

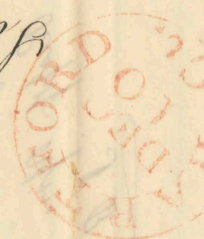

Sir,

Annexed you have the acct. of the American Asylum, for the board & tuition of the beneficiaries of the State of Maine, for 6 mos in advance.

W. Kingsbury in his letter to me of the 26th June last, informed me that the Gov. Council, did not feel authorized to settle the interest claimed by me, but would lay the subject before the next Legislature. I hope this claim will not be overlooked, in the multiplicity of business which usually comes before a Legislative body.

You will recollect that the Standing Com. on the Deaf & Dumb in their report of April 19th 41, say, that they are of opinion that some part of the interest charged, is just & equitable. But as they are at this time, unable to decide what part of said interest should be paid by the State, they advise that the same be left for further consideration.
