fat and lean may be mixed.

MEAT RECHAUFFE WITH POACHED EGG

Chop tenderloin, cold meat, preferably chicken, veal, lamb or ham, very fine. For one slice of meat make half a cup of sauce of one tablespoonful, each, of onion, salt, pepper, and half a cup of broth or milk; stir in nearly two-thirds a cup of the meat and spread on a slice of toast. If the meat is cold, it has been dipped in salted, boiling water. Above the meat set a carefully poached egg.

MINT SAUCE

(For roast lamb). Wash one bunch of mint, shake and dry on a cloth. Pick the leaves from the stems and chop them very fine; add one-fourth a cup of boiling water and one or two tablespoonfuls of sugar, cover and let stand half an hour; add the juice of one lemon or four tablespoonfuls of elder vinegar and one-fourth a teaspoonful, each, of salt and pepper, and it is ready to serve.

CANNED BEANS-LETTUCE SPOUT SALAD

Drain the sprouts and dry them on a cloth. To the ordinary mayonnaise dressing add a great deal of cold-spiced beef of three or four ounces and a tablespoonful of capers chopped very fine. Mix with the sprouts; serve with or without lettuce.
