









Railroad Accident.

The Montreal express train over the Grand Trunk which is due here at 12:30 p. m., met with a serious accident near Gilead Thursday. The train was No. 315 and was in charge of David Pratt, conductor; James Doyle, engine driver; N. B. Mitchell, fireman, and brakeman, R. E. Larabee. The train consisted of engine and tender, baggage and express cars, smoking, first-class passenger and the Pullman coach "Ottawa." In the last two cars there were 25 or 30 passengers.

The recent storms have drifted the snow badly in the vicinity of Gilead and at a point about two miles this side of the village, at a place known as Peabody's Bridge, the drifts have been very high. As fast as the snow is cleared from the track it is blown back and packs in very hard. The train went along very well until it had just crossed the bridge when the engine suddenly came to a hard drift across the track. Without a second's warning it was lifted bodily and thrown over the embankment 25 or 30 feet below and struck completely upended. The tender, baggage and express cars followed the engine, but the two passenger cars remained on the road-bed, though they were slightly injured. Both Doyle the driver, and Mitchell the fireman, were buried under the engine, but the former was taken out but little injured. Mr. Mitchell, however, was probably fatally injured. His head was badly cut, and when taken from beneath the engine he was unconscious. He was taken back to Gorham and soon became conscious. His father, Capt. B. F. Mitchell, head of the car department of the road in this city, went out to the scene of the disaster accompanied by Dr. Merrill. There were also one physician from Bethel, two from Gorham and one from Island Pond in attendance.

At the time of the accident, Mr. Frank Ross the baggage master, and Mr. Larabee, the brakeman, were in the baggage car. Larabee was struck on the head with some hard substance and received quite a severe scalp wound, while Ross escaped with few bruises. Mr. Small, the messenger of the Canadian Express Company, was but little bruised. A careful inquiry shows that no passengers were injured.

As soon as the accident occurred conductor Pratt walked back to Gilead and reported the accident. A telegraph was sent to Gorham and a wrecking train was sent to the scene of the disaster at once. The accident occurred at 9:40 a. m., and the track was clear at 4 p. m.

The running gear of the passenger cars were uninjured, and they were put into the train which was made up as soon as the track was clear. This train left Gilead at 4:30 and arrived here at 8:30, bringing the passengers and all the injured men except Mitchell, the fireman. All the injured men except Ross being in this city, consequently a very large crowd of anxious friends gathered in the depot to meet them. The scene was a lively one for a short time. As soon as one of the men issued from the train he was surrounded by a crowd of eager friends, and in some cases the jam was decidedly unpleasant for the injured men. Mr. Doyle walked to his home unaided, while Mr. Larabee, who was met by his wife, accompanied her home, none of them taking any injury.

Capt. Mitchell telegraphed his wife in this city last evening that their son was quite comfortable and there was a good prospect of his recovery, and if there was no change for the worse they should bring him home to-day.

Later—A despatch received at this office at midnight says: "Mr. Mitchell is some little better to-night."—Portland Press.
