That the number of *extra* Maine youngsters who will need schools and teachers six years from now. The first group has already come to school. The others are in the play-pens and riding kiddie-cars. But they've been born, and it won't be long before they'll want a school.

**You're a pretty important person**

If you "stand up" these boys and girls, nobody can take your place. They can't wait. The harm that's done will be permanent; you or anybody else can never undo it.

**Some things can't be hurried**

It takes time to build schools and make teachers. We're late already. We ought to have next fall 1650 new elementary teachers and 1600 new classrooms. By 1955, we'll need 9000 teachers, instead of the 6000 we now have, and at least 2500 new classrooms. Last year we graduated 169 elementary teachers and built 100 new classrooms.

Many promising young people say they avoid teaching because teachers don't get enough money to live like other people, and no matter how good their work is, they may have to leave town if they cross the wrong people.

## Security

Security of position has an appeal to most persons and it doesn't cost anything. Although we want to make the profession attractive, we don't want to attract the incompetent or the lazy. A 3-year contract would, we think, hasten the elimination of the mediocre and give greater protection to those who do good work.

## Pensions

Our retired teachers, since action by the Legislature in 1945, have received weekly pensions of \$7.70, \$9.61, and \$11.50, under the old law passed in 1913. These teachers were not affected by the retirement law passed at the last session.

State employees have received the cost of living adjustments since 1945. The cost of living has increased for our 656 pensioners too. We urge a \$300 increase in the pensions of each of these retired public servants. Their number is declining.
