To Edward L. Farwell, a Constable in the Town of Cumberland, in the County of Cumberland:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Cumberland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Town Hall, Cumberland Center, in said Town on Tuesday, March 1, 1938, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

- Article 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Article 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3 To hear and act upon the report of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

- Article 13 To see if the town will vote to fix a date when all taxes become due and payable, and interest charged thereafter.
- Article 14 To see what rate of interest will be fixed on unpaid taxes after due date.
- Article 15 To raise money for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- Article 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Greely Institute.
- Article 17 To raise money for repairs at Greely Institute on the Gymnasium.
- Article 18 To raise money for school house repairs.
- Article 19 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75. to install lights in the Valley School.

- Article 50 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to to used in the observance of Memorial Day services and appoint a committee to have charge of same.
- Article 51 To see what action the town will take regarding collection of garbage on Chebeague Island during the summer season, and raise and appropriate money for same.
- Article 52 To see what action the town will take regarding surface treatment on the improved section of the Island Special Road.
- Article 53 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money and authorize the Selectmen and Board of Health to employ a physician on Chebeague Island to attend to all matters pertaining to the enforcement of the laws relating to health, and also attend all persons requiring attention who are charges of the town.
- Article 54 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended in continuing the construction of a piece of road on Chebeague Island.
- Article 55 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for gypsy moth control.
- Article 56 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of the Town Hall.
- Article 57 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient amount of money to provide the Island voters boat transportation for the March Town Meeting.
- Article 58 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the repairs of the town wharf on Chebeague Island.

At a legal meeting duly notified and warned of the inhabitants of the Town of Cumberland on Tuesday, March 1, 1938, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the said inhabitants gave in their votes as follows, to wit:

Meeting called to order by Ernest A. Rand, Selectman, (in the absence of the Town Clerk) at nine o'clock and warrant read. It was voted to adjourn from the Town Hall to the Gymnasium of Greely Institute.

Action on articles taken as follows:

- Article 1 Voted that the Constable cast one vote for Herman P. Sweetser for Moderator and he was declared elected. Oath of office administered by Ernest A. Rand, Selectman.
- Article 2 Voted that Constable cast one vote for Wallace E. Brown for Town Clerk, Pro Tem, and he was declared elected. Oath of office administered by Moderator.
- Article 3 Voted to accept the report of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, as printed in Town Report.
- Article 4 Voted to pass over report of Treasurer for the time being.
- Article 5 Voted to accept the report of the Superintending School Committee as printed in Town Report.
- Article 6 Voted to accept the report of the Treasurer and Trustees of Greely Institute as printed in Town Report.
- Article 7 Voted to accept the report of the Cemetery Association as printed in Town Report.
- Article 8 Voted that Article 8 receive passage. It was then voted to adopt the following By-Law designated as Article 2, Section 19:
"It shall be the duty of the Selectmen to have erected on highways where they deem advisable, stop signs, school signs and other warning signs, if such signs are not erected by the State Highway Commission."

Article 9 Voted that Article 9 receive passage. It was then voted to adopt the following By-Law, designated as Article 1, Section 3, of the Town By-Laws, to read as follows:

"The number of Selectmen shall be three, one elected each year for three years. The officers to be elected by ballot shall be Moderator, Town Clerk, one Selectman for three-year term, three Assessors, three Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, one, two or three Road Commissioners, member of Superintending School Committee for three-year term, Town Agent, Fire Chief, two Constables and Tax Collector. The minor officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen."

It was voted to return to Article 4 at this time.

Article 4 Voted to accept the report of the Town Treasurer and Treasurer of Cumberland School Fund as printed.

Article 10 Voted that the salaries of Town Officers be the same as last year with the exception of Ballot Clerks who shall receive \$4.00 per day.

Article 11 Voted that the salaries of all other employees of the Town, including teams and trucks, be the same as paid by the State, except those who fight fires.

Voted to pay members of fire companies 50¢ per hour, and all inexperienced men receive 37¢ per hour for fighting woods and grass fires.

Article 12 Voted to elect two road commissioners, one on the mainland and one on the Island.

It was voted to dispense with the check list.

Article 12A To choose all other necessary officers.

- " 36 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money and authorize the Selectmen to employ a physician on Chebeague Island to attend to all matters pertaining to the enforcement of the laws relating to health, and also attend all persons requiring attention who are charges of the town.
- " 37 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor.
- " 38 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for aid to dependent children.
- " 39 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent expenses.
- " 40 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the observance of Memorial Day services and appoint a committee to have charge of same.
- " 41 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Cumberland Cemetery Association.
- " 42 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of town notes and bonds, and interest.
- " 43 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
- " 44 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of Town Hall.
- " 45 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the repairs of the Island wharf and float.

- Art. 46 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 47 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the protection and care of shade trees.
- Art. 48 To see if the town will vote to appropriate from the Contingent Account a sufficient amount of money to provide the Island voters boat transportation to the March Town Meeting.
- " 49 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure temporary loan or loans, in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- " 50 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors and Treasurer of the town to execute and deliver quit claim deeds of the town for property held by it under tax deeds and which may be sold by them to such persons as may purchase the same, and for such consideration as such Board of Assessors and Treasurer may deem advisable and for the best interest of the town.
- " 51 To hear and act upon any other business that may come before this town meeting.

NOTICE

To the Owners and Operators of Motor Vehicles Proceeding in or through the Town of Cumberland

The following By-Laws and Ordinances respecting the operation of vehicles were adopted by the Inhabitants of the Town of Cumberland at the annual Town Meeting, held on Tuesday, March 1st, 1949, and the adjournment thereof, and will take effect one week after the date of posting and publication, as provided by Chapter 80, Section 83-X of the Revised Statutes of Maine and by said By-Laws and Ordinances.

By-Laws and Ordinances of the Town of Cumberland

Article II

Sec. 5 Regulations of Travel on Roads and Highways.

a. Whoever shall haul or move over any street or public way in the town any building or other large object of a width greater than eight feet or of a height greater than twelve feet, six inches, without first obtaining a written permit from the Selectmen to do so, shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

b. Every vehicle approaching any of the following described highways and roads within the Town shall come to a full stop before entering within the limits of the road or way:

Foreside Road

New State Highway, now Routel, from Portland to Yarmouth.

Middle Road from Falmouth Town Line to Tuttle Road.

Middle Road from Tuttle Road to Yarmouth Line.

Tuttle Road from Foreside Road to Route 1.

Tuttle Road from Route 1 to Main Street.

Greely Road from Middle Road to County Road.

Blanchard Road

County Road from Falmouth Town Line to West Falmouth Road.

West Falmouth Road from Falmouth Town Line to County Road.

County Road, including Main Street, from West Falmouth Road to North Yarmouth Town Line.

Ridge Road and Range Road from Blanchard Road to Gray Road.

Blackstrap Road from Falmouth Town Line to Gray Road.

Skillings Road.

Gray Road.

c. Every vehicle proceeding along the County Road shall reduce speed to twenty-five miles an hour before entering the intersection of the West Falmouth Roads and the County Road.

d. Every vehicle approaching the intersection of the Tuttle Road and the new State Highway from Portland to Yarmouth over either the Tuttle Road or the State Highway shall obey the traffic light now established, and shall stop when either the red or the yellow light is against it before entering the intersection and may proceed cautiously only when the green light is on.

e. Every vehicle proceeding along Main Street, Tuttle Road and Blanchard Road within one half mile of the intersection of said roads shall do so at a speed not to exceed twenty-five miles an hour.

- f. The operator or driver of every vehicle violating any of the provisions of sub-sections b, c, d and e of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.
- g. The provisions of this Section shall take effect one week after posting and publication as provided by law.

Article III

FIRE DEPARTMENT AND FIRE ORDINANCES

Sec. 5 Ordinances.

- c. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive any vehicle or any conveyance over fire hose at any time except upon the specific order of the Chief or Officer of the Fire Department in command where the hose is being used.
- d. It shall be unlawful for any person to park any vehicle in a manner that will obstruct the entrance to any fire station, or to obstruct the entrance to any fire station in any other manner.
- e. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle or place on a public way any obstruction within ten feet of any fire hydrant or fire plug.
- g. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to pass a piece of fire apparatus on its way to a fire without specific order from the Fire Department Officer in charge of the apparatus.
