# THE BEST WAY TO USE BONES.

Take one ton of ground bone (the finer  
ground the better) and one-half an ox-  
cart load (one-quarter of a cord) of good  
friable soil which will not bake or cake  
by drying, and which is free from soda  
and stones, no matter how wet it may be  
when used. Place a layer of the soil  
and a layer of the bone, of about equal  
thickness, upon each other (soil at the  
bottom), on the barn floor, or under cover  
in a shed or out building, leaving a bushel  
or two of this soil to cover the heap when  
all the rest is put together. The heap  
will be three to four feet wide at the  
bottom, and about twice as long. In  
forty-eight hours it will be too hot to  
hold your hand in. Let it remain undisturbed  
until the heap begins to cool,  
which will be in a week to ten days.  
Then "throw over" the heap by "chop-  
ping it down" with a shovel and moving  
it "in and out" thoroughly mixing the soil  
and bone. In a day or two it will heat  
again. Let it remain until it cools, or  
for eight or ten days; then throw it over  
in the same manner again. In a few  
days it will heat again, unless the pre-  
vious fermentations have exhausted all  
the moisture in the soil and bone. Throw  
over each ten days until all the moisture  
is thus exhausted and it does not ferment  
any more; then it will be fit for use, and  
it will be ready for use, without deteriora-  
tion, for ten years.

All that is necessary to make bones  
operate as a manure is decomposition—  
rotting; and to produce this process the  
bone only needs to be ground or broken  
fine, and to be subjected to moisture in  
warm weather with some substance that  
will retain the gases evolved during the  
process. Soil furnishes the essential re-  
quisites, and nothing more is needed to  
make bones an excellent and durable  
manure.

I have used many tons prepared in this  
manner during the last twelve to fifteen  
years. I have tried it upon the same  
field, and side by side with the super-  
phosphates of different manufacturers,  
and always saw the best and most per-  
manent effects from the same weight of  
bone prepared in this manner, a ton of  
which, exclusive of the labor and cost  
of hauling, about half as much as a ton of  
superphosphate.

I do not wish to excite a war with the  
chemists, but I think their theory of the  
benefit bone derives by treatment with  
sulphuric acid is erroneous. The acid  
only aids the manual qualities of the  
bone by the mechanical effect of subdivi-  
ding it—making it finer. Its chemical  
effect is no better upon bone than it  
would be upon green horse dung, and I  
would no sooner treat one than the other  
with oil of vitriol, with a view of adding  
to its chemical value as a manure.

I want to say, further, that before  
treating bones in this manner, I tried sev-  
eral methods recommended by the farm-  
ing newspapers without much satisfac-  
tion. I mixed half a ton of ground bones  
with twenty bushels of leached ashes,  
and half a ton with twelve bushels of  
unleached ashes, and the workmen could  
not open their eyes in the barn next morn-  
ing until the doors and windows had been  
open long enough to let the ammonia  
out! As soon as I saw the effect of this  
process I sent for a load or two of spent  
tan to mix with it, and thus saved a part  
of the ammonia; but the effect of this  
compost was not very striking.

I next mixed a ton of bone with wet  
yellow sand—a material about half-way  
between sharp sand and loam. This fer-  
mented finely, but it smelt so bad, and  
was so nasty, that I had to pay an exorbi-  
tant price to get it applied to the land.  
It had a good effect however.

I then mixed a ton of bone with a ton  
of ground plaster. I found the plaster  
was wholly incapable of keeping down  
the carbon smell, or of absorbing the  
manure given out in the form of gases.  
Water had to be added to this heap to  
support the fermentation, and the plaster  
dried hard and in lumps, and did not  
seem to participate in the fermentative  
process as the soil does. This did not have  
so good an effect as the bone and sand; and  
none of these compounds was equal to  
that prepared with soil.

I will also add that the newest bone which  
is collected after exposure to the weather  
for years have lost much of their virtue,  
and will not heat so soon or so much as  
those which have not lost their gelatine  
in that manner.—Country Gentleman.

TREATMENT OF HENS.

The greatest regularity should be ob-  
served in feeding and caring for flocks.  
Have a regular time for all the different  
operations, and the hens will become as  
methodical as their keepers. Eggs should  
be gathered punctually twice a day, or  
often in very cold weather. The morn-  
ing feed should not be made too wet and  
should not be given too hot. If some of  
it freezes before it is eaten, break it up  
with a hammer and it will all be con-  
sumed. In very cold weather it is advis-  
able to put a little cayenne pepper and  
a sprinkle of salt in their morning feed.  
Besides the above enumerated articles,  
the hens should have all the scraps from  
the table; they are very fond of them,  
and will turn them to better account than  
cats or dogs will. Let us recapitulate.  
Give your hens a reasonable share of  
your attention; furnish suitable accom-  
modations; get and keep the right breed;  
do not keep too many; fifty hens and  
four cocks are as many as should ever be  
kept together—half the number will do  
better per capita; save only pullets, the  
earliest hatch for laying; furnish as great  
a variety of diet as possible, and feed as  
much as they will eat; give green food  
and animal food of some sort in winter;  
keep the hens quiet and comfortable;  
don't allow them to be worried or fright-  
ened; water is as important as food, and  
should be kept clean and fresh. These  
rules, intelligently applied, will secure an  
abundant supply of eggs at all times of  
the year.—Fanciers' Journal.
