Bill an act providing for the choice of representatives to Congress, was laid on the table.

Resolve to correct sundry clerical errors in the valuation of towns in the county of Malden was, the rule being suspended, read twice and passed to be engrossed. Sent up for concurrence.

Resolve providing for amendment to the Constitution in relation to the offices of sheriffs, and judges and registers of probate was read a second time, and on motion of Mr. Elliot of Frankfort referred to the next Legislature. Sent up for concurrence.

Bill an act respecting agencies of foreign insurance companies within this state was taken up, and as amended passed to be engrossed. Sent up for concurrence.

Petition of town of Boothbay for separate representation;

Petition of town of Townsend for same;

Remonstrance of Moses W. Sarrabee and others, of township No 6, against being incorporated as a town; were severally presented and referred to the next Legislature. Sent up for concurrence.

698 Resolve in favor of Jedediah Fairfield of Hampden was read a second time and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Mr. Meder of Brunswick, by leave, laid on the table a resolve in favor of the treasurer of the town of Brunswick.

Report of the committee on Interior Fisheries recommending that the returns of inspectors of fish be placed upon the files of the Senate, was received from the Senate and accepted in concurrence.

Report of the committee on interior fisheries, granting leave to withdraw on petition of inhabitants of Harpswell;

Reports of the committee on division and alteration of counties granting leave to withdraw on petition of town of Plymouth and on petition of those inhabitants of Madawaska settlement embraced in the counties of Piscataquis and Penobscot;

Reports of the committee on state roads, referring to the next Legislature

Sundry petitions of citizens of Piscataquis;

Reports of the committee on the judiciary, declaring that a bill entitled an act regulating judicial process; and a bill entitled an act directing the manner of disposing of petitions to the legislature in certain cases ought not to pass; were severally received from the Senate and accepted in concurrence. 699

Mr. Lyman of Lubec, from the committee on claims, reported a resolve in favor of William Anson, which was read once and tomorrow assigned for a second reading.

Mr. Little of Portland, from the committee on the judiciary reported a resolve authorizing the Land Agent on the part of the State to agree upon a reference to determine the west line of township No 2 in the 11th range of townships west from the east line of the State which was read once and tomorrow assigned for a second reading.

Bill an act providing for the admission of attorneys and for regulating the practice of the same in the judicial courts of this State, was read twice and tomorrow assigned for a third reading.

Bill an act to incorporate the town of Kennebec, was received from the Senate amended and passed to be engrossed. It was read twice and tomorrow assigned for a third reading.

700 Mr. Morse of Bath, from the committee on the judiciary, reported that bill entitled an act to incorporate the Piscataqua Mutual Marine Insurance Company ought to pass. The report was accepted. The bill was read twice and tomorrow assigned for a third reading.

The Secretary of the Senate informed the Clerk that that body had appointed Mr. Sawtelle chairman of the committee on the judiciary in place of Mr. Parris, elected President pro tem, and that the vacancy in the committee had been supplied by the appointment of Mr. Stetson.

Bill an act providing for the taxing of rail roads and rail road property in this State, was read a third time and amended in concurrence.

Mr. Meder of Brunswick moved to amend by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting as follows:

"Section 1. It shall be the duty of the agent of any incorporated rail road within this State, to file with the State Treasurer, a certificate, under oath, on the first day of May in each year, of the then par value of such rail road, lying within this State, together with the just par value of any real estate belonging to any such corporation, the depots and other property, belonging thereto and

making part of the corporate property of said 701
rail road corporation, designating what part
of such value is within the limits of any town
in this State, viz:- what length of road, num-
ber and value of depots, and other corporate
property. And it shall be the duty of every
such rail road corporation to keep at all
times within this State, a duly authorized
agent for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the State Treas-
urer to enter the value of any rail road, and
such other property belonging thereto, in a book
kept for the purpose, as it existed on the first
day of May; and he shall assess on each rail
road corporation one fourth of one per cent.
upon the value so returned, and a lien shall
be had upon all the property so certified and
returned, as upon real estate for the collection
of taxes by the laws of this State. And the said
rail road shall be held liable to the State for
the sum assessed upon such road, depots and
other corporate property, together with costs, charg-
es and interest, as Hereinafter provided.

And it shall be the duty of the State
Treasurer to issue his warrant to said rail
road agent, requiring him to pay into the
Treasury of State, the sum so ordered and
assessed upon such rail road, within twelve
months; and in case said sum is not so paid,
within the term aforesaid, the said rail road, and
other corporate property belonging thereto, shall be
conditionally forfeited to the State. In case the

702 amendment aforesaid be not paid as required by this act, the State Treasurer shall, on the expiration of said term of twelve months advertise the same in the newspaper printed by the printer for the State, six weeks successively.

Sec. 3. Any rail road corporation, by their agent, may at any time within two years, redeem said rail road and other corporate property, by paying into the State Treasury the sum so appraised, together with all intervening costs and charges, and interest at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, from the date of the first advertisement. And if not paid within said term of two years, the said rail road shall become and be the property of the State."

Mr. Parine of Bangor moved to amend the amendment by striking out the words "incorporated rail road" in the second line of section one, and inserting the words "rail road which shall hereafter be incorporated."

Mr. Gould of Embden moved the previous question. The motion was seconded and the main question ordered to be put. On this question the yeas and nays were ordered, and being taken, the bill, as amended, was passed to be engrossed in concurrence, yeas seventy-nine, nays thirty-seven.

Bill an act in addition to an act to incorporate the Penobscot Boom Corporation was read a third time.

Mr. Chadwick of Portland moved to amend by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting as follows:

"Section 1. There shall be allowed and paid to the Penobscot Boom Corporation a toll or boomage upon all lumber secured and rafted in manner provided in the act to which this is additional, including the warps and wedges, by which they are rafted, thirty-three cents per thousand feet board measure, the scale or survey being the same as that by which logs are usually purchased and sold on the Penobscot river; and this shall be in full for the toll or boomage secured by the sixth section of the act of incorporation, to which this act is additional.

Sec. 2 There shall be allowed and paid to said corporation for each and every raft of logs containing not less than one hundred of the same mark, not taken away, as is provided for in the fifth section of the act of incorpora-

714 tion aforesaid, the sum of four cents per thousand board measure. And said four cents shall be in full for running, securing and keeping the logs not taken away by the owners thereof. And the quantity of feet contained in said logs so run away and secured, shall be deemed and taken to be equal to the average of logs passing through said boom of the same mark for that year.

Sec. 3. The log agent shall take charge of all logs which have no marks, called prize logs, and marked logs not claimed by any one, called scattering logs, which he shall secure and safely keep until all the logs for that year are rafted out of the boom.

Sec. 4. The log agent shall sell all the aforesaid logs at public auction after having published a notice of the time and place of sale, with a description of the several marks, and the number of logs with each mark, and the number of logs without mark, in two newspapers published in the city of Bangor, at least fifteen days before said sale.

Sec. 5. After said sale, said log agent shall forthwith pay over to the treasurer of the Penobscot Boom Corporation the proceeds of the sale of the prize logs, after deducting the expense of advertising and sale, and after paying the boomage due said corporation on said logs. And the said treasurer shall pay out, on demand, the same to the owners of the logs which have passed the

boom that year and whose marks have been recorded 715
in the boom master's book, in proportion to the quan-
tity of logs which each owner or owners has or have
that year had pass through said boom.

Sec. 6. Said log agent shall, after the sale
aforesaid, forthwith pay over to the treasurer of
the county of Penobscot, the proceeds of the sale
of logs with scattering marks and shall
leave with said treasurer a list of said marks
and a statement of the quantity of each mark,
and the amount for which each separate
mark sold for; and if within one year
from that time, any person or persons shall
appear and prove his or their ownership to
any of the logs so marked, then the treasur-
er aforesaid shall pay over to such person
or persons, the amount for which his or their
logs so proved, were sold, and the remainder
shall remain in said treasury for said county.

Sec. 7. The Penobscot Boom Corporation shall
have a clerk who shall keep an exact account
of all the expenditures and of the income of said
corporation, and return the same in detail,
under oath, on or before the tenth day of January,
annually, to the Secretary of State."

The bill was then laid on the table.
