Maine News Notes.
A respondent in the Piscataquis Municipal Court was last week fined \$50 and costs for selling a bottle of lemon flavoring extract for beverage purposes, and he paid the fine.

Philip J. Deering of Portland has been re-elected as chairman of the state highway commission, and William M. Ayer of Oakland has been chosen chairman in his stead. Mr. Deering remains a member of the commission.

Henry W. Brown, 14 years of age, died at Bar Harbor on the 6th as the result of accidentally shooting himself in the leg with a shot gun while hunting partridges with two other boys. He did not know the gun was loaded.

Another indication of the general awakening of interest in agriculture in this state is seen in the increased enrollment in the agricultural college at the University of Maine. Of the 472 first year students enrolled in the university 122 are taking courses in the agricultural department. Of these 65 are four-year course students, 17 taking the two-year course, 15 in forestry, 21 in home economics and one special.

Belfast at a special election on the 31 by a vote of 242 to 113 voted to buy Belfast Water Co. plant. Arrangements have been made whereby the water will be taken over for \$105,000. The formation of a water district has been authorized by act of the legislature. It is expected that the first thing that will be done after the transfer is to reduce the rates to what they were before the last advance was made by the company.

George St. Hilare of Lewiston, who has attracted considerable attention in the past few weeks by his handling stunts of climbing buildings which he has done, fell from St. Augustine's church at Augusta, on which he was working as a slinger, Tuesday. He sustained severe injuries, and will probably be more or less affected permanently if he recovers. He is about 33 years of age, and has a wife and two children.

Portland Argus.—Now that the sword-fighting season is over and the skippers of the local vessels that were engaged during the summer are figuring up their profits for the three months or more they were chasing the big fish it develops that while the schooner Sadie M. Nunan, Capt. Fred Bickford, was the high liner of the fleet in amount of gross stock, the crew of Capt. Ed Smith's little schooner Sunapee made the largest individual stock, each man drawing out as his share of the profits the very handsome sum of \$1,100. It is not been a number of the local vessels to remain idle at the wharves for several weeks during the very best part of the season. If American forces can be sent to the United States will be thrust in Europe if its interests are not safeguarded in the most careful and vigilant fashion.

Signs are not lacking that the administration is lending a willing ear to the talk that the United States is obligated—morally or legally it is not clear which—to send an American force to interfere in the trouble at Fiume provided it is not composed. Indeed, it is reported that American marines are already in that region.

The controversy over Fiume is not one which involves the enemies of the United States, that is, Germany or Austria. It concerns Italy and the Jugoslavs. Both the Italians and the Jugoslavs are the allies and friends of this country.

The question which is being freely asked here and will be asked still more freely if American forces are permitted to become involved in the Fiume controversy is what is the authority for such a thing and what possible sense there is in allowing American troops to be used or causing them to be used in such a quarrel.

If cables speak correctly, the Fiume controversy, though it may be settled, may also develop into a war between Italy and the Jugoslavs.

It is certain that if American forces are thrust into any such entanglement there will be an outbreak of indignation in Congress even more bitter than the one over the retention of American emergency men in Siberia and the sending of American troops into Silesia.

What is going on at Fiume and the dangerous possibilities of the situation illustrate why it is senators are insisting that Article X of the covenant for the League of Nations be so worded that it will not be possible for any authority but Congress to say that American forces shall be used in such a controversy.

Girls from the extreme western provinces of China, who attend the school, must remain in Peking during all of the eight years required for their high school and college training, because to return each summer would require six weeks for the trip one way and would cost more than a trip to America and return.

Girls from each of the western provinces speak a different language and they cannot understand one another any more than they can the girls from northern, southern, eastern or central provinces. Hence they have adopted English as a common tongue.

New School for China.
Y. W. C. A. Secures New Site for Girls' Physical Training School.

A new home has been found for the Physical Training School which the Young Women's Christian Association has opened for native girls in Shanghai, China.

The grounds cover eighteen "mow," which means approximately six acres, and are divided by a private road. A foreign residence already on the grounds will be used by the American teachers, while the native buildings on the other side will furnish living quarters and classrooms for the 35 students.

How to Judge Meat of Lamb.

DO NOT BUY DULL COLORED, FLABBY MEAT.

Lamb can be one of the most delicious varieties of meat or it can be one of the most distasteful, according to its quality and the way it is prepared before and during cooking.

Many of people, who formerly had chased lamb and the foods they disliked, have learned to like it when it was prepared properly.

The strong mutton flavor so objectionable to many is located principally in the thin membranous skin and outer fat of a cut of lamb or mutton.

A sharp knife will take it off easily. Spicuous declare that a good leg of lamb with this skin and the superficial fat removed, rubbed with butter and roasted, cannot be excelled in the meat line for delicacy of flavor.

HOW TO KNOW GOOD LAMB
If the consumer wants to know the grade of lamb he is buying, there are a few cardinal points to observe.

The "choice" grade represents the highest quality of lamb offered. The lean meat is of a pinkish color and the fat is uniform, white and brittle.

The "medium" grade represents the next lower quality and the principal point which determines this grade is a lack of outside and inside fat.

Nourishing and Appetizing Lunches.

THE FOLLOWING SUGGESTIONS ARE AMONG THOSE MADE IN THIS BULLETIN FOR WELL-BALANCED SCHOOL LUNCHES.

1. Sandwiches with sliced tender meat for filling, baked apple, cookies or a few lumps of sugar.

2. Slices of meat loaf or bean loaf, bread-and-butter sandwiches, stewed fruit, small frosted cake.

3. Crisp rolls, hollowed out and filled with chopped meat or fish, moistened and seasoned, or mixed with salad dressing; orange, apple, a mixture of sliced fruits, or berries, cake.

4. Lettuce or celery sandwiches, cup cornard, jelly sandwiches, cream cheese and cottage cheese and chopped green pepper sandwiches or a pot of cream cheese with bread-and-butter sandwiches, peanut sandwiches, fruit cake.

5. Hard-boiled eggs, crisp baking powder biscuits, celery or radishes, brown sugar or maple-sugar sandwiches.

6. Bottle of milk, thin corn bread and butter, dates, apple.

7. Raisin or nut bread with butter, cheese, orange, maple sugar.

8. Baked bean and lettuce sandwiches, apple sauce, sweet chocolate.

Treat Outer Garments with Care.

Outer garments which are given careful attention wear so much longer and look so much better than those which are neglected.

THE FOLLOWING HINTS FOR THEIR CARE ARE GIVEN BY HOME ECONOMIC EXPERTS IN THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE:

Hang outer garments carefully when not in use.

Do not keep garments folded in a closet.

Keep covers over delicate garments or others worn only occasionally to protect against dust and rubbing.

Do not keep dirty soiled garments in an unclean place.

They are likely to be soiled and discolored.

Fold carefully all garments kept in drawers or boxes.

Put garments away for the season, guard against wrinkling, stretching, fading, and insects.

Fold so that creases will correspond as far as possible with the folds into which the garment falls.

Do not allow weight to rest on folded garments.

Garments of firm materials may be left hanging if carefully covered against dust and insects.

But heavy materials, heavily trimmed garments, and circular skirts are likely to be stretched out of shape by their own weight.

Keep in the dark to avoid change in color.

Removable and washable collars, cuffs, and linings save cleaning in women's dresses, waists and coats.

Prolong Your Shoes' Life.

Have shoes carefully fitted. Well-fitting shoes look better and wear better, besides being more comfortable.

Poor quality shoes are seldom economical.

Alternate two pairs; they last longer.

Slip shoe-trees into shoes when you take them off; it makes them keep their shape longer.

Keep shoes clean and well brushed; a dressing made with a little oil, well rubbed in, prolongs the wear of leather and kid.

Clean canvas shoes on shoe-trees to prevent shrinking.

Sponge with a little water and soap that contains whitening, or use a commercial cleanser.

Dry wet shoes slowly on shoe-trees or stuff with paper.

Protect shoes with rubbers in wet weather.

Even with careful drying the moisture tends to rot the sewing threads.

Do not wear run-down heels; they will spoil the shape of the whole shoe.

Do not wear shoes with worn soles; often they can be sewed at home.

The cream separator should be thoroughly washed and sterilized after each use.

It is in need of sterilizing if milk or cream left in the separator act as a "starter" to hasten the souring of the cream.

If the table cloth is wearing along the lines of the regular folds, cut off a few inches from side and end so as to change the place of folding.
