RECIPES FOR YOUNG HOUSEKEEPERS.

BREAKFAST BREADS.

The country is flooded with cook books, and almost every paper and magazine has a department devoted to domestic and culinary matters. But the inexperienced housekeeper, as she usually is, does not know the worth of some recipe which may be simple, or small enough for her small family, but confused to have the proportions so largely stated, and the ingredients so loosely stated and the number of eggs and the amount of butter necessary to the compounding of even the more common.

Warm breads for the breakfast should be a rule be made without eggs, except during the spring months when they are cheap. Our cooking is usually too rich and many eggs thus used might be dispensed with or cooked in a more wholesome way.

A tablespoonful of snow or a teaspoonful corn starch may be used in place of one egg when two or three are called for, and the cake will be nearly as light, but of course not as rich.

I give below a few tried and tested recipes, which, if followed with a certain certainty of success if the ingredients are good and the heat of the oven properly regulated. At present this is one of the greatest difficulties to be met with and judgment, but I hope the time is not far distant when every stove will be fitted with a thermometer indicating the exact temperature, and thus saving the trouble of making the various classes of foods. Thus, instead of "blood heat" the thermometer should be "medium heat," instead of "summer heat," and "plum cake" instead of "temperance," etc.

I disapprove of baking powders in general, as they contain poisonous alkalis,

And other deleterious ingredients, the constant use of which undermines the health of the young and the aged, the elderly and dyspeptic. Many cases of mysterious illness in our young girls might be traced directly to the use of these "candy" products. There is but one baking powder that is safe, or considered good, but I forbear to give its name lest the editor object to my advertising it.

INDIAN ROLLS.—One cupful Indian meal, one cupful flour, one tablespoon sugar, one-half teaspoonful salt, one-half cupful milk, one-half cupful of half cupful sour milk, one large spoonful melted butter. Mode: Mix flour, sugar, salt and soda. Add milk and butter, mix well, roll into thin lastings. Use iron roll pans, with twelve compartments, which must be heated and buttered before filling, upon a griddle, as must all the other cakes. These cakes may be made in any way be done when these pans are used, but not filling some to overflowing, and having a filling others. These will bake in from five to ten minutes, according to the heat of the oven.

GRAHAM ROLLS.—Mix with one cupful flour, one cupful graham meal, one cupful sugar, one-half cupful milk, one-half cupful sour milk, one-half cupful water, one-half cupful oil, one-half cupful salt and a pinch of salt. Add one cupful sour milk and two-thirds cupful cold water; ice water is best. Add, lastly,

SQUASH ROLLS.—One cupful Indian meal, one cupful flour, one cupful milk, one even teaspoonful salt, one even teaspoonful sugar, one even teaspoonful vinegar. Slightly sour milk to make a batter to drop easily from the spoon. Bake in a hot oven. The rolls should last long. Bake as directed for Indian rolls, but they require a little more time.

SQUASH ROLLS.—Two cupfuls flour, one cupful milk, one cupful Indian meal, one half-teaspoonful salt, one half-teaspoonful sugar, one half-teaspoonful oil, one half-teaspoonful vinegar. Mix with a pinch of salt. Mix with slightly sour milk to make a batter to drop from the spoon. The batter must be full as thin as for griddle cakes. A teaspoonful melted shortening. The pans and cakes should be done in five minutes.

INDIAN CAKES.—One cupful flour, one cupful milk, one cupful Indian meal, one even teaspoonful salt, one cupful sour milk, one tablespoonful melted butter. Bake in a hot oven. The cakes. Bake in a flat pan 10 by 7 inches.

HOW TO CARE FOR LAMPS.

There are few things in the world more exasperating to the patience than a smoking lamp, and with the perfection to

which lamps have now attained, this is the necessary result of the progress of the cleaning class. The great mistake which the amateur makes is to wash her lamp chimney. Now, a lamp chimney should never be washed, but should be cleaned with soap and water, and whether there is any gain in washing any part of a lamp, it is a question which is not worth the trouble, unless it is a lamp of glass or china. It seems self-evident that the font of a lamp should be washed, and that in order to guard against accidents from breakage. There are still a good many handsome lamps mounted in glass or porcelain, and these should be washed with metal foams, fitting inside the glass or porcelain mounting. The stupider the cleaner, the more likely is the lamp to be safe, as it is one of the most brilliant reading lamps. A simple metal lamp with a glass chimney is the best, and the brass or bronze at comparatively low prices, so that there is no need, on the score even of economy, of the use of the lamp with glass, now, which is liable to explode from the force of gases, or to be broken while they are lighted.

and dust. The best way of treating
oil to brush off the charred part and

drops of alcohol will do more to re-
move the dust and the smoke from the
inside of the lamp chimney than any
other means. A quantity of water
where dust is difficult to remove apply
a little alcohol on cloth. The metal work
may be cleaned with a quantity of water
it firmly and polishing it with a little
kerosene on a soft cloth.

the lamp. Use a clean, dry cloth for
and lamp brush frequently and see that
they are clean when used.—New York
Tribune.

Season the cream with the sugar and vanilla and whip to a stiff whipped cream, and on this place the macaroons decorated with drops of the cream.

MACAROON SOUP.—Break one ounce of macaroons into pieces about two inches long; put it in a stew pan and cover with water. Boil for half an hour. Put a quart of soup stock into a sauce pan, heat and add the macaroons, let simmer five minutes. Season with salt and pepper and serve with cream.
