Report, of the committee on Literature and Literary Institutions, declaring legislation inexpedient, on order relative to visitation of primary schools.

Report, of the committee on Literature and Literary Institutions, declaring that bill authorizing the several school districts, in the several towns in this State to organize, and hold school district libraries, ought not to pass.

Report, of the committee on Literature and Literary Institutions, granting leave to withdraw, on petition of School committee of Brewer;

Reports, of the committee on the Judiciary, declaring legislation inexpedient on order relative to petitioners for loca-

tion of roads; on resolutions from State of Vermont, relative to the franking privilege; and on order relative to repealing the 15th. section of 30th. chapter of the revised statutes;

the Treasurer to receive any money that may have been assigned to this State under an act of Congress providing for the distribution of the net proceeds of the public lands."

On motion of Mr. Abbot of Belfast, the House nonconcurring with the Senate in the adoption of the first amendment.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of
Representatives in Legislature assembled, as
follows;

Section 1. The counties of York, excepting
Buxton, Hollis, Simington and Cornish, and
Oxford, excepting Turner, shall compose the
first district and be entitled to one repre-
sentative.

The county of Cumberland, excepting
Auburn, together with the towns of Buxton,
Hollis, Simington and Cornish, in York
county, shall constitute the second district,
and be entitled to one representative.

664 The counties of Kennebec, excepting Wales and Greene; and Franklin shall constitute the third district and be entitled to one representative.

The county of Lincoln, together with Auburn in Cumberland county, and Turner in Oxford county, and Greene and Wales in Kennebec county, shall constitute the fourth district and be entitled to one representative.

The counties of Waldo, excepting Vinalhaven, and Somerset, shall constitute the fifth district and be entitled to one representative.

The counties of Penobscot and Piscataquis shall constitute the sixth district, and be entitled to one representative.

The counties of Hancock, Washington and Aroostook, together with Vinalhaven in Waldo county, shall constitute the seventh district, and be entitled to one representative.

Sec. 2. The representatives chosen in the several districts shall at the time of their election be residents therein. The foregoing division of the State into representative districts shall be, and continue in force until an apportionment of representatives among the several States shall be made by Congress, after the taking of the seventh census.

Sec. 3. The election of representatives to Congress shall take place and be on the second Monday of September, one thous-

and eight hundred and forty-three, and 665
one thousand eight hundred and forty-four,
and thereafter biennially).

Section 4. So much of section three of
an act entitled "an act providing for the
choice of representatives to Congress," approved
February 28th, A.D. 1833, as relates to the man-
ner of calling meetings for the choice of
representatives to Congress, and the duties
of officers of towns in presiding in said
meetings and making returns of votes, and
also sections four, five, six, and seven of
said act shall continue and be in force,
except so far as the same may have been
changed by the revised statutes of this State.
