





A LATE number of the Railroad Gazette, says that during the single month of August, last, there occurred in the United States, one hundred and fifty accidents, on railroads, resulting in the death of sixty-three persons and the maiming or injuring of one hundred and thirty five more. Nineteen of these accidents resulted in injuries alone, the remainder being destructive only to property. On six days of the month there were eight, nine and ten accidents daily, the 14th being the only day of the month free from casualties of some sort.
