hot oven and watch carefully that they do not burn. As soon as they are lightly browned, turn them over and bake quickly and carefully take each cake up on a thin bladed knife and roll up like a cornucopia. This must be done very quickly, as the almond filling will melt and it will not roll. Finely chopped blanched almonds can be added before spreading, and you have almond wafers. One-half cup of sugar and one-half cup of butter can be used for flavor if the almonds are used.

**SMALL CAKES.**—Bake any good cup cake in large thin layers, and when cold cut in long strips and frost with different colored and vanilla frosting; chocolate, raspberry and vanilla make a very good variety.

No better cake can be made for this purpose than an old-fashioned rich cookie.

**COOKIES.**—Mix the following ingredients like the sweet wafers mentioned above: One cup of butter, two cups of brown sugar, three eggs, one teaspoon of ginger, one of mace and one-half of salt. Roll out on a floured surface, and bake in soda in three table-spoonfuls of sour milk, add five cups of sifted flour. Roll very thin, cut in fancy shapes and bake in a moderate oven. The cookies are browned, roll and cut all the dough before beginning to bake; as they burn very quickly, they need attention.
