## LIMEROCK STREET CLIMAX

### Is the New Permanent Bridge Which Replaces a Dangerous One

The new bridge at the head of Limerock street, represents another local W.P.A. project of much importance, constructed under the direction of Roy Jackson as foreman, and Don Klegg of Camden as assistant. For the present it has a heavy gravel surface, but in the spring a coating of tar will be administered. The work has lasted through the summer, with a maximum number of 35 men working at one time.

The old bridge which it replaces had reached an actual danger point for traffic, the support on one side consisting of loose rock, while continual blasting in the quarry to the southward had shaken the ledge and the bridge was held up by a piece of 12x12 timber.

The new bridge is 150 feet long and 30 feet wide, and to form an absolutely safe foundation 2300 bags of cement were used. Eleven thousand paving blocks removed from Tillson avenue in the process of the reconstruction work on that thoroughfare were used in building the walls on each side of the bridge.

These walls have a thickness of seven feet at the base and the 30 inches thick at the top. They are 42 inches high and eventually will have an ornamental cement cap at each end. Thirteen hundred tons of material went into the bridge.

The new bridge is a fitting climax to the effective piece of road-building from the Old County road to Broadway.

In the old days when there was a constant parade of limerock wagons on this street, it was an adventure to ride over it in the fall or spring but today it is one of the best roads in the city.

Mayor Edward R. Veazie who has been constantly in touch with the construction is immensely elated over the fact that the old County road and the section of Limerock street, above referred to, are now maintained by the State—a total coverage of four miles. Needless to say that the residents of the two streets are likewise elated.

## "The Black Cat"

Ontario is not famous alone for its Dionne quintuplets. Star gazers will be interested to note that Mars, a moving star at present, rising a little South of due East around 3:15 a. m. Mercury has already reached its greatest elongation from the sun as evening star. It is two degrees South of the ecliptic and therefore sets too soon after the sun to be readily detected in the twilight. Jupiter is now in the southwestern quarter of the sky in the early evening, and Saturn is becoming a prominent adornment of the evening scene—orange-red in hue.

It is hoped that there will be a large attendance at these readings, and that the audience will not be exclusively feminine. Men will be very welcome if they are able to be present.


