On motion of Mr Ingalls the Senate reconsidered the vote whereby the report of the Committee on Interior Waters on order relative to the Hennessey Ferry Company was accepted, and the same was laid on the table.

Mr. Davis from the committee on the Judiciary reported legislation inexpedient on orders relative to election of Sheriffs and Registers of Probate by the people; and on order relative to fees of attorneys: also leave to withdraw on petition of Stephen Chadwick and others - severally read and accepted. Sent down for concurrence.

Bill entitled an act in relation to the tax assessed on the members of the Brunswick Village Corporation reported from the committee on the Judiciary on petition of John Rogers and others/

Bill entitled an act explanatory of the 24th, 37th and 58th sections of the 16th Chapter of the revised Statutes reported from the same committee on order relative to assessors warrants/

entitled an act in addition to Chapter 812 of the revised Statutes reported

from the same committee on order relative to extending the powers of administrators, executors, and guardians in certain cases)

Bill entitled an act providing for the appointment of an additional justice of the Supreme Judicial Court (reported from said committee on order relative to increasing the number of Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court)

entitled an act to authorize the town of Milford to build part of a certain road in the town of New-tush, and for other purposes (reported from the same committee on petition of the town Milford) were severally read once and Monday next at eleven o'clock assigned for a second reading.

A message was received from the Governor by the Secretary of State returning to the Senate a resolve entitled "Resolve in favor of certain Indians of the Penobscot Tribe", with his reasons for withholding his assent thereto. The message was read and on motion of Mr. Ingalls laid on the table.
