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INLAND FISH AND GAME LAWS

This pamphlet contains an abstract of the fish and game laws as contained in Chapter 38 of the Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931, also all rules and regulations of the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game adopted up to the time of going to press.

All laws, and rules and regulations of the Commissioner, which apply to fishing in inland waters of the state, have been collected and arranged alphabetically by counties, beginning on page 17. At the end of each paragraph will be found a reference to the year and chapter number of the law quoted, or the letters (R. & R.), which refer to rules and regulations.

Abstract of Fish and Game Laws

Unless otherwise specified, the sections referred to in this book refer to Chapter 38 of the Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931.

"R. & R." refers to Rules and Regulations of the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game.

Sec. 3. Rules and Regulations continued in force. (1929, c. 332.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game is authorized to continue in force rules heretofore established relating to the protection of fish and game. He shall promulgate and continue in effect for four years from July 7, 1929, such of the rules and regulations of the department of inland fisheries and game as he deems necessary for the protection and preservation of the fish and game of this state.

Sec. 4. Rules and Regulations, promulgation of. (1929, c. 331, sec. 3.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game may hold hearings, upon petition of the municipal officers or towns, when lands or waters to be affected lie therein, or upon petition of the county commissioners, when said lands or waters lie in unorganized townships; and the commissioner, upon the evidence given, may regulate the times, places and circumstances within which wild birds, wild animals, and inland fish may be hunted, fished for, and taken.

Sec. 4-A. Commissioner empowered to make special rules and regulations. (1931, c. 233, sec. 1.) Full and exclusive power to make all necessary special rules and regulations relative to the protection and conservation of fish in the inland waters of the various counties of the state and to establish and regulate game sanctuaries is hereby conferred on the commissioner of inland fisheries and game with the advice and consent of the advisory council.

Sec. 4-B. Procedure to be followed. (1931, c. 233, sec. 2.) The commissioner, whenever he shall deem it for the best interests of the state, after due notice and public hearing in the county to be affected, may regulate the times and places in which, and number and size of the fish to be taken, and the manner in which inland fish may be taken, which regulation shall be effective until changed by said commissioner, or by the legislature; and in the same manner may establish and regulate game sanctuaries. But no rules and regulations shall be made inconsistent with the general laws of the state. Said commissioner may, with the advice

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and consent of said council, from time to time, modify or repeal such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary or proper for the protection and preservation of the inland fish of the state. Said commissioner shall file in the offices of the clerks of the towns in the locality affected, a copy of the rules and regulations made as aforesaid, and publish the same three weeks successively in a newspaper published or printed in the county, or if no paper is so published, then in the state paper and, if practicable, post on the banks of the waters to be affected, as nearly as may be, like notices; and whenever any such rules or regulations apply to any unorganized township a like copy shall be filed with the clerk of courts for that county; said commissioner shall, immediately upon the adoption of any such rules and regulations contemplated by this section, file an attested copy of the same in the office of the secretary of state.

Sec. 6. Penalty for wilful defacement of notice of Commissioner. (1917, c. 219, sec. 4.) Whoever wilfully mutilates, defaces, or destroys any notice, rule, or regulation of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, posted in conformity with the provisions of this chapter, shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars.

Sec. 7. Copies of Fish and Game Laws. (1929, c. 331, sec. 65.) Copies of fish and game laws shall be furnished by the commissioner to town clerks and agents, authorized to issue licenses.

Sec. 8. Fishways. (1929, c. 331, sec. 5.) The commissioner may order construction of fishways, or repairs thereto, in any dam or other artificial obstruction above tidewater in any inland waters frequented by migratory fish.

Sec. 9. Fish and Game culture. (1929, c. 331, sec. 6, 1931, c. 82.) The commissioner, after a hearing, may set apart, for a term not exceeding ten years, any inland waters for fish culture; he may cause the destruction of mink therein. He may grant permits for the transportation of live game. He may issue permits and licenses to persons, firms or corporations to engage in the business of propagating game birds, game, or fur bearing animals, upon the payment of an annual fee of five dollars.

Sec. 9-A. State game farm established. (1931, c. 173.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game is hereby authorized to purchase suitable lands and erect buildings thereon in this state for experimental work in the propagation of game birds and game animals for restocking the woods and forests of the state.

Sec. 11. Fish screens. (1929, c. 331, sec. 8.) The commissioner may authorize, alter, and remove the screening of any inland waters, and may prohibit fishing within five hundred yards of any screen installed by authority of the department or of the legislature.

CIVIL SERVICE

Secs. 13-A to 13-H inclusive provide for the appointment of three members of the Advisory Council to act as a Civil Service Commission to draw up a code which will provide for civil service examinations for permanent employees of the department of inland fisheries and game in the game warden service and in the fish hatchery service.

All game wardens and fish hatchery employees in permanent service with the department at the time this law goes into effect (July 3, 1931) shall be considered as if appointed under such civil service.

Open, competitive examinations for testing the fitness of applicants for permanent employment in the game warden service and the fish hatchery service shall be given. Such examinations shall be practical in their character, and so far as may be shall relate to those matters which will fairly test the relative capacity and fitness of the persons examined to discharge the duties of the service into which they seek to be appointed.

Notice of the time and the place of examination shall be published in the state paper, and also in some newspaper in the locality or county where a vacancy is to be filled, and examinations shall be conducted under the direction and supervision of the commissioner or deputy commissioner. (1931, c. 237.)

Sec. 14. Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Police Officers and Constables. (1929, c. 331, sec. 11.) Sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, police officers and constables have the same powers and fees as inland fish and game wardens.

Sec. 15. Registration of Guides. (1929, c. 331, sec. 12.) No person shall engage in the business of guiding, either for inland fishing or forest or shore hunting, until he has procured a certificate to do so from the commissioner.

Sec. 16. Application for registration of Guides. Fees. (1929, c. 331, sec. 13.) Application for registration shall be made to the commissioner. A fee of one dollar shall be paid annually for a resident guide's license. Non-residents may be licensed for restricted areas upon payment of a fee of twenty dollars.

Until, and including, December 31, 1931, guides shall be registered as general or local guides; and the commissioner may, for

cause shown, after due notice and hearing, cancel any registration by him made, and may advance anyone from the local class to the general class, whenever he shall deem such person qualified to be a general guide.

On and after January 1, 1932, guides shall be registered as Class A or Class B guides, a Class A rating to carry a higher rank as to proficiency and experience than a Class B rating; and the commissioner may, at his discretion, promote or demote guides from one class to another, and may, for cause shown, after due notice and hearing, cancel any registration by him made. (1931, c. 106.)

Sec. 17. Sporting Camps. (1917, c. 219, sec. 16.) Sporting camps, in unorganized townships in the Maine Forestry District, shall pay an annual license fee of \$5.00. Lease of land on which camps are located shall be filed with application for license, and such reports shall be filed annually as shall be required by the commissioner. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall pay a fine of \$50.00 and costs for each offense.

Sec. 18. Terms "Closed Season," "Open Season," "Tributaries," etc., defined. (1917, c. 219, sec. 17.) The words "closed season" mean the time or period during which it is unlawful to hunt, pursue, shoot, wound, trap, or destroy any bird or animal, or fish for or catch any fish, and the words "open season" mean the time during which it shall be lawful to take these animals, fish and birds as specified and limited by law. The words "tributary" and "tributaries" wherever used in this chapter shall be construed to mean brooks or streams flowing directly or indirectly into a lake or pond or into another brook or stream, and one great pond or lake shall not be construed as a tributary to another great pond or lake.

Sec. 19. Fishing licenses. (1929, c. 331, sec. 14. 1931, cc. 147, 184, 191.) No resident of the state over sixteen years of age and no non-resident over the age of ten years shall fish in any inland waters of the state except in accordance with the following provisions:

(1) Any resident of the state and his immediate family may, without license, fish in open waters in accordance with the laws of the state, on land owned by him, on which he is actually domiciled, and which is used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

(2) Each resident of the state and each non-resident shall purchase from the commissioner or his authorized agent the written license of the commissioner, which shall be kept upon the person while fishing or transporting fish, and shall be exhibited to any warden, employee of this department, or guide, upon re-

quest. All employees and soldiers regularly employed at the National Soldiers' Home shall be, and hereby are, classified as residents of this state for the purpose of obtaining fishing licenses, and shall pay the same fee and be held to the same laws, rules and regulations as residents of this state. The clerks of all towns are such authorized agents and for the issuance of non-resident licenses the commissioner may, subject to recall at his pleasure, designate additional agents. License shall be issued to a **resident** by the clerk of the town in which he resides, or if he is domiciled in an unorganized place, then by the clerk of the nearest town, upon payment of a fee of sixty-five cents, of which fifteen cents shall be retained by the town clerk.

(Resident licenses annual, beginning Jan. 1, 1932. See sec. 109 on p. 112.)

(3) **Non-resident** licenses shall be of two classes, a month license to cost three dollars and fifteen cents, effective for thirty days from the date thereof, and a season license, effective for the entire season, to cost five dollars and fifteen cents, but the amount paid for a month license shall be credited on the purchase of a year license; also a junior non-resident license, which shall be a season license covering all non-residents between the ages of ten and fourteen years, inclusive, to cost one dollar and fifteen cents. Fifteen cents shall be retained by the agent.

(4) Each season license shall expire on December thirty-first of the calendar year in which it is issued. Each agent shall on the first of each month forward to the commissioner, the net funds by him collected, together with a report containing a list of the persons to whom he has issued licenses since last report, the class of each license; and said funds shall be promptly forwarded to the state treasurer.

(5) No person shall offer to a carrier and no carrier shall accept for carriage or shipment any fish except upon exhibition of the license either in person by the licensee or accompanied by writing signed by the licensee and requesting the shipment, which writing the carrier shall retain until the end of the calendar year for inspection and use by the department.

(6) Upon conviction of any person for any violation of the laws relating to fishing, the commissioner may revoke the license of such person, and upon a second or subsequent conviction may prevent the issuance of a license to the person convicted for not more than two years in addition to the year in which the violation occurs. Failure to produce a license within a reasonable time shall be prima facie evidence of the violation of this section. The

commissioner may refuse to issue any fishing license for a period of six months after a conviction for any violation of the laws relating to fishing by a person not holding a fishing license at the time of such violation.

(7) The funds collected by agents shall constitute a propagation fund so-called, to be expended under the direction of the commissioner for the sole purpose of the propagation and distribution of fish in the inland waters of Maine and facilities therefor. Said fund shall not lapse from year to year, but funds so collected in any one year may be used in that or any succeeding years for said purpose.

Sec. 20. Possession of fishing gear prima facie evidence of violation by non-resident. (1917, c. 66, sec. 7.) The possession of any fishing tackle in the fields or forests or on the waters or ice of the state by any non-resident who is not licensed so to fish, shall be prima facie evidence of fishing in violation of the laws of this state.

General Fishing Laws

(See 1917, c. 219, sec. 18; 1919, c. 196; 1921, c. 73; 1925, c. 71; 1927, c. 194; 1929, c. 350. See other amendments noted in text.)

Sec. 21. OPEN SEASONS. All pools (1931, c. 52) connected with state fish hatcheries and feeding stations shall be closed to fishing at all times. Except as otherwise provided in Chapter 38 of the Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931, and in rules and regulations of the commissioner (arranged by counties beginning on page 17 of this pamphlet) there shall be an annual **open season** on the particular kind of fish specified, as follows:

LAKES AND PONDS, OPEN SEASONS

On Sea Salmon, Landlocked Salmon, Trout and Togue, from the time the ice is out in the spring until September thirtieth, both days inclusive; **on White Perch,** from June twenty-first to September twenty-ninth, both days inclusive; provided, however, that any person who catches a white perch while lawfully trolling in good faith for landlocked salmon, trout, or togue, during closed season on white perch, may lawfully keep the same, but no person shall in one day keep more than six white perch so caught; provided, further, that no party, or the occupants of any boat, canoe, raft or other vessel or conveyance shall keep more than six white perch so caught in any one day.

On Black Bass, from June twenty-first to September thirtieth, both days inclusive, except that not more than three black bass in any one day may be caught by fly fishing, so-called, from the first day of June to the twentieth day of June, both days inclusive.

RIVERS, ABOVE TIDE WATERS, OPEN SEASONS

On Sea Salmon, Landlocked Salmon, Trout, and Togue, from the time the ice is out in the spring until September fourteenth, both days inclusive.

On Black Bass, from June twenty-first to September thirtieth, both days inclusive, except that not more than three black bass in any one day may be caught by fly fishing, so-called, from the first day of June to the twentieth day of June, both days inclusive.

On White Perch, from June twenty-first to September fourteenth, both days inclusive.

BROOKS AND STREAMS, ABOVE TIDE WATERS OPEN SEASONS

On Sea Salmon, from the time the ice is out in the spring until September fourteenth, both days inclusive.

On White Perch, from June twenty-first to September fourteenth, both days inclusive.

On Togue, from the time the ice is out in the spring until September thirtieth, both days inclusive.

On Trout and Landlocked Salmon, from the time the ice is out in the spring until August fifteenth, both days inclusive.

On Black Bass, from June twenty-first to September thirtieth, both days inclusive, except that not more than three black bass in any one day may be caught by fly fishing, so-called, from the first day of June to the twentieth day of June, both days inclusive.

Provided that it shall be lawful to fish in accordance with the general law of the state, or in accordance with private and special laws now or hereinafter enacted, or with regulations of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, promulgated in accordance with law, in the rivers of the state and in (1925, c. 71) Kennebec Stream, Rangeley Stream, and Little Kennebec Stream in Franklin County, and in Carrabasset River, so-called, and tributaries in Franklin and Somerset Counties, in Cupsuptic Stream and Cupsuptic River, so-called, the river at Upper Dam, Rapid River, so-called, the tributaries to the Magalloway River, the tributaries to Aziscohos Lake except Twin Brooks, and the outlet of Lake Penneesseewassee, situated wholly or partly in Oxford County, in Cobbosseecontee Stream in Kennebec County, in the inlet of Kokadjo River, Sourdnhunk Stream, Davis Stream, a tributary to Sebec Lake in Piscataquis County, and the East Outlet of Moosehead Lake, the West Outlet of Moosehead Lake, the outlet of Dobsis Lake in Grand Lake Stream in Washington County, in Belgrade Stream in Kennebec County, and (1927, c. 182) in the tributaries to Upper Shin Pond and the tributaries to Sebocis River in Penobscot County.

ICE FISHING

During **February, March and April** in the counties of Aroostook, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Somerset, Washington, and Hancock, and during **February and March** in the counties of Androscoggin, Kennebec, Sagadahoc, Knox, Lincoln, Waldo, Cumberland, Oxford, and Franklin; and from December 16th to the last day of February, both days inclusive (1931, c. 277, sec. 45)

in the county of York, citizens of the state and non-residents licensed as provided by law may fish for and take **landlocked salmon, trout, togue, and white perch** in waters open to ice fishing, with not more than five set lines to each family when fishing through the ice in the day time and when under the immediate personal supervision of the person fishing, and may convey them to their homes for consumption therein, but not otherwise.

Provided, however, that it shall be unlawful to fish through the ice at any time for any other species of fish except as hereinafter provided:

During the months of December, January, February, and March (1931, c. 269) **pickerel** may be taken through the ice in waters open to ice fishing for landlocked salmon, trout, togue, and white perch, with not more than five set lines to each person, when fishing through the ice in the daytime and when under the immediate personal supervision of the person fishing. Provided, however, that the provisions of this paragraph shall not affect any waters on which a special ice fishing season has been established by law or by rules and regulations of the department of inland fisheries and game. (See special ice fishing season in York Co.)

Sec. 22. Size of fish and weight of catch limited. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.) During the respective closed seasons on the above-named fish no person shall fish for, take, catch, or kill, or have any of them in possession; provided, further, that no person shall in any one day during the respective open seasons herein provided take or catch and kill or have in possession at any time, more than fifteen pounds in all of **landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch, and black bass**, unless one individual fish caught shall weigh more than fifteen pounds, or unless the last fish caught increases the combined weight thereof to more than fifteen pounds, and provided, further, that no person in any one day shall take, catch, and kill, or have in possession at any time more than twenty-five fish in all of **landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch, and black bass** even though the twenty-five fish caught and killed weigh less than fifteen pounds; provided, further, that no **landlocked salmon** less than twelve inches in length, no **trout or white perch** less than six inches in length, and no **black bass** less than ten inches in length shall be caught and killed or had in possession by any person at any time, (except as provided in Chapter 38 of the Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931, or by rules and regulations of the commissioner, arranged by counties beginning on page 17 of this pamphlet.)

Sec. 23. Penalty for violation of sections 21 and 22 of Chapter 38 of the Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931, (which

said sections contain all special laws relating to fishing.) Whoever violates any provision of sections twenty-one and twenty-two of chapter thirty-eight of the Revised Statutes shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more than thirty dollars, and costs of prosecution, for each offense; and in addition thereto one dollar for each fish taken, caught, killed or had in possession in violation of any provision of said sections.

Sec. 25. Number of lines limited. (1917, c. 219, sec. 20, 1927, c. 114.) No person shall in any manner, except when fishing through the ice, fish with more than two lines at any time. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense.

Sec. 26. Sale of certain fish prohibited; penalty. (1919, c. 68.) Whoever by himself, his clerk, servant, or agent, directly or indirectly, sells or purchases any landlocked salmon, trout, togue, black bass or white perch, shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more than thirty dollars, and costs of prosecution, for each offense, and in addition thereto one dollar for each fish sold, purchased or had in possession in violation of this section. Provided, however, that white perch taken by means of hook and line in Grand Lake, the outlet of which is Grand Lake Stream, Junior Lake, Compass Lake and Dobsis Lake, in the counties of Washington and Penobscot, and all other lakes and ponds whose outlets empty into any of the above named lakes, and black bass taken by means of hook and line in Round Pond and in Pennamaquam Lake, in Charlotte, in the county of Washington, may be sold and transported, within or without this state, in such quantities and under such rules and regulations as the commissioner of inland fisheries and game may establish.

Sec. 27. Fishing for gain or hire prohibited; penalty. (1917, c. 219, sec. 23.) Whoever shall, for the whole or any part of the time, engage in the business or occupation of fishing on any of the inland waters of the state above tidewaters, for landlocked salmon, togue, trout, black bass, pickerel, or white perch, for gain or hire, shall for every such offense pay a fine of fifty dollars and costs.

Sec. 28. Certain implements and devices prohibited; penalty. (1921, c. 218, sec. 2.) Whoever uses any dynamite or any other explosive or poisonous or stupefying substance at any time for the purpose of destroying any kind of fish or whoever takes, kills or destroys any kind of fish at any time with any

dynamite or other explosive or poisonous or stupefying substance, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars and costs for each offense or shall be imprisoned two months.

Whoever fishes for, takes, catches, kills, or destroys any fish, with fish spawn, or grapple, spear, trawl, weir, gaff, seine, trap, (or set lines, except when fishing through the ice, and then with not more than five set lines to a family in the day time, or five set lines to a person during December, January, February, and March when fishing for pickerel), or takes any kind of fish, except suckers, eels, hornpouts, yellow perch, white fish, and cusk, as hereinafter provided, with any device or in any other way than by the ordinary mode of angling with single-baited hook and line, artificial flies, artificial minnows, artificial insects, spoon-hooks, and spinners, so-called, shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more than thirty dollars, and costs of prosecution, for each offense; and in addition thereto one dollar for each fish taken, caught, killed, or had in possession in violation of any provision of this section; and when any of the above named prohibited implements, devices, or substances are found in use or possession they are forfeit and contraband and any person finding them in use may destroy them.

Sec. 29. Taking of Smelts, Minnows, and other bait fish, White Fish, Cusk, and Suckers; penalty. (1929, c. 362, 1931, cc. 220; 277, sec. 61.) It shall be lawful to take smelts in all the inland waters of the state above tide waters with a dipnet in the usual and ordinary way, and to catch them through the ice in the day time with single hook and line, at any time, in waters open to ice fishing, but they shall not be taken for sale, or sold at any time, except for bait for fishing in this state.

Provided, however, it shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any smelt at any time, by any means, within an area beginning at tide water and extending to a point one-half mile above the same, in any of the fresh water brooks, streams or rivers and branches thereof which flow directly into tidewater; except smelts may be taken in the day time with hook and line in the ordinary manner.

(See Sebago Lake in Cumberland County, Swan Lake in Waldo County, and Bryant Pond in Oxford County for special smelt regulations; and notice also that it is unlawful to take smelts with a net in all the inland waters of York County, or in any lake or its tributaries in Androscooggin County; these special provisions being set forth in section 29, chapter 38, Revised Statutes, Biennial Revision of 1931.)

It shall be lawful to take minnows and other fish usually used for bait for fishing, in all the inland waters of the state, and to sell the same for bait for fishing only in this state; and it shall be lawful to catch white fish with single hook and line at any time, in all the inland waters of the state, but they shall not be taken at night with set lines; and white fish and cusk may be taken, by means of nets, for food purposes only in the family of the person taking the same, in such waters as the commissioner of inland fisheries and game may deem advisable, and under such conditions, rules and regulations as he may establish; and it shall be lawful to catch cusk at any time in waters open to ice fishing with not more than five set lines to each family when fishing through the ice and when under the immediate personal supervision of the person fishing; and it shall be lawful to take suckers with spears, in all the inland waters of the state during April and May of each year.

Sec. 30. Taking of Eels, Suckers, Hornpouts, Yellow Perch, and Alewives; permits for same; penalty. (1923, c. 68.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game may grant permits to take suckers, eels, hornpouts, and yellow perch, by means of eel pots, traps, spears, or nets, in inland waters frequented by these fish, under such terms, rules and regulations as he may establish, but no exclusive territory permits shall be granted for the taking of any of said fish in any inland waters.

Provided, further, that said commissioner may grant permits to take alewives in the inland waters of the state under such rules and regulations as he may establish.

It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, kill, destroy, have in possession, offer for transportation, or transport any alewives, suckers, eels, hornpouts, or yellow perch in violation of any provision of this section, under a penalty of thirty dollars and costs for each offense.

Sec. 31. Weight of Salmon, Trout, Togue, White Perch, and Black Bass, to be transported, limited; regulations; penalty. (1917, c. 219, sec. 28.) No person shall transport more than fifteen pounds of landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch, or black bass in all in any one day, nor shall any corporation or common carrier transport more than fifteen pounds in all, of landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch, or black bass in any one day as the property of one person, but nothing herein contained shall prevent any person, corporation, or common carrier from transporting one fish weighing more than fifteen pounds; nor shall any such be transported except in the possession of the owner

thereof, plainly labeled with the owner's name and residence, and open to view, except as is provided in the following section. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense, and in addition thereto one dollar for every pound of fish being transported in violation of any provision of this section; and all such fish being so transported in violation of this section shall be seized and shall be forfeited to the state; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prohibit any person having less than twenty-five fish weighing in all less than fifteen pounds from transporting one additional fish, nor prohibit any transportation company from transporting said additional fish under the conditions prescribed in this section for the transportation of fish; provided, further, that this section shall not apply to white perch and black bass excepted from the general law and transported as provided in section twenty-six.

Sec. 32. Authority of licensee to transport fish. (1917, c. 66, sec. 2.) All licenses issued to non-residents shall entitle the purchaser thereof to take fish in the inland waters of this state and transport the same during the period covered by said license in accordance with the laws of the state. The purchaser of a license to fish may offer for transportation and have transported in accordance with the provisions of this chapter fish which he has legally in possession by exhibiting his license to the agent of a transportation company, who shall endorse upon the back thereof, in ink, the name of the station from which said shipment is made, the date of shipment, the destination and weight of each kind of fish shipped, and such shipment shall have affixed thereto a tag plainly marked with the name and address of the shipper, the license number and the kind and weight of such fish. If a license is presented with a consignment of fish and the endorsement on said license shows that the holder of the license is not authorized by law to offer such fish for shipment, such agent shall refuse to accept the same for shipment.

(See sec. 19, par. (5), no shipment of fish to be made without exhibition of license, etc.)

Sec. 33. Owner to accompany fish; exception; penalty. (1923, c. 123. 1931, c. 277, sec. 33.) No landlocked salmon, trout, togue, black bass, or white perch shall be carried or transported in any way except in the possession of the owner, accompanied by him, plainly labeled with the owner's name and address, and open to view, except any person who has lawfully in his possession one landlocked salmon, one trout, one togue, one black bass, or one white perch, or ten pounds of any kind of these fish,

may transport the same to his home, provided the same is shipped in his own name, or to any hospital in this state, without accompanying the shipment, by purchasing of an agent duly appointed therefor by the commissioner of inland fisheries and game a transportation tag, paying for a landlocked salmon, trout, togue, or black bass one dollar for each, or one dollar for each ten pounds of the same, and fifty cents for one white perch or ten pounds of the same; provided, however, that no person shall send more than one shipment of fish under a transportation tag, as provided in this section, once in five days, provided, however, that ten pounds of fish or one fish taken legally in Moosehead Lake or in any other waters in Piscataquis County may be sent as herein provided under a transportation tag whenever the same are legally in possession of the shipper during the open season on said fish; provided, further, that ten pounds of fish or one fish taken legally in Rangeley Lake, Mooselucmeguntic Lake, Cupsuptic Lake, Upper Richardson Lake, so-called, or Lower Richardson Lake, so-called, may be sent as herein provided under a transportation tag only once in one year; provided, further, that fifteen pounds of fish taken legally in the Belgrade chain of lakes, so-called, comprised of Great, Long, Little, Ellis, McGraw, East and North Ponds, may be sent as herein provided under a transportation tag only once in two weeks during the open season on said fish. Provided, further, that this section shall not apply to white perch and black bass excepted from the general law and transported as provided in section twenty-six. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense, and in addition thereto one dollar for each pound of fish transported in violation of any provision of this section.

Sec. 34. Stocking of lakes and streams without permission of commissioner prohibited; penalty. (1917, c. 219, sec. 30.) Whoever introduces fish of any kind into any of the waters of the state by means of live fish or otherwise, except upon written permission of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, shall pay a fine of not less than fifty dollars, nor more than five hundred dollars.

Sec. 35. Tolling by means of "Advance Baiting" prohibited; penalty. (1917, c. 219, sec. 31.) Whoever deposits any meat, bones, dead fish or parts of the same, or other food for fish, in any of the inland waters of the state, for the purpose of luring fish known as "advance baiting," shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, nor more than thirty dollars and costs of prosecution, for each offense.

Sec. 36. Deposit of slabs, edgings and sawdust. (1925, c. 174, 1931, c. 125.) No person or corporation shall place or deposit in inland waters, or on the banks thereof, in such manner that the same shall fall or be washed into such waters any slabs, edgings, sawdust, chips, bark, mill waste, shavings or fibrous materials created in the manufacture of lumber or other wood products, or so deposit any oil regardless of its source.

Any person, firm or corporation believing it to be necessary in the prosecution of its business to so deposit any of the materials mentioned in the preceding paragraph, may make application to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game and the commissioner of health, who shall give notice thereof and hold a hearing, and shall have authority to issue such permit as they deem advisable and necessary, or to deny such petition.

The following rivers and their branches are exempted from the provisions of the preceding paragraphs: Salmon Falls river, Mousam river, Saco river, Presumpscot river, Androscoggin river, Kennebec river, Penobscot river, St. Croix river and St. John river, and Fish river. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall pay a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs for each offense.

The commissioner of inland fisheries and game and the forest commissioner shall have authority, upon petition of twenty-five citizens of this state, and after notice and hearing, to promulgate rules and regulations prohibiting the pollution of any of the brooks, streams, or rivers in this state with slabs, edgings, sawdust, etc. Whoever violates any provision of any rules and regulations of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game and the forest commissioner promulgated by virtue of this section, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars and costs for each offense.

Sec. 37. Cultivation of useful fish by individuals. (1917, c. 219, sec. 33.) Any riparian proprietor may, within the limits of his own premises, enclose the waters of a stream not navigable, for the cultivation of useful fishes; provided that he furnishes suitable passages for migratory fishes naturally frequenting such waters, and does not obstruct the passage of boats and other craft and materials, in places where the same have a right to pass. Any person legally engaged in the artificial culture and maintenance of fishes, may take them in his own enclosed waters wherein the same are so cultivated and maintained, and when he pleases, and may at all times sell, ship, or transport them from his own pools or ponds, without accompanying the shipment, having first

procured a license therefor and tagged said fish in accordance with the rules and regulations established by the commissioner of inland fisheries and game.

Sec. 38. Penalty for fishing in private ponds without permission of owners. (1917, c. 219, sec. 34.) No person without permission of the proprietor, shall fish in that portion of a pond or other water in which fish are artificially cultivated or maintained, under a penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, besides two dollars for each fish so taken or killed; and, in default of payment, such offender shall be imprisoned at the expense of the prosecutor, until said forfeiture is paid or he is otherwise discharged by due process of law.

Sec. 39. Jurisdiction of commissioner. (1917, c. 219, sec. 35; 1923, c. 213.) The provisions of the fish laws, so far as they relate to fish of all varieties and fishways, apply to fish and fishways down to tide waters. All sea salmon, shad, alewives, and smelts that migrate from the ocean into fresh water shall be under the concurrent jurisdiction of the sea and shore fisheries and the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, wherever found.

Androscoggin County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Androscoggin County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Smelts. It is unlawful to take smelts with a dip-net in any lake or its tributaries in Androscoggin County, at any time, except that smelts under six inches in length, to be kept alive for bait purposes, may be taken in all Androscoggin waters. (1931, c. 277, sec. 61.)

Androscoggin Lake, in Leeds (also partly in Wayne, Kennebec Co.): It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in said lake. No suckers, eels, hornpouts or yellow perch shall be taken by any means other than by hook and line in said lake, or in the immediate outlet thereof; provided that the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to Dead River, the outlet of said lake, partly in Androscoggin Co. and partly in Kennebec Co. (R. & R.)
Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: No suckers, eels, hornpouts or yellow perch shall be taken by any means other than by hook and line in any brook or stream tributary to Androscoggin Lake. (R. & R.)

Auburn Lake: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Lake Auburn, with the exception of Townsend Brook (see Townsend Brook for regulations) are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Beals Pond: See Pickerel Pond.

Bear Pond, in Turner (also partly in Hartford, Oxford Co.): It is unlawful to catch more than fifteen white perch in any one day. (1923, c. 36.)

Bear Ponds, Big and Little, in Turner (also partly in Hartford, Oxford Co.):

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (1929, c. 344.)

Boğ Brook, in Mechanic Falls and Minot: Open to ice fishing for pickerel and yellow perch only, between Hawk's Pond and the Little Androscoggin River, in accordance with the general laws. (R. & R.)

Boğ Brook, in Minot (also in Hebron, Oxford Co.), and the **tributaries** to said brook: Open under the provisions of the general law, from the time the ice is out until July 1st. (1925, c. 2.)

Branch Brook and its Tributaries, in Durham: Closed to trout fishing at all times from its source to Harrington Bridge, so-called. In other parts of said brook it is lawful to fish for trout on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week during the open season on brooks provided by the general law. Daily limit, fifteen fish per person; weight limit, ten pounds. (1927, c. 97.)

Hooper Pond, in Greene: Closed to all fishing from Oct. 1st to the time the ice goes out. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Jerry Brook and its Tributaries: See Thompson Pond Tributaries.

Long Pond Tributaries, which pond is situated in Livermore. Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Hill Pond, in East Livermore: Closed to all fishing, except that residents of this state may fish through the ice during January, February and March in accordance with the general law. (P. & S. L. 1921, c. 42, as amended by P. & S. L. 1925, c. 8.)

Newell Brook and its Tributaries in Durham, from its source to the bridge on the highway leading from South Durham to West Durham, known as the Bliss Bridge, is closed to trout fishing at all times. In other parts of said brook it is lawful to fish for trout on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week during the open season on brooks provided by the general law. Daily limit, fifteen fish per person; weight limit, ten pounds. (1927, c. 97.)

Pickerel Pond, in Turner (known as Beals Pond): **Tributaries** closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Round Pond Tributaries, which pond is situated in Livermore: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Taylor Pond, in Auburn: Closed to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 31.)

Taylor Pond Tributaries, which pond is situated in Auburn: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Thompson Pond (also in Cumberland and Oxford Cos.): the open season on landlocked salmon, trout and togue is from January 1st to August 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Bag limit on togue, not more than five togue, or not more than eight pounds of togue, unless the last togue taken increases the combined weight thereof to more than eight pounds. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: The tributaries to Thompson Pond (including Jerry Brook and its tributaries) are closed to all fishing except that it shall be lawful to take suckers in said waters during the month of May as provided in the general law. (R. & R.)

Townsend Brook, a tributary to Lake Auburn: Closed to all fishing from a point five rods below the bridge on the North Auburn road to the bridge on the discontinued road running from the Waterman road and the schoolhouse at the end thereof, to Dillingham Hill. (R. & R.)

Aroostook County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Aroostook County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Allagash River Tributaries: Open to fly fishing, under the general laws, for landlocked salmon and trout, from August 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1927, c. 177.)

Allen Brook, a tributary to Prestile Stream, in Westfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Bear Mountain Pond, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Beaver Dam Brook: See Whitney Brook.

Bradford Pond, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Cary Lake, in Littleton: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Chase Brook, and all Tributaries thereto, in T. 13, R. 7, and in Portage: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cochran Lake, and all Tributaries thereto, in Smyrna and New Limerick: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Eagle Lake: Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

Green Pond, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Hale Pond, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Marshall Brook, a tributary to Prestile Stream, in Westfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Mosquito Brook, and all Tributaries thereto, in T. 13, R. 6, in T. 14, R. 7, and in Portage: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Mud Lake, in Moro Plantation (also in T. 6, R. 6, Penobscot Co.): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Palmer Brook, a tributary to Prestile Stream, in Westfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Lake, in Moro Plantation (also in T. 6, R. 6, Penobscot Co.): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Portage Lake, in Portage: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)
Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

Presque Isle Stream above Grindstone, in Chapman Plantation, and the **tributaries** to said stream, wherever situated (except the North Branch of said stream, commonly called the Mapleton Branch, the East Branch, and Burnt Land Brook) are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Prestile Stream Tributaries: Palmer Brook, Trueworthy Brook, Allen Brook, and Marshall Brook, tributaries to Prestile Stream, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Rockabema Lake, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Ross Lake, in Littleton: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Squa Pan Lake, Inlet Stream: The Inlet Stream of Squa Pan Lake, and the East Branch of said Inlet Stream above Thomas Thibodeau's lower landing, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Square Lake: Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

St. Croix River Tributaries: All tributaries to the St. Croix River, in the county of Aroostook, are closed to all fishing until July 15, 1933. (1931, c. 277, sec. 38.)

St. Froid Lake: Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

St. John River Tributaries, down as far as the west line of the plantation of St. Francis: Open to fly fishing for landlocked salmon and trout, under the general laws, from August 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 58.)

Toterod Pond, in Moro Plantation: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Trueworthy Brook, a tributary to Prestile Stream, in Westfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Whitney Brook, or Beaver Dam Brook, so-called, and all **tributaries** thereto, said brook being a tributary to Mattawamkeag Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Wyman Brook, and its Tributaries: Closed to all fishing until July 3, 1934. (1931, c. 277, sec. 15.)

Cumberland County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Cumberland County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Trout and Salmon. It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Anonymous Pond: See Crystal Lake.

Beaver Pond, Outlet, and Tributaries:

Beaver Pond: Bag limit, two trout or landlocked salmon, or one trout and one landlocked salmon. (R. & R.)

Beaver Pond Outlet, and tributaries thereto: Closed to all fishing except for suckers. (R. & R.)

Beaver Pond Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Carsley Brook, a tributary to Highland Lake, in Bridgton: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cold Spring Brook, in Standish and Gorham: Closed to all fishing above the bridge on the road leading from the residence of Charles A. Hayes to White Rock Station. (R. & R.)

Corn Shop Brook, in Gorham: Closed to all fishing above the bridge on the road near Corn factory owned by H. L. Forham Co. (R. & R.)

Crooked River and Tributaries, in Harrison, Otisfield and Naples. See Sebago Lake Tributaries.

Crystal Lake (Anonymous Pond), in Harrison: Closed to ice fishing. R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Duck Pond Tributaries: Closed to all fishing until July 13th, 1935 (1929, c. 357.)

Frost Gulley Brook and its Tributaries, in Freeport: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Greeley Brook, in Otisfield (also in Norway and Oxford, in Oxford County, and known in Norway as Lombard Brook), which brook empties into Thompson Lake at Oxford: Closed to all fishing until July 11, 1935. (1929, c. 360.)

Haggett Brook, in Gorham: See Reservoir Brook.

Hancock Lake: See Walden Lake.

Harvey Brook, or any of its Tributaries, in Pownal, above the forks of said brook, which forks are near the boundary line

of Pownal and Freeport: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

That part of **Harvey Brook** and its **tributaries** in Pownal which is above the forks, so-called, of said brook, said forks being near the boundary line of Pownal and Freeport, is closed to trout fishing at all times. In other parts of said brook and its tributaries it is lawful to fish for trout on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week during the open season on brooks provided by the general laws; daily limit, fifteen fish per person; weight limit, ten pounds. (1927, c. 97.)

Island Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Harrison, and in Waterford, Oxford Co.): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Kezar Pond, Lower, in Bridgton (also in Oxford County): Open to ice fishing for black bass and pickerel only. (R. & R.)

Closed season on white perch is from Dec. 1st to June 30th, inclusive; on trout and landlocked salmon from Oct. 1st to March 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

Long Pond: Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout is from Oct. 1st to March 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

Miller Brook, a tributary to Moose Pond, in Bridgton: Perpetual closed season. (1925, c. 22.)

North Branch Brook and Tributaries: North Branch Brook, and all tributaries thereto, in Gorham and Standish, and in Buxton, York County, are open to fishing under the general laws, with the following EXCEPTIONS, which are closed to all fishing, under rules and regulations:

Cold Spring Brook, in Standish and Gorham;

Corn Shop Brook, in Gorham;

North Branch Brook Headwaters, in Standish and Gorham;

Reservoir Brook (or **Haggett Brook**), in Gorham;

West Branch, in Buxton and Gorham.

(See above named brooks for regulations thereon.)

North Branch Brook Headwaters, in Standish and Gorham: Closed to all fishing above the bridge on the Shaw's Mill Road, at Shaw's Mill. (R. & R.)

Otter Pond, in Bridgton: Bag limit on pickerel, not more than twenty-five of said fish, or not more than fifteen pounds. (R. & R.)

Peabody Pond, in Naples, Sebago and Bridgton: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Pond Tributaries, in Otisfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Rattlesnake Pond, Little, in Raymond: Bag limit, not more than seven pounds in all of landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch and black bass. (R. & R.)

Reservoir (or **Haggett**) **Brook**, in Gorham: Closed to all fishing above the bridge on the road leading from the residence of Charles A. Hayes to Files Corner (said bridge being commonly known as the Henry Wescott bridge). (R. & R.)

Sabbathday Lake, in New Gloucester: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Still or plug fishing prohibited. Bag limit, not more than two trout or two landlocked salmon in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All of the tributaries, wherever situated, to Sabbathday Lake, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Sawyer's Brook, a tributary to Elkins Brook: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Sebago Lake: Smelts may be taken with single hook and line, in the daytime, for sale within the state, during January, February and March of each year; from April 1st to Dec. 31st, not exceeding twenty-five smelts per person per day may be taken in the daytime with single hook and line; it is unlawful to take smelts with a dip-net in Sebago Lake or its tributaries at any time, except that smelts under six inches in length, to be kept alive for bait purposes, may be taken in the Nason Brook so-called, at North Sebago and in that part of Crooked River in the towns of Naples and Casco, from its junction with Songo River up to the bridge on the Theodore Roosevelt highway. (1929, c. 362.)

Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout is from Oct. 1st to March 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

That part of Sebago Lake, or Songo River, so-called, between the bar opposite Thompson's Camps and Songo Lock, is closed to all fishing, except it shall be lawful to fish, in accordance with the general law of the state from May 1st until July 31st, of each year, from Thompson's Camps, so-called, up to the Oliver Camp, so-called. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing except Songo River, above Songo Lock, and except the portion of Crooked River and tributaries thereto, which are situated in Harrison and Otisfield, and in Naples, down to the Casco town line (also the portion of said river and tributaries in Waterford and Albany in Oxford County.) (R. & R.)

Sebago Lake, Little, in Gray and Windham: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Songo River, in Naples: During the months of July and August it shall be lawful to take fish, other than trout or salmon, in the bog, so-called, from the Oliver Camp, so-called, one-fourth of a mile up said river to red posts on opposite shores, but not within fifty feet of the center of the main channel of said river. (R. & R.)

(See also Sebago Lake, and Sebago Lake Tributaries.)

Thomas Pond, in Raymond and Casco: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries in the towns of Casco and Raymond are closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 57.)

Thompson Pond (also in Androscoggin and Oxford Counties): Closed season on landlocked salmon, trout and togue is from Sept. 1st to Dec. 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)
(See also Thompson Pond, under Androscoggin County.)

Walden Lake (or Hancock Lake, so-called) partly in Sebago: It is unlawful for any person or party, or the occupants of any boat or conveyance, however propelled, to catch or kill more than five black bass in any one day, collectively, nor more than two individually, or more than fifteen pounds of black bass in all. (1923, c. 154.)

Watchie Pond, in Standish: Closed to ice fishing except for pickerel and white perch. (1927, c. 68.)

Trout and landlocked salmon may be taken by fly fishing only from time ice is out until Sept. 30th, inclusive. Bag limit, three trout and landlocked salmon in all per person per day, trout to be not less than ten inches in length, and landlocked salmon to be not less than fourteen inches in length. Fishing allowed from sunrise to sunset only each day. (1927, c. 68.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

West Branch, of North Branch Brook, in Gorham (also in Buxton, York Co.): Closed to all fishing above the bridge on the road leading from Ossipee Trail to the Dow Road near the residence of George Files. (R. & R.)

Franklin County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Franklin County are open to fishing, except ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. (See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.)

Ice fishing. Ice fishing is legal only in those waters in Franklin County which are mentioned herein as being "open to ice fishing."

Alder Stream, in Alder Stream Twp.: Open to fly fishing only during the open season provided by the general law. (1931, c. 277, sec. 51.)

No trout less than ten inches in length shall be taken. Bag limit, not more than five trout and landlocked salmon per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Fly fishing only. No trout less than ten inches in length shall be taken. Bag limit, not more than five trout and landlocked salmon per person per day. (R. & R.)

Basin Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Berry Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Bigelow Pond Tributaries (Bigelow Pond in Wyman Town): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Big Inlet Brook, in Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Blanchard Brook, in Davis Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Blanchard Pond, in Stetson Town and Lang Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, ten trout and landlocked salmon in one day. (R. & R.)

Bog Stream, the outlet of Mirror Lake, which lake is situated partly in Chesterville, or in any of the **tributaries** to said stream, down as far as North Pond Stream: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Brown Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Carrabasset River, and all Tributaries, direct and indirect, above the falls at East New Portland: Open to fly fishing only, with the following exceptions:

The following waters are open to plug or bait fishing: The main stream of the West Branch of said Carrabasset River, exclusive of tributaries thereto, up as far as, and including, those parts of **Dead** and **Quick Streams**, so-called, which are below the road leading from Salem to Phillips, and **Lemon Stream**.

The following waters are closed to all fishing: **Dead** and

Quick Streams, so-called, above the road leading from Salem to Phillips, or in as much of the north branch of the Carrabasset river as lies above the bridges at Bigelow on the road leading from Kingfield to Stratton.

No trout less than seven inches in length, or more than fifteen fish in all, shall be taken from any of the above waters which are open to fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 59.)

Chain of Ponds Township: Fly fishing only in all waters in Chain of Ponds Township which are open to fishing; no trout less than ten inches and no landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length shall be taken; bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day, the combined weight of which shall not exceed five pounds unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than five pounds. (R. & R.)

Brooks and Streams: All brooks and streams closed to all fishing with the exception of the four thoroughfares connecting the five ponds known as the Chain of Ponds. (1931, c. 277, sec. 17.)

Chesterville: All lakes and ponds situated wholly in the town of Chesterville are open to ice fishing during February and March, under the general law. (R. & R.)

Chittendon Pond, in T. 1, R. 5, W.B.K.P., otherwise known as Jim Pond Township: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Clearwater Pond, in Industry and Farmington: Open to fly fishing or trolling only; provided that plug fishing, so-called, from permanent wharf or shore with line not exceeding twenty feet in length shall be legal from the season opening to Sept. 30th following of each year, inclusive. (1929, c. 342, 1931, c. 277, sec. 29.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Coburn Gore: All waters in Coburn Gore (except brooks and streams—see below) closed except to fly fishing; no trout less than ten inches in length and no landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length shall be taken; bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day, the combined weight of which shall not exceed five pounds unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than five pounds. (R. & R.)

Brooks and Streams: All brooks and streams in Coburn Gore closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 2.)

Coos Brook, a tributary to Wilson Lake, which lake is situated in Wilton, below the Wilkins Bridge: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cow Pond, in Davis Town and in Lang Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing and trolling. It is unlawful for any person or the occupants of any one boat to take more than five pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day; it is lawful to transport only fish legally taken from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated on the shore of said pond, or to a licensed taxidermist in this state for mounting only. (R. & R.)

Crescent Lake Tributaries: See Long Pond Tributaries.

Cupsuptic Lake: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing or trolling, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf, or shore, for landlocked salmon and trout shall be legal from June 1st to Sept. 30th each year, both days inclusive. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided in section 33. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Cupsuptic Lake, situated in Franklin and Oxford counties, are closed to all fishing, with the exception of Cupsuptic River and Kennebago Stream. (1931, c. 277, sec. 49.)

Daggett's Mill Pond, in New Vineyard: It is lawful to fish through the ice during February and March, under the general law. (R. & R.)

Davis, Stetson, or Seven Ponds Townships, or Massachusetts Gore: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the waters in these towns in which fishing is permitted except by fly fishing, or to transport any fish except from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated in the above named territory. (See regulations for transportation of fish taken in Kennebago Lake, Little Kennebago Lake, or in Little Kennebago Stream.) (R. & R.)

Dead River, North Branch, from Eustis Dam to Chain of Ponds Dam: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than five trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day; no trout less than ten inches in length may be taken in said waters at any time. (R. & R.)

Dead River, South Branch, in Franklin and Oxford Cos.: Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in one day, or any trout less than seven inches in length. (1931, c. 277, sec. 50.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Dead River, South Branch, above Flagg Dam, so-called, in Dallas Plantation, closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 50.)

Dead Stream: See Carrabasset River.

Dodge Pond, in Rangeley: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Drury Pond, in Temple: It is lawful to fish through the ice during February and March, under the general law. (R. & R.)

Dunning Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Durgan Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Dutton (or Shiloh) Pond, in Kingfield: Bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day. No trout less than eight inches in length shall be taken in said pond. (R. & R.)

Outlet, down to Reed's Falls: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Everett Pond, in T. 4, R. 5, W.B.K.P., also known as T. 11: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Flagg Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Flatiron Brook, in Davis Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Four Ponds Tributaries (Four Ponds in Townships D and E): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Frye Brook (a tributary to Green Brook) in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Gammon Pond (partly in Somerset County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Green Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Grindstone Pond: Bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day. No trout less than eight inches in length shall be taken in said pond. (R. & R.)

Gull Pond, in Dallas Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Gull Pond which flow out of Dallas Plantation into said pond. (R. & R.)

Haley Pond, in Rangeley and in Dallas Plantation: Open to fly fishing only; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Haley Pond which flow out of Dallas Plantation into said pond. (R. & R.)

Half Moon (or Jenne) Pond (partly in Oxford County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Hanscom Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Hill's Pond, in Perkins Pl.: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than six fish in all per person per day. No trout less than eight inches in length, or landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, shall be taken or had in possession at any time. (1931, c. 277, sec. 47.)

Holland Brook, a tributary to Wilson Lake, which lake is situated in Wilton, below its junction with Coos Brook: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Hutchinson Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Jenne Pond: See Half Moon Pond.

Jim Brook, in Jim Pond Town: Open to fly fishing only; bag limit, not more than ten trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Jim Pond, Little: Open to fly fishing only. It is unlawful for one person or the occupants of any one boat to take more than one fish in any one day, or to take any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length. (R. & R.)

Johns Pond, in Davis Town: Open to fly fishing only; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Kennebago Lake, in Davis Town and Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

It is lawful for a person to transport to his home in any one day not more than five fish, or not more than three pounds of fish, unless an individual fish weighs more than three pounds, which he has legally taken in Kennebago Lake. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, except that it is lawful to fish in Little Kennebago Stream in accordance with the provisions of P. L. 1923, c. 186. (See Little Kennebago Stream, following.) (R. & R.)

Kennebago Lake, Little, in Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

It is lawful for a person to transport to his home in any one day not more than five fish, or not more than three pounds of fish, unless an individual fish weighs more than three pounds, which he has legally taken in Little Kennebago Lake. (R. & R.)

Kennebago Stream, the outlet of Kennebago Lake: Closed to fishing for any kind of fish, except by fly fishing, from the time the ice is out of said stream in the spring until Sept. 30th following of each year, inclusive, from dawn until darkness sets in each day, from the big Falls on Kennebago Stream down to the old piers, so-called, at the mouth of said Kennebago Stream at the point where the said stream enters Cupsuptic Lake, with a bag limit of one fish per person per day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 48.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length in the portions of Kennebago Stream which are open to fishing. (1923, c. 185.)

Kennebago Stream, Little, the outlet of Little Kennebago Lake, which stream is situated in T. 3, R. 4, W.B.K.P.: Closed to fishing for any kind of fish, except by fly fishing, from the time the ice is out of said stream in the spring until Sept. 30th following of each year, inclusive, with a bag limit of not more than five fish in all per person per day. (1923, c. 186.)

It is lawful for a person to transport to his home in any one day not more than five fish, or not more than three pounds of fish, unless an individual fish weighs more than three pounds, which he has legally taken in Little Kennebago Stream. (R. & R.)

Lemon Stream: See Carrabasset River.

Long Pond Tributaries (known as Crescent Lake, in Sandy River Plantation): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Loon Lake, in Rangeley and in Dallas Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing or trolling. It is unlawful for one person, or the occupants of any one boat, to take more than five pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day, or more than one fish; fish legally taken may be transported only from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated on the shore of said lake, or to a licensed taxidermist in this state for mounting only. (R. & R.)

Massachusetts Gore: All waters in Massachusetts Gore (except brooks and streams—see below) closed except to fly fishing; it is unlawful to transport any fish except from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated in Davis, Stetson, or Seven Ponds township or in said Massachusetts Gore. (R. & R.)

Brooks and Streams: All brooks and streams in Massachusetts Gore closed to all fishing; provided that Massachusetts Bog between the dam at the foot of the bog and the boat landing at the upper end of the bog is open to fly fishing only; it is unlawful to transport any fish except from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated in Davis, Stetson, or Seven Ponds township or in said Massachusetts Gore. (1931, c. 277, sec. 1.)

Mirror Lake Outlet: See Regulations on Bog Stream, under Kennebec County.

Mirror Lake (or Parkis Pond), in Jay: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mooselucmeguntic Lake: Closed to all fishing except by fly fishing or trolling, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf, or shore, for landlocked salmon and trout shall be legal from June 1st to Sept. 30th each year, inclusive. (R. & R.) Closed to plug fishing for trout and landlocked salmon except from permanent wharf or shore, from June 1st to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1923, c. 152.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat, canoe, or other conveyance to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided by chapter 123 of the public laws of 1923. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, except that it is lawful to fish in Rangeley Stream and Kennebago Stream in accordance with the provisions of P. L. 1923, c. 186. (See Kennebago and Rangeley Streams for regulations thereon.) (R. & R.)

Mud Pond, in Jay: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mud Pond, in T. 2, R. 4, known as Tim Pond Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; it is unlawful for any person to carry away from said pond more than ten fish in all in any one day, or more than thirty fish in all in any one season, or to use any kind of fish for bait at any time when fishing in said pond. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

North Pond Tributaries: See Varnum Pond Tributaries.

Norton Brook, in Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Otter Brook, in Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Parker Pond Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Parkis Pond: See Mirror Lake.

Quick Stream: See Carrabasset River.

Quimby Pond, in Rangeley: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day; no fish may be taken from sunset at night until sunrise of the following day. (R. & R.)

Rangeley Lake: It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

It is unlawful for any person to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in Rangeley Lake by still or plug fishing, so-called. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided by Chapter 123 of the Public Laws of 1923. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Rangeley Stream, the outlet of Rangeley Lake: Closed to fishing for any kind of fish, except from the sign at the old wharf near the head of said stream down to the dam across said

stream, and from the upper end of the dead water on said stream to Indian Rock, in the ordinary way of casting with artificial flies or by fly fishing, so-called, from the time the ice is out of said stream in the spring until Sept. 30th following of each year, inclusive, with a bag limit of one fish in one day. (1923, c. 186.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length in the portions of Rangeley Stream which are open to fishing. (1923, c. 185.)

Ross Pond, in Rangeley: Bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Round Mountain Lake, in Alder Stream Township: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than five trout or salmon in all in any one day. (1931, c. 58.)

Round Pond, in Rangeley, and the Logans or Lagoons on the tributaries thereof: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing except the Logans or Lagoons on said tributaries. (R. & R.)

Saddleback Lake, or Dead River Pond, in Dallas Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten trout in all in any one day; fish legally taken may be transported only from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated on the shore of said lake, or to a licensed taxidermist in this state for mounting only; provided, however, that it shall be lawful for a person to carry to his home in one day five fish, or not more than three pounds of fish, unless an individual fish exceeds three pounds in weight, legally taken by him in said lake. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Saddleback Mountain Ponds, in Sandy River Plantation: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Sandy River, between Sandy River Ponds, in Sandy River Plantation, and Small's Falls, in the town of Madrid: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish per person per day, and no fish less than seven inches in length, shall be taken from Sandy River in Franklin County. (1931, c. 277, sec. 4.)

Tributaries: Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish per person per day, and no fish less than seven inches in length, shall be taken from the tributaries of the Sandy River situated in Franklin County. (1931, c. 277, sec. 4.)

Sandy River Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Sandy River Plantation): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Seven Ponds Stream, in Seven Ponds Town and in Stetson Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Seven Ponds Township: See Davis Township.

Shiloh Pond: See Dutton Pond.

Outlet: See Dutton Pond Outlet.

Staples Pond, in Temple:

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Stetson Township: See Davis Township.

Stratton Brook and Tributaries, in Eustis, in Coplin Plantation, and in Wyman Town: Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tainter Brook, in Weld and Carthage: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Friday only of each week from the time the ice is out of said brook in the spring until August 15th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Tea Brook, in Eustis and in Jim Pond Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tim Brook, in Tim Pond Town: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than ten trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tim Pond, in T. 2, R. 4, W.B.K.P., or Tim Pond Town, so-called: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; it is unlawful for any person to carry away from said pond more than ten fish in all in any one day, or more than thirty fish in all in any one season, or to use any kind of fish for bait at any time when fishing in said pond. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Toothaker Pond, in Phillips: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. No fish less than seven inches in length shall be taken from said pond. (1931, c. 277, sec. 3.)

Inlet: It is unlawful to take any fish at any time from the inlet of Toothaker Pond between the rearing pool and said pond. (1931, c. 277, sec. 3.)

Outlet: It is unlawful to take any fish at any time from the outlet of Toothaker Pond between said pond and Sandy river. (1931, c. 277, sec. 3.)

Trout Pond, in Madrid: Closed to all fishing from Sept. 15th until the ice is out the following spring. Fly fishing only allowed during the open season; bag limit, not more than six fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Tufts Pond: Bag limit, not more than five fish in all in any one day. No trout less than eight inches in length shall be taken in said pond. (R. & R.)

Outlet: Closed to all fishing, down to Alder Stream. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Varnum Pond Tributaries (or North Pond, so-called, which pond is in Temple and Wilton): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Walton's Mill Pond, in Farmington: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Webb's Pond (or Weld Pond), in Weld:

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, except Alder Brook above the Mill Dam at Hildreth's Mills. (R. & R.)

Wilbur Brook, in Davis Town: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Wilson Lake, in Wilton: Plug or bait fishing for trout, togue or salmon prohibited, *except* that plug fishing from a permanent wharf or shore shall be legal during the open season. (1931, c. 277, sec. 46.)

Hancock County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Hancock County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Birch Harbor Pond, in Winter Harbor: Closed to fishing for any kind of fish at any time, except that it is lawful to fish through the ice during February, March and April in accordance with the provisions of the general law. (1925, c. 68.)

Blunt Pond, in Lamoine: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Brewer Pond, in Bucksport: It is unlawful to take, on or through the ice, more than five fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Bubble Pond: See Turtle Lake.

Card's Mill Stream, and tributaries: Trout and salmon fishing prohibited in any part of Card's Mill Stream, so-called, from the outlet of Donnell's Pond to the Big Bridge at the head of tide water in that part of the town of Franklin known as East Franklin and also all tributaries to said stream, until May 1, 1933. (1931, c. 277, sec. 28.)

Craig Pond, in Orland: Open to ice fishing for trout and salmon. (1931, c. 277, sec. 57.)

Dead Stream, in Plantation 33, or Great Pond Plantation: Bag limit per person per day, not more than twenty-five pickerel, or more than fifteen pounds in all of pickerel, landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch and black bass, unless the last fish caught increases the combined weight thereof to more than fifteen pounds. (R. & R.)

Eagle Lake Tributaries, on Mt. Desert Island: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Graham Lake: See Union River.

Great Pond, in Plantation 33, or Great Pond Plantation: Bag limit per person per day, not more than twenty-five pickerel, or more than fifteen pounds in all of pickerel, landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch and black bass, unless the last fish caught increases the combined weight thereof to more than fifteen pounds. (R. & R.)

Leighton Brook, in Aurora and Plantation 21: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Leonard Lake: See Union River.

Main Stream, in Plantation 33, or Great Pond Plantation: Bag limit per person per day, not more than twenty-five pickerel, or more than fifteen pounds in all of pickerel, landlocked salmon, trout, togue, white perch and black bass, unless the last fish caught increases the combined weight thereof to more than fifteen pounds. (R. & R.)

McCaslin Brook, a tributary to White's Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Mill Stream, a tributary to Narraguagus Lake (or Spring Run Pond, so-called) and all **tributaries** to said Mill Stream: It is unlawful to take any fish at any time in Mill Stream, above a large flat boulder marked with a red cross, which boulder is on the west bank of said stream at Narraguagus Lake, which lake is situated in Townships 9, 10 and 16. It is also unlawful to take any fish at any time in any of the tributaries to said Mill Stream. (R. & R.)

Narraguagus Lake: See Spring Run Pond.

Nicatous Lake: Plug fishing for trout, togue or landlocked salmon prohibited. (R. & R.)

Ice fishing allowed on Thursday of each week only, in accordance with the general law. (R. & R.)

Outlet: It is unlawful to take any kind of fish at any time within one hundred feet of the dam or sluice gates. (R. & R.)

Passadumkeag River (or Stream), above Lowell's Dam, so-called (also in Penobscot Co.): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Patten Pond Brook, Upper, in Orland: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Spring Run Pond (or Narraguagus Lake, so-called) in Townships 9, 10 and 16: Closed to all fishing from Sept. 15th to May 15th following, both days inclusive. During open season, the bag limit for one day is not more than fifteen fish in all, or not more than five pounds of fish in all, unless the last fish caught increases the combined weight to more than five pounds. (R. & R.)

Sullivan Brook, in Sullivan: Closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 6.)

Sunkhaze Stream, in T. 32 (also in Greenfield and Milford, Penobscot County), and **tributaries** thereto: Open to fishing only from May 1st to Aug. 1st, under the provisions of the general law, except that pickerel may be taken in accordance with the general law on pickerel, in Sunkhaze Meadows, so-called. (R. & R.)

Taylor Brook, Upper, in T. 4 (also in Lakeville Plantation, in T. 3, R. 1, in Penobscot County): Closed to all fishing. (1925, c. 79.)

Turtle Lake (or Bubble Pond) on Mt. Desert Island: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Turtle Pond Brook, a tributary to White's Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Union River including Leonard Lake and Graham Lake: It is lawful to take pickerel through the ice during February, March and April, under the general laws of the state covering ice fishing for pickerel, except that the bag limit is fifteen pounds of pickerel per person per day, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than fifteen pounds. It is unlawful to take pickerel from Sept. 30th until the time the ice is out the following spring in any stream or brook tributary to said Union River. (1927, c. 86.)

West Lake: Plug fishing for trout, togue or landlocked salmon prohibited. (R. & R.)

Ice fishing allowed on Thursday of each week only, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Kennebec County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Kennebec County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Androscoggin Lake, in Wayne (partly in Leeds, Androscoggin County): It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in said lake. No suckers, eels, hornpouts or yellow perch shall be taken by any means other than by hook and line in said lake, or in the immediate outlet thereof; provided that the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to Dead River, the outlet of said lake, partly in Androscoggin County and partly in Kennebec County. (R. & R.)

Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: No suckers, eels, hornpouts or yellow perch shall be taken by any other means other than by hook and line in any brook or stream tributary to Androscoggin Lake. (R. & R.)

Annabessacook Lake, in Winthrop and Monmouth: Ice fishing prohibited. (1927, c. 128.)

Closed season on black bass from October 1 to June 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 37.)

Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 9 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (1921, c. 186.)

Barton Brook, in Windsor: Closed to all fishing until April 15, 1934. (1929, c. 334.)

Basin Pond, in Fayette: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bean Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Belgrade Chain of Lakes, consisting of **Great, Long, Little, Ellis, McGraw and Snow Ponds**; also **East and North Ponds** (partly in Somerset Co.):

Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.) (See Snow Pond for exception thereon.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Great, Long, Little, Ellis, McGraw or Snow Ponds, or to North or East Ponds. (R. & R.) (Except Belgrade Stream—See below.) (See above named ponds for special regulations on each.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Belgrade Stream: It is lawful to fish in Belgrade Stream, a tributary to Snow Pond, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 14th, inclusive; and it is lawful to fish in Ingham Stream, a tributary to Long Pond, from the time the ice is out until Aug. 15th, inclusive, during which respective open seasons on said streams it shall be lawful to fish in said waters in accordance with the general law of the state, except that no black bass shall be taken in said streams before June 20th each year; no black bass less than twelve inches in length or square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length shall be taken in either of said streams at any time; bag limit, not more than six black bass in all in any one day per person. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to the Belgrade Stream in Mount Vernon and Belgrade are closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 19.)

Berry Pond, in Wayne and Winthrop: Ice fishing allowed for pickerel only, under the general laws; bag limit, not more than ten pounds of pickerel per person per day. (R. & R.) It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in any lake situated wholly or partly in the town of Wayne. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Bog Pond, in Winthrop: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bog Stream, the outlet of Mirror Lake: Closed to all fishing down as far as North Pond Stream. All tributaries to said Bog Stream, which are situated in the County of Kennebec, down as far as North Pond Stream, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Buker Pond: See Tacoma Chain of Lakes.

Carleton Pond, in Readfield and Winthrop: Closed to all fishing. Penalty, not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$300.00 and costs for each offense, or imprisonment for 60 days, or by both fine and imprisonment. (1931, c. 128.)

Carl Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Chamberlain Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

China Lake, and that portion of said lake known as **Mud Pond,** in the towns of China and Vassalboro: Open to ice fishing on Thursday, Friday and Saturday only of each week, in accordance with the general law of the state governing ice fishing. (1921, c. 198.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, with the exception of Mud Pond Stream. (R. & R.)

Clark's Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Cobbosseecontee Lake: It is unlawful to take any trout less than twelve inches in length. (1927, c. 60; 1929, c. 42.)

It is lawful to take white perch at any time, subject to the general law bag limit of fifteen pounds or twenty-five fish. (1925, c. 161; 1927, c. 83.)

Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 9 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

Closed season on black bass from October 1 to June 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 37.)

Ice fishing allowed for pickerel and white perch only, on Saturday of each week, between January 15 and March 15, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 35.)

Outlet: Closed to all fishing from the dam at the outlet of Cobbosseecontee Lake which is located a short distance from the fish screen on outlet of said lake to a line drawn from a point on the Emery shore of the lake, across to the Penniman shore of the lake, a distance of about 150 feet, more or less, west of the highway bridge on said outlet, these waters being situated in Manchester. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cobbosseecontee River, from Collins' Dam on said river to the upper dam in the city of Gardiner, is closed to fishing for any kind of fish between eight o'clock in the afternoon and sunrise of the following morning. (1921, c. 136; 1923, c. 79.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Cobbosseecontee River, in West Gardiner and Litchfield (and in Bowdoin, Sagadahoc County) are closed to all fishing, except that part of Cold Stream situated in West Gardiner from the railroad bridge, located on the so-called Spear's Corner road from Gardiner, to the outlet of said stream, which said portion of Cold Stream is open to fishing under the general laws. (1931, c. 277, sec. 34.)

Cochnewagon Pond, in Monmouth: Open to ice fishing on Saturdays of each week during February and March for pickerel and white perch only, in accordance with the general law of the state governing ice fishing. Bag limit, fifteen pounds in all of pickerel and white perch in any one day. (1927, c. 181.)

Cold Stream: See Tributaries to Cobbosseecontee River.

Cunningham Brook, in Litchfield: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

David Pond, in Fayette: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Dexter Pond, in Wayne and Winthrop: It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in any lake situated wholly or partly in the town of Wayne. (R. & R.)

Doctor's Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

East Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

It is unlawful for any family, party, or the occupants of any one boat or other conveyance to take more than forty white perch in all in any one day. (1921, c. 208.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

East Pond Stream: Open to fishing under general laws, from East Pond to Wyman Dam, in the town of Smithfield. (See North Pond Tributaries.) (R. & R.)

Echo Lake, in Readfield, Fayette and Mt. Vernon: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Ellis Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Fairbanks Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Flying Pond, in Mt. Vernon and Vienna: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, except Sucker Brook above Whittier Dam. (R. & R.)

Gilman Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Great Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

Bag limit on black bass, not more than four per person per day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 5.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Greeley (or Torsey) Pond, in Readfield and Mt. Vernon: Closed to ice fishing except in that portion of said pond known as the "Stream" or "Meadow," south of the channel connecting the main pond with the meadow, in which portion it is lawful to fish through the ice under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Hill (Governor) Hatchery, in Augusta (known as State Fish Hatchery): All ponds closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Horseshoe Pond, on Cobbosseecontee Stream, in West Gardiner: It is unlawful to take more than ten pounds of fish in all, in any one day, before such fish are dressed. (1923, c. 37.) Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Ingham Pond, in Mt. Vernon: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Ingham Stream: See Belgrade Stream.

Jimmy Pond, in Litchfield: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.) (See Tacoma Chain of Lakes.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Joe's Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Lily Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Little Pond, in Rome, of Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.) (See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Long Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length, at any time. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

Bag limit on black bass, not more than four per person per day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 5.)

Plug fishing unlawful at any time in that part of Long Lake in the Belgrade chain of lakes which is near the canal leading from Long lake to Great lake and which forbidden area shall be marked by buoys located at the following points: One opposite a point on the shore 150 feet south of the middle of said canal and 500 feet westerly in said lake, and the second opposite a point on the shore 250 feet north of the middle of said canal and 500 feet westerly in said lake; said area so forbidden being rectangular in shape and which may be marked by additional buoys in line with the aforementioned points. (1931, c. 64.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Long Pond, in Windsor (also in Somerville and Jefferson in Lincoln County): Closed to ice fishing (1925, c. 66.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to take any fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Lovejoy pond, or in the **Outlet Stream** (commonly called Mill Stream) down to the fish screen on said stream. (1931, c. 277, sec. 12.)

Lovejoy Pond, in Wayne, Fayette and Readfield: It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in any lake situated wholly or partly in the town of Wayne. (R. & R.)

Maranacook Lake: Open to ice fishing for pickerel and perch on Thursday only, during the month of January. (1929, c. 363.)

Closed season on landlocked salmon and trout from October 1 to April 9 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 36.)

Closed season on black bass from October 1 to June 30 of the following year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 37.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

McGraw Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Messalonskee Lake: See Snow Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes.

Moose Pond, in Mt. Vernon: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mud Pond, in China and Vassalboro: See China Lake.

Mud Pond, in Litchfield (and in Richmond, Sagadahoc County):

Closed to ice fishing, except for special regulations on that portion which lies in Richmond. (See Sagadahoc County, Mud Pond.) (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Nahumkeag Pond, in Pittston: It is unlawful to take more than ten fish in all in any one day while ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Narrows Pond (Lower), in Winthrop: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Narrows Pond, Upper, in Winthrop: Upper Narrows Pond, in the town of Winthrop, which is that portion of Narrows Pond, so-called, lying north of the road leading from said town of Winthrop in an easterly direction toward Lake Cobbosseecontee to the residence of Daniel Clements, and from the

residence of Daniel Clements in a northerly direction to the village of Baileyville, so-called, is open to ice fishing for pickerel only from Dec. 15th to January 31st of each year, both days inclusive. (1931, c. 277, sec. 60.)

North Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

It is unlawful for any family, party, or the occupants of any one boat or other conveyance to take more than forty white perch in all in any one day. (1921, c. 208.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 14.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, with the exception of East Pond Stream. (R. & R.)

Oxbow Pond, in West Gardiner: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Parker Pond, in Mt. Vernon, Vienna and Fayette (also in Chertville, Franklin County): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pattees Pond, in Winslow: Open to ice fishing only on Sunday of each week, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Outlet Stream: Open to fishing during the months of May and June only of each year, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

(See also Wilson Brook, and Tributaries, Kennebec County.)

Tributaries: Open to fishing during the months of May and June only of each year, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Penney Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Pleasant Pond, in West Gardiner, Litchfield and Gardiner (and in Richmond, Sagadahoc County): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pocasset Lake, in Wayne: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in any lake situated wholly or partly in the town of Wayne. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Purgatory (or Woodbury) Pond: See Tacoma Chain of Lakes.

Sabin Brook, in China: Closed to all fishing until April 15, 1934. (1929, c. 334.)

Sand Pond: See Tacoma Chain of Lakes.

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Sidney Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Silver Lake Chain, consisting of Tyler Lake, Lily Lake, Spring Lake, Lower Silver Lake, Upper Silver Lake, Fairbanks Lake, Gilman Lake, Bean Lake, Doctor's Lake, Sidney Lake, Carl Lake, Joe's Lake, Chamberlain Lake, Wilman Lake, Penney Lake, and Clark's Lake, in the towns of Manchester, Sidney, and Belgrade: Ice fishing prohibited. (1927, c. 7.)

Silver Lakes, Upper and Lower: See Silver Lake Chain.

Snow Pond (or Messalonskee Lake, so-called), of the Belgrade Chain of Lakes: Closed at all times to plug or still fishing for trout and landlocked salmon. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.) Open to ice fishing on Saturdays only during the months of January and February. White perch may not be taken through the ice during January; no trout, salmon or black bass may be taken through the ice at any time. Bag limit for ice fishing, not more than ten pounds of fish in any one day. The Commissioner reserves right to set off prohibited areas, which may be changed or enlarged, in which areas ice fishing shall be illegal. (R. & R.) It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, with the exception of Belgrade Stream. (See Belgrade Stream for regulations thereon.) (R. & R.)

Closed to fishing for any kind of fish between eight o'clock in the afternoon and sunrise of the following morning. (1921, c. 136; 1923, c. 79.)

Three Cornered Pond, in Augusta: Open to ice fishing only on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of each week, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Three Mile Pond, in China, Windsor and Vassalboro: Open to ice fishing only on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of each week under the general law. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing until April 15, 1934, except that it shall be lawful to fish therein for smelts in accordance with the general law. (1931, c. 49.)

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Tilton Pond, in Fayette: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Torsey Pond: See Greeley Pond.

Tyler Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Ward Lake, in Sidney: Bag limit on trout, not more than six per person per day. Other fish under general law. (R. & R.) Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Ware Brook, an indirect tributary to Cobbosseecontee River, in West Gardiner: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Webber Brook, in China: Closed to all fishing until April 15, 1934. (1929, c. 334.)

Webber Pond, in Vassalboro: Open to ice fishing only on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of each week under the general law. (R. & R.)

Whitehouse Brook, in Vassalboro: Closed to all fishing until April 15, 1934. (1929, c. 334.)

Wilman Lake: See Silver Lake Chain.

Wilson Brook, a tributary to outlet of Pattees Pond, in Winslow, and **Tributaries** to Wilson Brook: Wilson Brook and its tributaries are open to fishing, during the months of May and June only of each year, under the provisions of the general law, *except* that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in the spawning beds at the mouth of Wilson Brook, within a distance of 1,000 feet up stream from the mouth of said brook, or for a distance of 1,000 feet down said stream from the mouth of said brook. (R. & R.)

Wilson Pond, in Wayne, Winthrop and Monmouth: It is unlawful to sell or purchase any pickerel taken in any lake situated wholly or partly in the town of Wayne. (R. & R.) Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Woodbury (or Purgatory) Pond: See Tacoma Chain of Lakes.

Knox County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Knox County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Alford's Lake Tributaries (Alford's Lake, in Hope): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Canaan Lake (known as Lake Megunticook):

Norton Pond Tributaries (Norton Pond in Lincolnville): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lincoln County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Lincoln County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Biscay Pond, in Damariscotta, Bremen and Bristol: No closed season on white perch; bag limit, fifteen pounds, or twenty-five white perch in one day. (1927, c. 38.)

Dyer's Pond, in Jefferson: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Dyer's Pond, Little, in Jefferson: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Hilton Lake: See McCurda Pond.

Long Pond, in Somerville and Jefferson (also in Windsor, Kennebec County): Closed to ice fishing. (1925, c. 66.)

McCurda Pond (or Hilton Lake, so-called) in Bremen: No closed season on white perch; bag limit, fifteen pounds, or twenty-five white perch in one day. (1927, c. 38.)

Pemaquid Pond, in Nobleboro, Damariscotta and Bremen: No closed season on white perch; bag limit, fifteen pounds, or twenty-five white perch in one day. (1927, c. 38.)

Pinkham Pond, in Alna: Bag limit, not more than eight fish in all, of which not more than four shall be trout, and not more than four shall be salmon, and not more than 15 pounds of fish in all shall be taken in any one day. (R. & R.)

Turner Mill Pond, in Somerville (also in Palermo, Waldo County): Open to ice fishing on Thursday, Friday and Saturday only of each week during the months of February and March. (R. & R.)

Oxford County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Oxford County are open to fishing, except ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. (See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.)

Ice Fishing. Ice fishing is legal only in those waters in Oxford County which are mentioned herein as being "open to ice fishing."

Abbott Brook, in Lincoln Plantation: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Allen (or Trout) Pond, in Stoneham: Plug fishing prohibited. No person, or the occupants of any one boat, shall take more than four fish in all in any one day. (R. & R.)

Anasagunticook Lake Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, except that it is lawful to take smelts, eels and suckers in said tributaries in accordance with the general laws. (1925, c. 26.)

Aziscohos Lake: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Aziscohos Lake, including Long Pond, so-called, on Little Magalloway River, or in any of the tributaries to Parmachenee Lake or to Big or Little Magalloway Rivers, or in any lake, or pond, the outlet of which flows directly or indirectly into Big Magalloway River, above Willow Springs, so-called, situated in Oxbow Town, Bowman Town, Parmachenee Town, Lynch Town, Parker Town, and Lincoln Plantation; provided, however, that it shall be lawful to fish in that portion of Big Magalloway River between Aziscohos Lake and Willow Springs, and in that portion of Little Magalloway

loway River between Parmachenee Crossing and Long Pond, from the time the ice goes out in the spring of each year until September 15th following, in accordance with the provisions of the following paragraph:

No person shall fish for any kind of fish at any time in said Azischohos Lake, Parmachenee Lake, the Big Magalloway River between Azischohos Lake and Willow Springs, or the Little Magalloway River between Parmachenee Crossing and Long Pond, which waters are situated wholly or partly in Oxbow Town, Bowman Town, Parmachenee Town, Lynch Town, Parker Town, and Lincoln Plantation, in said county of Oxford, except in the ordinary way of casting with artificial flies, known as fly fishing, the use of sunken flies being hereby prohibited; or in Lincoln Pond, in T. 5, R. 3, and in Parkertown, so-called, except in the ordinary way of casting with artificial flies, known as fly fishing or by trolling. Bag limit, not more than three pounds of fish in all per person per day, nor more than ten fish. Fishing allowed in these waters only from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset, official time. (R. & R.)

B. Pond, in Upton: Fly fishing only allowed; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Barker Pond (partly in Cumberland County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Bear Pond, in Hartford (partly in Turner, Androscoggin County): It is unlawful to catch more than fifteen white perch in any one day. (1923, c. 36.)

Bear Ponds, Big and Little, in Hartford (partly in Turner, Androscoggin County): **Tributaries** closed to all fishing. (1929, c. 344.)

Bear Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bear River and Tributaries: Closed to all fishing with the following exceptions: On Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week, during the open season on rivers, brooks and streams, under the general law, it is lawful to fish in said Bear River below the dam in the Walker Field, so-called, and in White Brook, a tributary to said river, below the first falls on said brook, and in Branch Brook, a tributary to said river, below the forks in the meadow. (R. & R.)

Beaver Brook, in Stoneham, a tributary to Kezar Lake: Open to fishing on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week during the open season on brooks and streams, under the general law, above the bridge leading to the One Thousand Acre Tract, so-called, in Stoneham. (R. & R.)

Beaver Brook, a tributary to Upper Richardson Lake: Fly fishing only allowed, from the quick water at the mouth of said brook out to Beaver Island telephone line. (R. & R.)

Beaver Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Beaver Ponds, in Magalloway Plantation: Open to fly fishing only; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Beaver Ponds, in Magalloway and Lincoln Plantations:

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Bickford Pond, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries, in Porter: Closed to all fishing. (1929, c. 348.)

Bird Pond, in Norway: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Black Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bog Brook, in Hebron (also in Minot, Androscoggin County), and **tributaries** thereto: Open to fishing from the time the ice is out of said waters until July 1st following, during which open season it is lawful to fish in accordance with the provisions of the general law. (1925, c. 2.)

Bog Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Boulder Brook: See Mill Brook.

Bradeen Stream West Branch, and Walker Brook, situated in the counties of Franklin and Oxford, and the respective **tributaries** to each in the towns of Byron, Roxbury, and Mexico, and which flow into Swift River in Oxford County: Closed to all fishing until July 13, 1934. (1931, c. 55.)

Bradley Pond, in Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Branch Brook: See Bear River and Tributaries.

Bryant Pond, or Lake Christopher, so-called, in Woodstock: It is unlawful to take any smelts at any time during the spawning season from either of the three tributaries flowing into the head of said pond. (1929, c. 362.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Bungamuck Pond, in Hartford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Burntland Pond, in Albany: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Burnt Meadow Pond, in Brownfield: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

C. Pond, in Township C. Surplus: Bag limit, not more than ten fish in all in any one day. (1925, c. 28.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cambridge River, Dead: See Dead Cambridge River.

Chapman Pond, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Charles Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Christopher Lake: See Bryant Pond.

Clay Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Clemens Ponds, the Two, in Hiram: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Colcord Pond, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries, in Porter: Closed to all fishing. (1929, c. 348.)

Cold Brook, a tributary to Lake Kezar: Open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week, during the open season on brooks and streams, under the provisions of the general law, above the dam at Chute's Mill. (R. & R.)

Tributaries to Cold Brook, above Chute's Mill, in Stoneham: Open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week, during the open season on brooks and streams, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Concord Pond, Little, in Woodstock: Bag limit, not more than two trout and landlocked salmon in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Crocker Pond, in Albany: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Crooked River, and tributaries thereto, situated in Waterford and Albany: It is unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Sebago Lake, except Songo River, above Songo Lock, and except the portion of Crooked River and tributaries thereto, which are situated in Harrison and Otisfield, and in Naples, down to the Casco Town Line (also the portion of said river and tributaries in Waterford and Albany in Oxford County.) (R. & R.)

Cupsuptic Lake: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing or trolling, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf, or shore, for landlocked salmon and trout shall be legal from June 1st to Sept. 30th each year, both days inclusive. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided by Chapter 123 of the Public Laws of 1923. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Cupsuptic Lake, situated in Franklin and Oxford Counties, are closed to all fishing, with the exception of Cupsuptic River and Kennebago Stream (1931, c. 277, sec. 49.)

Cupsuptic Pond, the outlet of which flows into Cupsuptic Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cupsuptic River (known as Cupsuptic Stream), a tributary to Cupsuptic Lake: Open to fly fishing only, from June 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive, from the pier at the mouth of said river to Big Falls; open to fly fishing only, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 30th, inclusive, from the foot of Little Falls to the dam on said river at the head of said Little Falls. Bag limit, not more than three pounds of fish in all, nor more than five fish, and no fish less than eight inches in length. (1923, c. 186. 1931, c. 277, sec. 56.)

Cupsuptic River (known as Cupsuptic Stream), a tributary to Cupsuptic Lake: Closed to all fishing at all times except by fly fishing from the pier at the mouth of said river to Big Falls, from June 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive; provided that it is unlawful to take any kind of fish at any time from the foot of Little Falls to the dam on said river at the head of said Little Falls; bag limit, not more than three pounds of fish in all, nor more than five fish, and no fish less than eight inches in length. (1923, c. 186.)

Cushman Pond, in Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Dan Charles Pond, in Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Dead Cambridge River, in Upton and Township C: Open to fly fishing only, from Umbagog Lake to C. Pond. (R. & R.) Bag limit; not more than five fish per person per day, nor more than five pounds of fish, shall be taken in that part of Dead Cambridge River from C. Pond to the mouth of said river, in the town of Upton, and in Township C. Surplus. (R. & R.) **Tributaries**, in Upton and Township C. Surplus: Closed to all fishing, with the exception of Swift Cambridge River. (R. & R.)

Dead River, South Branch, in Franklin and Oxford Cos.: Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in one day, or any trout less than seven inches in length. (1931, c. 277, sec. 50.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Dead River, South Branch, above Flagg Dam, so-called, in Dallas Plantation, closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 50.)

Dunham Brook, a tributary to Marshall Pond: Open to fishing, under the provisions of the general law, from the red posts on each bank of said brook, said red posts being situated near or opposite the rock with the ring in it, to the abutments of the old bridge, in the town of Hebron.

(All other portions of said brook are closed to all fishing.) (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to fish for or take any suckers at any time by the aid of a torch or torches. (R. & R.)

Ellis River, and Tributaries, in Andover and Andover West, North Surplus, Roxbury and Townships C and D: Open to fishing only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week under the general law. (R. & R.)

Farrington Pond, in Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Fuller Brook, a tributary to Bear Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Garland Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Byron): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Granger Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Great Brook, in Stoneham, a tributary to Lake Kezar: Open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week during the open season on brooks and streams, under the general law, above Hilton McAllister's Falls, so-called. (R. & R.)

Great Hancock Pond (also in Cumberland County): It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Haley Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Half Moon (or Jenne) Pond, in Mexico: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Hancock Lake: See Walden Lake.

Hancock Pond (also in Cumberland County): It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Hogan Pond, in Oxford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Holmes Brook, a tributary to Bear Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Horseshoe Pond, in Lovell and Stoneham: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Horseshoe Pond, in Stoneham: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Howard Pond, in Hanover: Plug fishing illegal between July 1st and Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1925, c. 72.)

It is unlawful for any person to take, or have in possession, any trout less than eight inches in length, or any salmon less than fourteen inches in length. (1931 c. 277, sec. 16.)

Howard Pond Brook, a tributary to Howard Pond, in Hanover and Newry: Closed to all fishing in the portion above the bridge which crosses said brook a few rods above Indian Rock, so-called. (R. & R.)

Indian Pond Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Island Pond, in Waterford (also in Harrison, Cumberland County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Tributaries, in Waterford: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Jaybird Pond, in Hiram: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kedar Brook, in Waterford: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Kennebago Stream, outlet of Kennebago Lake: Closed to fishing for any kind of fish, except by fly fishing, from the time the ice is out of said waters in the spring until Sept. 30th following of each year, inclusive, from dawn until darkness sets in each day, from the big Falls on Kennebago Stream down to the old piers, so-called, at the mouth of said Kennebago Stream at the point where the said stream enters Cup-suptic Lake, with a bag limit of one fish in any one day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 48.)

In that portion of Kennebago Stream which is open to fishing, it is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length. (1923, c. 186.)

Kewayden Lake, in Stoneham: It is lawful to take any fish except salmon and trout through the ice in Kewayden Lake in Stoneham. (1929, c. 302.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to take any fish at any time in all the tributaries of Kewayden Lake in the town of Stoneham. (1929, c. 302.)

Keyes Pond, in Sweden: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kezar, Lake, in Lovell, Stoneham and Stow: Open to ice fishing for pickerel, cusk and smelts only. (R. & R.)

Kezar, Lake, and Lake Kezar Pond: Not more than six black bass in all may be taken by any one person in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

Kezar, Lake, Tributaries: Open to fishing, above the dead water, during the open season on brooks and streams, in accordance with the general law, on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday only of each week, in the following tributaries: Great Brook, Beaver Brook, Cold Brook, and all Kezar Lake

tributaries situated in Lovell, except Mill Brook. (Special regulations on these tributaries will be found under the name of the tributary.) (R. & R.)

Kezar Pond, Lower, in Fryeburg (and in Bridgton, Cumberland County): Open to ice fishing for black bass and pickerel only. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Kezar Ponds, The Five, in Waterford and Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kezar Ponds, Upper and Lower (Lower Kezar Pond also in Cumberland County): Closed season on white perch is from Dec. 1st to June 30th, inclusive; on trout and landlocked salmon from Oct. 1st to March 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73; 1925, c. 141.)

Kezar River Tributaries, north of Calderwood Bridge, so-called, in Lovell and Sweden: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Kimball Pond, Lower, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kingman Brook, in Waterford, a tributary to Brook Kedar: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Kneeland Pond, in Albany: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Labrador Pond, Little, in Sumner: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Lincoln Pond, in Buckfield: Open to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 62.)

Lincoln Pond, in T. 5, R. 3, and in Parkertown: See Azischohos Lake.

Little Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Little Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Little Pond, in Mason: See Pleasant River and Tributaries.

Lombard Brook, in Norway and Oxford (also in Otisfield, in Cumberland County, and known in Otisfield as Greeley Brook), which brook empties into Thompson Lake at Oxford: Closed to all fishing until July 11, 1935. (1929, c. 360.)

Long Pond, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Long Pond, on Little Magalloway River: See Azischohos Lake.

Long Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Long Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Lovewell's Pond, in Fryeburg: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Closed season on white perch is from Dec. 1st to June 30th, inclusive. On trout and landlocked salmon from Oct. 1st to March 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73; 1925, c. 141.)

Magalloway River, below Azischohos Dam: Closed to all fishing between Azischohos Dam and the New Hampshire State Line, except by fly fishing. Bag limit, not more than three pounds of fish in all per person per day, nor more than ten fish in all. (R. & R.)

Magalloway River, Big: The commissioner of inland fisheries and game is authorized and directed to place two red posts on opposite banks of the Big Magalloway River at the point where said river enters into Azischohos Lake, said posts to be set at the high water mark of Azischohos Lake. (1931, c. 53.)

Magalloway Rivers, Big and Little, Tributaries to: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.) (See Azischohos Lake.)

Marshall Pond Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (With the exception of Dunham Brook. See Dunham Brook for regulations thereon.) (R. & R.)

McWain's Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Metalluc Brook, tributary to Upper Richardson Lake: Open to fly fishing only from the mouth of said brook out as far as the Island. (R. & R.)

Middle Pond, in Hiram: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mill Brook (or Boulder Brook, so-called), a tributary to Upper Kezar Lake, in Lovell: Closed to all fishing, except for suckers and smelts under the general law. (R. & R.)

Mill Brook, a tributary to Upper Richardson Lake: Fly fishing only allowed, from the quick water at the mouth of said brook to a line drawn from the southwesterly corner of the sluice pier, so-called, easterly to a stake painted red near a poplar tree at high water mark. (R. & R.)

Moose Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Pond, in Paris: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Pond, Upper, in Denmark (also in Cumberland County):

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Mooselucmeguntic Lake: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing or trolling, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf, or shore, for landlocked salmon and trout shall be legal from

June 1st to Sept. 30th each year, both days inclusive. (R. & R.)

Closed to plug fishing for trout and landlocked salmon except from permanent wharf or shore, from June 1st to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1923, c. 152.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided by chapter 123 of the Public Laws of 1923. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.) (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing with the exception of Rangeley Stream, Kennebag Stream, and Little Kennebag Stream. (Special rules and regulations covering these streams will be found under the name of the stream.) (R. & R.)

Mosquito Brook, a tributary to Upper Richardson Lake: Fly fishing only allowed, from the quick water at the mouth of said brook to a line drawn from a big boulder in the north-west corner of the stone wall at the Whitney Cottage, northerly to the westerly side of the old Whitney Camp. (R. & R.)

Mud Pond, in Paris: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

North Pond, in Greenwood and Woodstock: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

North Pond, in Norway: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

North Pond, in Sumner: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Overset Pond, in Greenwood: Bag limit, not more than five trout and landlocked salmon in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Papoose Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Parmachenee Lake: See Azischohos Lake.

Parmachenee Lake Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.) (See Azischohos Lake.)

Pennesseewassee Lake: No person, or the occupants of any one boat, canoe, or other conveyance, shall take more than five black bass in any one day. (R. & R.)

So much of Lake Pennesseewassee in Norway, as lies between a line drawn from a sign posted on the northerly point of land owned by Charles C. Adams and upon which stands the dancing pavilion known as the "Pirate's Den," on the westerly side of said lake above Crockett's Bridge, so called, to a sign

posted on the land formerly owned by Nellie Welch, on the easterly side of said lake above said bridge, and a line drawn from a sign posted on the southerly point of land owned by A. B. Myers, on the easterly side of said lake, to a sign posted on the southerly point of land owned by Arthur Welch, on the westerly side of said lake, is closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 32.)

Open to ice fishing in that portion known as the Bog, from the dam at the outlet of said lake to the two signs posted below Crockett's Bridge. (R. & R.)

Outlet Stream, in Norway: Closed to all fishing between a line drawn from the northerly point of the island on the easterly side of said stream, above Crockett's Bridge, so-called, on said stream, to the northerly point of the island on the westerly side of said stream, above said bridge, and a line drawn from the point of land now occupied by Eddie Perault, on the easterly side of said stream below said bridge, to the southerly point of the island on the westerly side of said stream, below said bridge, said lines being 200 feet, more or less, above and below, respectively, said Crockett's Bridge. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pennesseewassee Lake, Little, Tributaries to: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pickeral Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Denmark): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Pond, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Pond, in Fryeburg, Denmark and Brownfield: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Pond, in Sumner: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant River and Tributaries, in Albany, Bethel and Mason: Closed to all fishing at all times, with the exception of Little Pond, a private pond, in said Mason; except that it is lawful to fish said river from Albany line, its eastern tributary, and from Lowell Brook, its western tributary, to its outlet into the Androscoggin River on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. (1929, c. 337.)

Plummer Brook, in Waterford, a tributary to Brook Kedar: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Pond-in-the-River, so-called, in Rapid River: Open to fly fishing only, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 30th; provided that it shall be unlawful for any person to catch and kill more than one fish in any one day from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th of each year, both days inclusive. (1925, c. 121, 1931, c. 277, sec. 56.)

Closed to all fishing except between sunrise and one-half hour after sunset each day. (1925, c. 162.)

Bag limit, not more than eight pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Proctor Pond, in Albany and Stoneham: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Putt Brook, a tributary to Round Pond, in Greenwood: Closed to all fishing down to a point 100 feet below Herrick's Bridge, or Farrington's Bridge, so-called, on said stream. (R. & R.)

Rangeley Stream: In that portion of Rangeley Stream which is open to fishing, it is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length. (1923, c. 185.)

Rapid River, between Lower Richardson and Umbagog Lakes, at all points between the Upper Dam at the mouth of the river and the old bridge piers known as the Old Magalloway Piers near the outlet of said Rapid River into Umbagog Lake: Open to fly fishing only, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 30th; provided that it shall be unlawful for any person to catch and kill more than one fish in any one day from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th of each year, both days inclusive. (1925, c. 121. 1931, c. 277, sec. 56.)

Closed to all fishing except between sunrise and one-half hour after sunset each day. (1925, c. 162.)

Rattlesnake Pond, in Brownfield: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Richardson Ponds, East and West, in T. 4, R. 2, or Adams Town, so-called: Fly fishing only allowed in the Two East and Two West Richardson Ponds; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to the Two East Richardson Ponds, and to the Two West Richardson Ponds, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Richardson Lakes, Upper and Lower: Closed to all fishing except fly fishing and trolling, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf, or shore, for landlocked salmon and trout shall be legal from June 1st to Sept. 30th, each year, both days inclusive. (R. & R.)

Closed to all fishing except between sunrise and one-half hour after sunset each day. (1925, c. 162.)

Closed to plug fishing for trout and landlocked salmon except from permanent wharf or shore, from June 1st to Sept. 30th, both days inclusive. (1923, c. 152.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than fourteen inches in length, or to take more than ten pounds of trout and landlocked salmon in all in any one day. (1923, c. 185.)

It is unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to troll with more than two lines at any time. (1927, c. 114.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish, legally taken, may be shipped only once in a year under a transportation tag as provided by chapter 123 of the public laws of 1923. (See p. 14 of this pamphlet.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing, with the exception of the pool at Upper Dam and the river below said pool, under the provisions of chapter 121 of the public laws of 1929. (R. & R.) (See Upper Dam. See also Mosquito Brook, Beaver Brook, and Mill Pond.)

All tributaries to Upper and Lower Richardson Lakes closed to all fishing except between sunrise and one-half hour after sunset each day. (1925, c. 162.)

Round Pond, in Greenwood and Woodstock: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.) (See regulation on Putt Brook.)

Roxbury Pond, in Roxbury and Byron: Open to trolling and fly fishing only, except that plug fishing from permanent wharf or shore is legal during the open season provided by the general laws. (1931, c. 277, sec. 40.)

Sand Pond, in Denmark: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Shagg Pond, in Woodstock: Bag limit, not more than two trout and landlocked salmon in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Shell Pond, in Stow and Stoneham: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Slab City Pond, in Lovell: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Songo Pond, in Albany and Bethel: Closed to ice fishing at all times. (1929, c. 346.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

South Pond, in Buckfield: Open to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 62.)

South Pond, in Greenwood: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Southeast Pond, (partly in Cumberland County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less

than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

Spear Stream, and Tributaries, in Peru: Open to fishing on Tuesday and Thursday only of each week during the open season provided by the general law. (1931, c. 277, sec. 43.)

Spectacle Ponds, the Two, in Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Stanley Ponds, the Three, in Hiram and Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bag limit, not more than two fish in all per person per day, or any salmon less than sixteen inches in length. (1931, c. 277, sec. 44.)

Stearns Pond, in Sweden: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Stony Brook, in Newry and Hanover: Fishing allowed only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week, under the general law. (1925, c. 29.)

Sturtevant Pond, in Magalloway Pl.: Open to ice fishing for pickerel and yellow perch only. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take any trout less than eight inches in length, or more than three pounds of trout in any one day, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than three pounds. (R. & R.)

Tributaries; It is unlawful to take any trout less than eight inches in length, or more than three pounds of trout in any one day, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than three pounds, in any and all tributaries to Sturtevant Pond. (R. & R.)

Sumner Day Brook, in Brownfield: Closed to all fishing. (R.&R.)

Sunday River and Tributaries, in Bethel, Newry, and in Riley Plantation: Closed to all fishing for any kind of fish, *except* that it is lawful to fish on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week, in accordance with the general law, in that portion of Sunday River below the Forks, so-called, in Riley Plantation. (1925, c. 54.)

Swan Pond, in Hartford: Open to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 62.)

Swift Cambridge River and Tributaries (which river is in Grafton and Upton): Closed to all fishing, *except* that it is lawful to fish in said Swift Cambridge River, from the Upper Dam, so-called, near the house of Jos. Chapman, to its junction with Dead Cambridge River, under the general law, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. (R. & R.)

Swift River Tributaries: See Bradeen Stream, West Branch.

Thompson Pond (also in Androscoggin and Cumberland Counties): The closed season on landlocked salmon, trout and togue is from Sept. 1st to Dec. 31st, inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

It is unlawful to catch or kill any square-tailed trout less than ten inches in length, or any landlocked salmon less than twelve inches in length, in any lake or pond wholly or partly in the county of Cumberland. (1929, c. 355.)

(See also Thompson Pond, under Androscoggin County.)

Trafton Pond, in Hiram and Porter: Open to ice fishing. (R.&R.)

Trout Pond: See Allen Pond.

Turner Brook, a tributary to Bear Pond: Closed to all fishing (R. & R.)

Twin Brooks, tributaries to Aziscohos Lake: Closed to all fishing. (1927, c. 4.)

Twitchell Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Greenwood): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Two Spec Pond, in Waterford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Upper Dam Pool, between Mooselucmeguntic and Upper Richardson Lakes: Open to fly fishing only, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 30th; provided that it shall be unlawful for any person to catch and kill more than one fish in any one day from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th of each year, both days inclusive. (1925, c. 121. 1931, c. 277, sec. 56.)

Upper Dam Pool—Upper Richardson Lake, River Between: Fly fishing only allowed in the river leading from the pool at Upper Dam to Upper Richardson Lake, from the time the ice is out until Sept. 30th; provided that it shall be unlawful for any person to catch and kill more than one fish in any one day from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th of each year, both days inclusive. (1925, c. 121. 1931, c. 277, sec. 56.)

Virginia Lake, in Stoneham: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Walden Lake, (or Hancock Lake, so-called) in Denmark (also in Sebago, in Cumberland County): It is unlawful for any person or party, or the occupants of any boat or conveyance, however propelled, to catch or kill more than five black bass in any one day, collectively, nor more than two individually, or more than fifteen pounds of black bass in all. (1923, c. 154.)

Walker Brook: See Bradeen Stream, West Branch.

Ward Pond and Ward Brook, in Fryeburg: Open to fishing during May, June and July only of each year, under the provisions of the general laws. (R. & R.)

Waterhouse Brook, a tributary to Bear Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Webber Pond, in Sweden: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

White Brook: See Bear River and Tributaries.

Whitney Pond, in Oxford: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Worthley Pond, in Peru: Open to fly fishing and trolling only. No trout shall be taken less than ten inches in length. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Penobscot County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Penobscot County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Ben Annis Pond, in Hermon: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Cambolasse Stream, in Lincoln: Closed to all fishing between the head of Cambolasse Pond and the foot of Long Pond. (191, c. 277, sec. 14.)

Came Brook, in Garland, a tributary to Washburn (or Garland) Pond: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cleaves Brook, in Prentiss, a tributary to Madagudas (or Matagodus) Stream: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Cold Stream Ponds, Upper and Lower, in Enfield and Lowell: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Corinna Brook, in Newport, a tributary to Sebasticook Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Corinna Stream, a tributary to Lake Sebasticook: No fish may be taken at any time within one hundred feet of the Corinna Bridge, so-called, on Corinna Stream. (R. & R.)

Davis Pond, in T. 5, R. 7, W.E.L.S.: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Dead Stream, West Branch, and any Tributaries in Bradford (or in Orneville and Atkinson, in Piscataquis County): Closed to all fishing, except that it is lawful to spear suckers during April and May of each year. (R. & R.)

Dill Brook, in Lakeville Plantation, a tributary to Bottle Lake, Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Dobsis Lake (also in Washington County): Residents only permitted to fish through the ice. (R. & R.)

White perch taken by means of hook and line, in **Dobsis Lake**, and in *all other lakes and ponds whose outlets empty into Dobsis Lake*, may be sold and transported, within or without this state, in such quantities and under such rules and regula-

tions as the commissioner of inland fisheries and game may establish. (1929, c. 68.)

Folsom Brook, in Newport, a tributary to Sebasticook Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Garland Pond, West Inlet, known as West Garland Brook: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

George Pond, in Hermon: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Getchell Brook, in Lakeville Plantation, a tributary to Duck Lake: Closed to all fishing from the mouth of said brook up to the head of Muzzy Meadows, one mile from Duck Lake. (R. & R.)

Gordon Brook, in Garland: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Great Works Stream, from Penobscot River to Big Rock, so-called, in the town of Bradley: Open to pickerel fishing at all times. (1929, c. 345.)

Great Works Stream, South Branch, from junction of Goodwin Brook and Bradbury Brook to the Forks, so-called: Closed to fishing for trout except from time ice is out until August 15th following; but this does not affect any other part of Great Works Stream. (1929, c. 353.)

Green Mountain Pond, in T. 6, R. 6, W.E.L.S.: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Half Moon Pond, in Dexter (also in Ripley, Somerset County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Inlet Brook: See Number 3 Pond.

Katahdin Lake, in T. 3, R. 8, W.E.L.S.: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kimball Pond, in T. 5, R. 8: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Lowell Brook, in Lakeville Plantation, a tributary to Duck Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lumbert Lake Tributaries, in Springfield and in Lakeville Plantation: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lunksoos Pond, in T. 4, R. 7: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Main Stream and Tributaries: See Moose Lake, Great, in Somerset County.

Meenahga Pond, in T. 3, R. 1 and in Lee: See Number 3 Pond.

Messer Pond, in T. 5, R. 8: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Pond, in T. 6, R. 7, W.E.L.S.: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mud Brook, Big, in Prentiss: That part of Big Mud Brook which lies above the Upper Dam, so-called, being about one-fourth of a mile from Baldwin's Mill, so-called, is closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Mud Brook, Little, in Prentiss: That part of Little Mud Brook, and any **tributaries**, lying easterly of the county road lead-

- ing from Springfield to Wytotitlock, are closed to all fishing (R. & R.)
- Mud Lake**, in T. 6, R. 6 (and in Moro Plantation, Aroostook County): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)
- Nason Stream**, in Newport, a tributary to Sebasticook Lake: Closed to all fishing, including **Snell Brook**, so-called, a tributary to said Nason Stream. (R. & R.)

Earley Salmon Pool, so-called, in Wilson River, in Willimantic: No fish shall be taken in said Pool at any time from an anchored or stationary boat or canoe, from the head of the Island opposite Earley's float to Greeley's Falls, so-called. (R. & R.)

Ebemees Pond, Upper, in T. 4, R. 9, N.W.P., T. B., R. 10, W.E.L.S.: Open to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 63.)

Ebemees Ponds, East and West, in T. 5, R. 9, N.W.P., and in Brownville: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Elbow Pond, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Fogg Pond, in T. 8, R. 10, N.W.P.: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all, nor more than ten pounds of fish in all, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than ten pounds. (R. & R.)

Foss Pond, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Fox Pond, in T. A., R. 11: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Frost Pond, in T. 3, R. 11: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Garland Pond, in Foxcroft and Sebec: Open season, June 1st to Sept. 1st following. (R. & R.)

Glencoe Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Parkman): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Grand Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Grassy Pond, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Greenwood Pond, Large, in Elliottsville and Willimantic: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Harlow Pond, in Parkman: Open to ice fishing for pickerel only, under the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Hebron Lake, in Monson: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Horseshoe Pond, in West Bowdoin College Township: Fly fishing only, during the months of July, August and September of each year. Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all, nor more than fifteen pounds of fish, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than fifteen pounds. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Fly fishing only, during the months of June, July, and August. Bag limit, not more than six fish per person per day. (R. & R.)

Long Pond (or First Buttermilk Pond) in Twps. 7 and 8, R. 9, and in Twps. 7 and 8, R. 10, N.W.P.: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Long Pond Stream: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lost Pond, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Lyford Pond, Big, in T. A., R. 12 and T. A., R. 13: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Lyford Pond, Little, in West Bowdoin College Grant: Open to fly fishing only. (1931, c. 277, sec. 54.)

Millinocket Lake, in Twps. 7 and 8, R. 9, W.E.L.S.: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mirror Pond, in T. A, R. 11, W.E.L.S.: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all, nor more than ten pounds of fish in all unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than ten pounds. (R. & R.)

Moosehead Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

The closed season on landlocked salmon, trout, and togue shall be from the first day of October to the 30th of April of the following year, both days inclusive. (1921, c. 73.)

Ten pounds of fish, or one fish legally taken, may be shipped under a transportation tag (as provided on p. 15 of this pamphlet) whenever the same are legally in possession of the shipper during the open season on said fish. (1923, c. 123.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Moosehead Lake, with the exception of Moose River, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Mountain Brook Pond, and Tributaries, in West Bowdoin College Township: Fly fishing only allowed; open season during the months of June, July and August. Bag limit, not more than six fish per person per day. (R. & R.)

Mountain Pond, in T. 8, R. 10, N.W.P., and in Gore A, No. 2: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all,

nor more than ten pounds of fish in all, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than ten pounds. (R. & R.)

Munsungun Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Nahmakanta Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

North Twin Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Northwest Pond, in T. 4, R. 9, W.E.L.S.: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Onawa Lake, in Ellitsville and Willimantic: Open to ice fishing, under the general law, with a bag limit of not more than five pounds of fish in all, nor more than one fish, per person per day. (R. & R.)

Outlet, in Ellitsville Plantation: Closed to all fishing below the fish screen, or between the fish screen and dam on said outlet. (R. & R.)

Passamagormac Pond, in T. 1, R. 9, and T. 1, R. 10 (this pond enters the West Branch of the Penobscot River at Passamagormac Falls): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pemadumcook Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Piper Pond, in Abbot: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Ponds, the Two, in T. A., R. 11: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Pleasant River Waters: Fly fishing and trolling only allowed in the East Branch of Pleasant River, in T. B., R. 11, in T. A., R. 11, and in T. A., R. 12, from its headwaters to its junction with B. Stream; or in B. Stream, so-called, from B. Pond to the junction of said Stream with the East Branch of Pleasant River; or in B. Pond, or in any of its tributaries, in T. B., R. 11. (R. & R.)

Polly Pond, in T. 3, R. 11: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Ragged Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Rocky Ponds, Big and Little, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Rocky Ponds, the Two, in T. A., R. 11: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Rubberneck Pond, in T. A, R. 11: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Rum Pond, in Greenville and in T. 8, R. 10, N.W.P.: Open season, from July 1st to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (R. & R.)

Salmon Pond, in Guilford, said pond being the source of water supply for the Dover-Foxcroft Water District: Closed to all fishing at all times. (1927, c. 170.)

Salmon Stream, in Guilford: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Schoodic Lake, in Lakeview Plantation (T. 4, R. 8): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Sebec Lake; Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Sebec River, at Milo: Closed to all fishing in that portion of Sebec River which is situated in the town of Milo above the dam across said river at Milo Village during low water in said river, or whenever the water above said dam is two feet or more below the crest of said dam. (R. & R.)

Seboeis Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Second Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Ship Pond Stream, above Bucks Falls: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Ship Pond Stream. (R. & R.)

Slaughter Pond, in T. 3, R. 11: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Sourdnaunk Waters:

Sourdnaunk Lake, in Twps. 4 and 5, R. 10, and Twps. 4 and 5, R. 11, W.E.L.S.: **Little Sourdnaunk Lake**, so-called; that portion of **Sourdnaunk Stream** between Sourdnaunk Lake and Slide Dam, so-called: Fly fishing only, with a hook not larger than number eight; bag limit, not more than six fish in all per person per day. No fish shall be transported except fish legally taken in said waters may be transported from the place where caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house or hotel situated in the above named territory; provided, however, that a resident of this state, or the members of his family, collectively, may transport to his home, in one week, not exceeding six fish, or not more than three pounds of fish, legally taken in any of said waters. (R. & R.) **Sourdnaunk Stream**, between Slide Dam, so-called, and the West Branch of the Penobscot River: Fly fishing only, with a hook not larger than number eight. (R. & R.)

South Twin Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Spencer Pond, in Middlesex Canal Grant and in Spencer Bay Town: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than ten pounds in all, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight to more than ten pounds. (R. & R.)

Squaw Pond, Big, in Little Squaw Mountain Township: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Squaw Pond, Big, in Little Squaw Town, T. 3, R. 5 (which pond is the water supply for the village of Greenville): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Telos Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

T. 5, R. 9: All lakes and ponds open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

T. 6, R. 9: All lakes and ponds partly or wholly in T. 6, R. 9, are open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Vaughan Stream, a tributary to Long Pond Stream: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Webster Lake, in T. 6, R. 10 and 11: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

West Branch Ponds, in T. A, R. 12: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Wilson Ponds, Upper and Lower, Tributaries to: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Upper and Lower Wilson Ponds; provided that the stream connecting said Wilson Ponds shall be construed to be a tributary to said Lower Wilson Pond down as far as low water mark in Lower Wilson Pond at the mouth of said stream. (R. & R.)

Wilson Stream, a tributary to Sebec Lake: Closed to all fishing up to Tobey Falls. (R. & R.)

Windy Pitch Pond, in T. 3, R. 10: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Yoke Pond, in T. A, R. 11: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Sagadahoc County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Sagadahoc County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.

Cobbosseeconte River Tributaries, in Bowdoin: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Duck (or Meetinghouse) Pond, in Phippsburg: Closed to ice fishing. (1931, c. 56.)

Meetinghouse Pond: See Duck Pond.

Mud Pond: In that portion of Mud Pond which is situated in Richmond, it is lawful to fish through the ice on Wednesdays only, during February and March of each year, for pickerel only. (R. & R.)

Pleasant Pond, in Richmond (also in Kennebec County): Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Sprague's Pond, in Phippsburg: Closed to ice fishing. (1931, c. 56.)

Swan Island: It is unlawful to fish at any time in the territory southerly of the land formerly owned by Robert Reed on the southerly point of Swan Island to high water mark on the shores thereof. (R. & R.)

Somerset County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in Somerset County are open to fishing, except ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. (See pages 8 to 17 for general fishing laws.)

Ice Fishing. Ice fishing is legal only in those waters in Somerset County which are mentioned herein as being "open to ice fishing."

Attean Lake, in Attean Township: It is unlawful to take more than eight pounds of landlocked salmon, trout, and togue in all in any one day. (1927, c. 67.)

Open to ice fishing, during the month of February of each year, under the provisions of the general law. (1931, c. 277, sec. 42.)

Baker Pond, in T. 5, R. 6, B.K.P., W.K.R.: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all, nor more than ten fish, per person per day. (R. & R.)

Baker Stream, in T. 4, R. 6, (Hobbs town), T. 5, R. 6, T. 4, R. 5, and in T. 6, R. 7, B.K.P., W.K.R.: Open to fly fishing only, on Wednesday only of each week during the open season; bag limit, not more than ten fish in all per person per day, or more than five pounds of fish in all, unless the last fish taken increases the combined weight thereof to more than five pounds. (1931, c. 277, sec. 10.)

Barker Pond, in Cornville: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Bean Brook, a tributary to Parlin Stream: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Beaver Brook, in Holeb: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Black Hill Pond: See Spiteful Lake.

Blakesley Pond, in T. 5, R. 6: Fly fishing and trolling only. (R. & R.)

Brassua Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Burnt Land Pond, in Dennistown Plantation: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Calf Pasture, (Pond), so-called, adjacent to Big Turner Pond, in Forsythe Township: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Campbell Pond, on Kelly Gore, so-called: Open to fly fishing only, after June first each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Cape Horn Pond, in Prentiss Township: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Carrabasset River, and all Tributaries, direct and indirect, above the falls at East New Portland: Open to fly fishing only, with the following exceptions:

The following waters are open to plug or bait fishing: The main stream of the West Branch of said Carrabasset River, exclusive of tributaries thereto, up as far as, and including, those parts of **Dead and Quick Streams**, so-called, which are below the road leading from Salem to Phillips, and **Lemon Stream**.

The following waters are closed to all fishing: **Dead and Quick Streams**, so-called, above the road leading from Salem to Phillips, or in as much of the north branch of the Carrabasset River as lies above the bridges at Bigelow on the road leading from Kingfield to Stratton.

No trout less than seven inches in length, or more than fifteen fish in all, shall be taken from any of the above waters which are open to fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 59.)

Carry Pond, East, in T. 2, R. 3, B.K.P., W.K.R.: Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Cheney Pond, in Hammond Township: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Coburn Pond, in Moose River Plantation: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Cold Stream, in Norridgewock (which stream is a tributary to Oosoola Stream, commonly called Mill Stream): Closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 39.)

Cold Stream, East Branch, and Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in the East Branch of Cold Stream from the outlet of Cold Stream Pond to the new dam, so-called, owned by the Hollingsworth and Whitney Company, known as Number Six Dam, or in any of the tributaries to said East Branch of said Cold Stream, said waters being situated in T. 2, R. 6, known as Upper Cold Stream Tract. (R. & R.)

Cold Stream, West Branch, and Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in the West Branch of Cold Stream from the outlet of Big Berry Pond to the new dam, so-called, owned by the Hollingsworth and Whitney Company, known as Number Six Dam, or in any of the tributaries to said West Branch of said Cold Stream. (R. & R.)

Cold Stream Pond: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Cold Stream Tract, Upper: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of trout and salmon in all per person per day in any waters which are open to fishing. Fly fishing only allowed in any of the waters in Upper Cold Stream Tract. (R. & R.)

Crocker Pond, in Dennistown Plantation: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Daymond Pond, in Moose River Plantation: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Dead Stream Pond, in Ten Thousand Acre Tract and in West Forks Plantation: Open season, from time ice goes out until Sept. 30th. Plug fishing from the shores of said pond prohibited. (R. & R.)

Tributaries and Outlet: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Dexter Pond, in Ripley: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Douglas Pond, in Palmyra: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

East Pond, Belgrade Chain of Lakes (also in Kennebec County):

It is unlawful to take a trout less than ten inches in length, or a black bass less than twelve inches in length at any time, or more than six black bass in any one day. (1917, c. 219, sec. 19.)

It is unlawful for any family, party, or the occupants of any boat or other conveyance to take more than forty white perch in all in any one day. (1921, c. 208.)

(See transportation tag law, R. S. c. 38, sec. 33, on p. 15.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Ellis Pond, in Ten Thousand Acre Tract: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Embden Pond, Great: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Great Embden Pond, with the exception of Witham Brook, in Concord, which is open to fishing on Saturday of each week during the open season on brooks, in accordance with the provisions of the general law. (R. & R.)

Enchanted Pond, Little, in Upper Enchanted Township: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Enchanted Townships, Upper and Lower: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of trout and salmon in all per person per day in any waters which are open to fishing. (R. & R.)

Fahi Pond, in Embden: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Fish Pond, in Black Brook Township: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Fish Pond, in Holeb Township: Fly fishing only, except that on Wednesday of each week, during the open season, it is legal to take fish by means of bait casting. Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Fish Pond, in Holeb and in T. 6, R. 1, N.B.K.P., including the small body of water on the main inlet to said Fish Pond, known as Little Fish Pond, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Fish Pond, in Moxie Gore: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Fish Pond, Little, in Alder Brook Township: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Fish Pond, Little, in Holeb: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Flatiron Pond, in Ten Thousand Acre Tract: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Gammon Pond, in New Portland (also in Franklin County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Gander Brook Pond, in Dennistown Plantation: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

George, Lake: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: All tributaries to Lake George, in Canaan, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

George Durgin Pond, in T. 2, R. 6, or Upper Cold Stream Tract: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Gilman Pond, in Lexington and New Portland: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Goodwin's Brook: See Moose Lake, Great.

Great Moose Lake: See Moose Lake, Great.

Half Moon Pond, in Ripley (and in Dexter, Penobscot County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Hayden Lake, in Madison: See Wesserunsett Lake.

Heald Pond, in Moose River Plantation: Bag limit, not more than fifteen square-tailed trout or landlocked salmon in all, nor more than five pounds of said fish in all, per person per day. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 8.)

Heald Stream: That portion of Heald Stream between the old Harris and Holden Saw Mill Site, so-called, and Heald Pond in Moose River Plantation, and that portion of said stream which is situated in Bald Mountain Township, and any tributaries to said stream which are situated in Moose River Plantation or in Bald Mountain Township, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Higgins Stream: See Moose Lake, Great.

Hobbstown, waters in: Fly fishing only allowed for square-tailed trout in any stream or pond situated wholly or partly in T. 4 R. 6, or Hobbstown, so-called; bag limit, not more than five pounds of square-tailed trout in all per person per day in any of said waters. (R. & R.)

Holeb Pond, in Holeb: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Holeb Pond, in Attean and Holeb Townships: It is unlawful to take more than eight pounds of landlocked salmon, trout, and togue in all in any one day. (1927, c. 67.)

Horseshoe Pond (or O'Day Pond), in Pierce Pond Township: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Horseshoe Pond, in Ten Thousand Acre Tract: Fly fishing only.

(R. & R.)

Tributaries and Outlet Streams: Closed to all fishing.

(R. & R.)

Indian Ponds, Big and Little, in St. Albans: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Iron Pond, in T. 4, R. 6 (Hobbs town), and in T. 5, R. 6, B.K.P., W.K.R.: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all, nor more than ten fish, per person per day. (R. & R.)

Island Pond Tributaries and Outlet Streams (which pond is situated in Ten Thousand Acre Tract): Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Jackson Pond, in Concord: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Johnson Brook, in Pittsfield: That part of Johnson Brook, in Pittsfield, which is above the Johnson Bridge, so-called, on the county road leading from Burnham to Canaan, is closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Johnson Mountain Township: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of trout and salmon in all per person per day in any waters which are open to fishing. Fly fishing only allowed in any of the waters in this township, with the exception of Parlin Stream and Lake Parlin. (R. & R.)

Kennebec River, in Somerset County: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Kennebec River, between Moosehead Dam and Bingham: Closed season to May first on all fish. Fly fishing for landlocked salmon and trout permitted from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1917, c. 219, sec. 18; 1921, c. 73; 1929, c. 358.)

King Pond (or Middle Kilgore Pond), in Pierce Pond Town and in Bowtown: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Kingsbury Pond, in Brighton and Mayfield (partly in Piscataquis County): Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Laird Pond, in T. 2, R. 6, or Upper Cold Stream Tract, so-called: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lang Pond, in Parlin Pond Township: See Long Pond.

Lang Pond, Little, in T. 3, R. 7, known as Parlin Pond Town: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than six fish in all per person per day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 9.)

Lang Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in T. 3, R. 7: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Lang Stream, and Tributaries thereto: Closed to all fishing (R. & R.)

Lemon Stream: See Carrabasset River and Tributaries.

Lone Jack Pond: Fly fishing only. Bag limit, not more than six fish in all per person per day. (1931, c. 277, sec. 9.)

Long Pond, in Long Pond and Jackman Plantations: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

It is unlawful to take more than eight pounds of landlocked salmon, trout, and togue in all in any one day. (1927, c. 67.)

Long Pond (known as **Lang Pond**), in Parlin Pond Township: Open to fly fishing only, after June first of each year, under the general law. (1925, c. 13.)

Long Pond: See Martin Pond.

Long Pond, in Ten Thousand Acre Tract: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Lost Pond, in T. 5, R. 16: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)

Main Stream: See Moose Lake, Great.

Martin (or Long) Pond, in The Forks Plantation: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Mayfield Pond, in Mayfield: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

McKenney Pond, in Holeb Township: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of fish in all per person per day. (R. & R.)

Middle Kilgore Pond: See King Pond.

Misery Stream, a tributary to Brassua Lake: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Moose Horn Lake (formerly known as Shaw Pond), in T. 3, R. 4, B.K.P., W.K.R.: Unlawful to fish except by the ordinary way of angling with unbaited artificial flies, with barbless hooks, or by fly fishing with barbless hooks, so-called. Bag limit for any person or occupant of any one boat, not more than five fish in all in any one day. No trout less than ten inches in length shall be taken. All fish legally taken may be transported only from the place where they are caught to a lodge, camp, dwelling house, or hotel situated on the shore of said lake, or to a licensed taxidermist in this state for mounting purposes only. (1931, c. 65.)

Moose Lake, Great: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)

Tributaries: It is unlawful to fish at any time in any of the tributaries to Great Moose Lake, which lake is situated partly in Hartland and partly in Harmony, except that after the ice is out of said lake in the spring, it is lawful to fish in Main Stream, Goodwin's Brook, and the portion of Higgins Stream which is above the first bridge on said stream above the first dam. (R. & R.)

- Moose River**, between Brassua Lake and Moosehead Lake: Closed season to May first on all fish. Fly fishing for landlocked salmon and trout permitted from Sept. 15th to Sept. 30th, inclusive. (1917, c. 219, sec. 18; 1921, c. 73.)
- Moose River**, down to the head of Brassua Lake: It is unlawful to take more than eight pounds of landlocked salmon, trout, and togue in all in any one day. (1927, c. 67.)
- Moose River**, below Brassua Dam: Moose River, below Brassua Dam, is closed to all fishing for a distance of 500 feet, measuring down stream from the lower side of the cement work connected with said dam, or in the portion of said Moose River above said dam between the upper side thereof and a line parallel therewith passing through the two lower piers above said dam and about 300 feet distant therefrom. (R. & R.)
- Moosehead Lake Tributaries**: All tributaries to Moosehead Lake except Moose River (see Moose River for laws, and for rules and regulations thereon) are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)
- Morrill Pond**, in Hartland: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)
- Mosquito Stream**, a tributary to Lake Moxie: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)
- Moxie Lake**: It is unlawful to fish at any time in that portion of Lake Moxie, within or westerly of a straight line extending from a stake painted red standing on the most easterly point of Lewiston Island, so-called, opposite the Troutdale Cabins, to a like post on the most easterly end of the second point on the westerly shore of said lake, below Mosquito Stream, from Sept. 1st of each year until the ice is out of said Lake Moxie the following spring. (R. & R.)
- Moxie Lake Tributaries**: All tributaries to Lake Moxie, within the limits of any unorganized township, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)
- Mud Pond**, in Attean Township: See Wood Pond, Little.
- Mud Pond**, in Hartland: Open to ice fishing. (R. & R.)
- Mud Pond**, wholly or partly in Ten Thousand Acre Tract: Fly fishing only. (R. & R.)
- Tributaries**: Closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

Grand Lake, the outlet of which is Grand Lake Stream, and all other lakes and ponds whose outlets empty into said lake: White perch taken by means of hook and line may be sold and transported, within or without this state, in such quantities and under such rules and regulations as the commissioner of inland fisheries and game may establish. (1919, c. 68.)

It is unlawful to fish at any time in that part of Grand Lake, in Grand Lake Stream Plantation, between the dam at the outlet thereof and a line extending from a stake on or near Gin Point, so-called, 700 yards above said dam, to a stake on the easterly shore of said lake, said stakes being marked F. & G. and painted red; except that from said line to a line extending between similar stakes standing on the shores of said lake seventy-five yards above the fish screen at said dam, it shall be lawful to fish by fly fishing and trolling, from June 1st to Sept. 14th, inclusive. No person, or the occupants of one boat or canoe, shall take, in the above described portion of said lake open to fly fishing, more than three fish in all of landlocked salmon, trout or togue, or more than ten pounds in weight, in any one day. Provided, further, that it shall be lawful to take, catch, and kill by fly fishing only, and to have in possession, one fish daily between the last named line and a line drawn parallel to said fish screen and fifty feet northerly, or up stream, therefrom, but all fishing from any pier, wharf or boat house between the last named lines is hereby prohibited, and no bait taken from Big Lake, Long Lake, or any other bass waters shall be used in, or put into, said Grand Lake waters. (R. & R.)

Open to ice fishing during February and March for landlocked salmon, trout, togue and white perch. (1931, c. 277, sec. 13.)

Nash Lake (sometimes called East Maguerrawock Lake), in Robbinston and Calais: Open to ice fishing during February and March for landlocked salmon, trout, togue and pickerel; persons taking fish through the ice may convey them to their homes for consumption therein, but not otherwise. (1931, c. 277, sec. 7.)

Round Pond, in Charlotte: Black bass taken by means of hook and line may be sold and transported, within or without this state, in such quantities and under such rules and regulations

as the commissioner of inland fisheries and game may establish. (1919, c. 68.)

Trout Brook, in Harrington and Columbia: Those portions of Trout Brook from the bridge crossing said brook on the Marshville Road, so-called, to the source of said brook, and below the dam of the Athabasca Trout Association on said brook to tide water, are closed to all fishing. (R. & R.)

West Lake: Residents only permitted to fish through the ice. (R. & R.)

York County

The waters mentioned herein are those upon which there are special restrictions as to fishing. All other waters in York County are open to fishing, including ice fishing, under the provisions of the general laws. See pages 8 to 17 for general laws.

Fishing Season. The open season for fishing in York County shall be from April 15th to October 1st of each year. (1931, c. 277, sec. 45.)

Ice Fishing. The ice fishing season in York County shall be from December 15th of each year to March 1st of the following year. (1931, c. 277, sec. 45.)

Smelts: It is unlawful to take smelts in all the inland waters within the county of York, above tide waters, with a net. (1929, c. 194.)

Alewife Pond, in Kennebunk: Open to ice fishing only on Monday of each week during the open season for ice fishing. (1929, c. 347.)

Barker's Pond: Closed to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 53.)

Bauneg Beg Pond Tributaries (which pond is situated in Sanford and in North Berwick): Closed to all fishing, with exception of Great Works Brook and Goodall Brook. (See Great Works Brook and Goodall Brook for special regulations.) (R. & R.)

Boyd's Pond, in Limington: Closed to ice fishing. (R. & R.) It is unlawful to take any kind of fish at any time in Boyd's Pond in Limington. (R. & R.)

- Bunganut Lake:** Closed to ice fishing. (1931, c. 277, sec. 53.)
- Chase's Pond:** No person shall use any boat upon the waters of Chase's Pond, in the county of York, or fish therein, or in any way defile or pollute the waters thereof. Penalty, not more than \$20.00, or imprisonment for not more than 60 days. (1931, c. 105.)

Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all, or not more than five pounds of fish in all, per person per day. (R. & R.)
- Goose Pond,** in Shapleigh and Acton: Open to ice fishing from Saturday to Monday inclusive of each week during the month of February. (1931, c. 109.)
- Great Works Brook,** a tributary to Bauneg Beg Pond: Open to fishing on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week, under the general law, from the time the ice goes out until August 15th. Bag limit, not more than fifteen fish in all, or not more than five pounds of fish in all, per person per day. (R. & R.)
- Kennebunk Pond,** in Lyman: Closed to ice fishing. (1925, c. 20.)
- Little Ossipee Lake,** in Waterboro: See Ossipee Lake, Little.
- Little River, and its Tributaries,** in Cornish: Closed to all fishing except in that part of said river from the Trafton Bridge, so-called, to its confluence with the Saco River. (1929, c. 349.)
- Little River,** in Old Orchard, and all **Tributaries** to said river in Old Orchard: Bag limit, not more than five pounds of white perch in all per person per day. No white perch may be taken in said Little River, or in any of its tributaries, except for consumption as food in the family of the person taking the same. (R. & R.)

GAME LAWS

Sec. 40. Hunting, alien, jacklight, and trapping defined. (1929, c. 331, sec. 15.)

a. Hunting means to pursue, catch, take, kill, wound, or destroy wild birds and animals.

b. Alien is an unnaturalized foreign born person who is not a tax payer upon real estate in Maine and has not resided in Maine for the past two years continuously.

c. Jacklight when hunting means any artificial light when used in conjunction with a rifle larger than twenty-two caliber, and a twenty-two hipower is considered larger, or a shotgun loaded with buckshot or ball shells.

d. To trap shall also mean trap for.

Sec. 41. Hunting licenses for residents and non-residents; fees therefor. 1929, c. 331, sec. 16. 1931, cc. 108, 184, 208. No person shall hunt or have in his possession any wild bird or animal except in accordance with the following provisions:

1. Any resident and his immediate family may without license hunt on land owned by him, or leased by him and on which he is actually domiciled and which is used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

2. No resident shall otherwise hunt or have in his possession any wild bird or wild animal without first having procured from the commissioner of inland fisheries and game or his authorized agent a written license which shall be kept upon the person while hunting or transporting such birds and animals and exhibited to any warden, employee of this department, or guide upon request. All employees and soldiers regularly employed at the National Soldiers' Home shall be, and hereby are, classified as residents of this state for the purpose of obtaining hunting licenses, and shall pay the same fees and be held to the same laws, rules and regulations as residents of this state. The clerks of all towns are such authorized agents, and the commissioner may appoint additional agents. The license shall be issued to a resident by the clerk of the town in which the applicant resides, or if domiciled in an unorganized place, then by the clerk of the nearest town, upon payment of a fee of sixty-five cents, of which fifteen cents shall be retained by the town clerk. A combination hunting and fishing license may be issued on payment of one dollar and fifteen cents, fifteen cents to be retained by the town clerk.

3. No non-resident or alien shall hunt or have in his possession any wild bird or animal without first having procured from the commissioner or his authorized agent a written license which shall be kept upon the person while hunting or transporting such birds and animals and exhibited to any warden, employee of this department, or guide upon request. In addition to town clerks the commissioner may, subject to recall at his pleasure, designate additional agents to issue licenses.

The license to hunt wild birds, rabbits, raccoons, foxes and unprotected wild birds or wild animals only shall be issued on payment of five dollars and fifteen cents and to hunt both wild birds and wild animals on payment of fifteen dollars and fifteen cents, of which fifteen cents shall be retained by the agent issuing the license.

4. Each license shall expire on December thirty-first for the calendar year for which it is issued. Licenses may be issued prior to the date upon which such license may be in force. Application blanks and licenses shall be furnished by the commissioner in such form as he shall designate.

Each agent shall on the first of each month forward to the commissioner a report containing a list of the persons to whom he has issued licenses since his last report, the class of each license and the total amount of the funds by him collected, and shall at the same time forward to the commissioner the funds by him collected less the amount of fifteen cents, as above provided for each license, which funds shall be deposited in the state treasury by said commissioner.

5. Failure to produce such license within a reasonable time when requested by any authorized person shall be prima facie evidence of the violation of this section.

6. Hunting licenses shall not be issued to any non-resident under eighteen years of age unless the written consent of the parent or guardian is attached to the application. Any resident under the age of sixteen years may hunt without a license, provided he is accompanied by a parent or guardian at all times while in the fields or forests or on the waters or ice of the state with firearms in his possession.

6-A. Any person who, while in pursuit of wild game, shoots and kills a human being, through mistaking a human being for wild game, shall thereafter not be eligible to procure a hunting license nor shall any town clerk or other person authorized by law to issue such license, issue such license to such persons.

7. The funds collected by agents and the commissioner shall constitute a fund to be expended under the direction of the com-

missioner for the propagation and protection of wild birds, fish and animals. The fund shall not lapse from year to year but any funds collected in any one year may be used for that year and any succeeding year for said purposes.

Sec. 42. Trapping licenses; fees. (1929, c. 331, sec. 43. 1931, cc. 226, 257.)

Resident trapping license, state wide,	\$10.00 annually

Fee for sealing and stamping of each beaver skin by chief game warden,	2.00

Any resident who traps for any fur-bearing animal except rabbits shall annually procure a license therefor from the commissioner of inland fisheries and game.

Any resident under eighteen years of age can trap for any fur bearing animal except beaver in the organized townships without a trapping license; in unorganized townships a license is required.

Any resident of any age who traps for beaver or any fur bearing animal, except as above, must be licensed.

Any resident, or a member of his immediate family, may hunt or trap for fur bearing animals (except beaver) on land owned by him or on land leased by him within the limits of an organized township, and which land is used exclusively for agricultural purposes, without a license.

Each person licensed under the provisions of this section shall on or before December 31st of each year make such report to said commissioner as may be called for by him.

Whoever traps for any fur-bearing animal in violation of any provision of this section, or whoever fails to file the annual report required by this section, or whoever has in possession at any time any fur-bearing animal, or part thereof, taken in violation of any provision of this section, shall be subject to the penalties of section 107 of this chapter.

Sec. 43. Revocation of licenses. (1929, c. 331, sec. 49. 1931, c. 225, sec. 20; c. 147.) If the holder of a license issued by virtue of this chapter violates any of the game laws said license may be revoked by the commissioner at his discretion, and no new certificate shall be issued for a period of six months thereafter to such person. The commissioner may refuse to issue any license provided for by this chapter for a period of six months after a conviction for any violation of the fish and game laws by a person not holding a proper license at the time of such violation.

Sec. 44. Sunday hunting. (1929, c. 331, sec. 34.) Sunday is a closed season, on which it is not lawful to hunt any wild animals or wild birds of any kind.

Sec. 45. Night hunting. (1929, c. 331, sec. 35.) Hunting of wild birds is prohibited from sunset to half an hour before sunrise. Hunting of wild animals is prohibited from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise, with the exception of skunks and raccoons.

Sec. 46. Hunting from automobiles. (1929, c. 331, sec. 36.) It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt any wild bird or wild animal at any time from an automobile, or by aid or use of any light or lights carried thereon or attached thereto. It shall be unlawful for any person to have in possession, at any time, any wild bird or wild animal, or part thereof, taken in violation of any provision of this section. No person shall have a rifle or shotgun, either loaded or with a cartridge in the magazine thereof, in or on any motor vehicle while the same is upon any highway or in the fields or forests.

Sec. 46-A. Hunting from railways prohibited. (1931, c. 135.) It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt any wild bird or wild animal at any time, from a hand car, flat car, or any other car or vehicle moving along rails under its own power, or drawn along rails by an engine; or by aid or use of any light or lights carried thereon or attached thereto. It shall be unlawful for any person to have in possession, at any time, any wild bird or wild animal, or part thereof, taken in violation of any provision of this section. No person shall have a rifle or shotgun, either loaded or with a cartridge in the magazine thereof, in or on a hand car, flat car, or any other car or vehicle moving along rails under its own power, or drawn along rails by an engine.

Sec. 47. Silencers. (1929, c. 331, sec. 37.) The possession, sale, or use of any silencer, or of any gun, pistol or other firearms fitted with any silencer, is prohibited.

Sec. 48. Snares, swivel guns, or poison forbidden; traps to be labeled; bear traps to be enclosed. (1929, c. 331, sec. 44. 1931, c. 185) The use of snares, or of swivel, pivot or set guns, or of poison, or the use in any manner as a bait for trapping of any bird or animal protected by law, or any part or parts of any such bird or animal, is prohibited in the taking of wild birds or animals. Traps shall be plainly labeled with the full name and address of the person setting the same. Bear traps must be enclosed in a hut, or by at least two strands of barbed wire, one four

and one five feet from the ground, said wire to be securely held in position and to be not less than five yards at any point from the enclosed trap.

Sec. 49. Poisons. (1929, c. 331, sec. 45.) The leaving or depositing in any place of any poison or poisonous substance for the purpose of killing wolves, foxes, dogs or other animals, and not for the destruction of insects, or vermin in a building, is prohibited.

Sec. 50. Visiting and setting of Traps. (1921, c. 331, sec. 46. 1931, c. 87.) Any person setting a trap in any organized or incorporated place shall visit or cause the same to be visited at least once in every twenty-four hours, except water-sets, so-called, for mink and muskrat, and remove therefrom, or cause to be removed, any animal found caught therein. No person shall set a trap on or in any organized or incorporated place without first obtaining the written consent of the owner or occupant of the land on which said trap is to be set, or set a trap outside his own land, except a water-set trap, so-called, within half a mile of the compact or built-up portion of any city or village.

Sec. 51. Non-residents, kindling of fires, and employment of Guides. (1929, c. 331, sec. 51.) Non-residents shall not enter upon any unorganized townships, except public camp sites maintained by the Maine forestry department, during the months of May to December, and kindle fires thereon while camping or engaged in fishing or hunting without being in charge of a registered guide, or engaged in hunting in such territory, during the open season without being in charge of a registered guide and no such guide shall at the same time guide or be employed by more than five non-residents in hunting.

Sec. 52. Possession of firearms prima facie evidence of violation by non-resident. (1917, c. 219, sec. 62.) The possession of any firearm in the fields or forests or on the waters or ice of the state by any person who is not a bona fide resident of the state and actually domiciled therein, unless the person having such firearm in possession has in his possession a license, as provided by section forty-one of this chapter, duly issued to him and covering the period such firearm is found in his possession shall be prima facie evidence of hunting in violation of law.

Sec. 53. Destruction of property. (1929, c. 331, sec. 63.) No person shall tear down any fence, leave open any gate, or trample or destroy any crops while hunting, trapping or fishing.

Sec. 54. Importation of wild birds or animals. (1929, c. 331, sec. 22.) No person shall introduce or import any wild

bird or wild animal, except for captivity purposes, or the dead body thereof, without written permission of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game.

Sec. 55. Federal regulations on migratory game birds to govern. (1929, c. 331, sec. 17. 1931, c. 193, sec. 1.) No person shall hunt or have in his possession any eagle, Hungarian partridge or capercaillie, cock of the woods, or any black game, or species of the pheasant, except ruffed grouse or partridge.

There shall be a closed season on partridge from November tenth to September thirtieth of the following year, both days inclusive, and no person shall, during the open season, have in possession in any one day more than four partridge, or in any one open season for partridge or ruffed grouse more than twenty-five of the above named birds, nor shall any person at any time buy or sell any partridge or ruffed grouse.

It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, capture, kill, take, possess, buy, or sell any migratory game bird at any time; but it shall not be deemed to be a violation of this chapter to hunt, capture, kill, take, possess, buy, or sell any migratory game bird or part thereof at the times, in the manner and numbers, and by the means specifically permitted by regulations adopted and approved pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act (Act of Congress approved July 3, 1918).

No person or corporation shall carry or transport from place to place any partridge or any migratory game bird in closed season, except that a person shall have a reasonable time after the beginning of closed season to transport, as hereinafter provided, to his home, game birds or migratory game birds legally killed by him in open season, nor in open season unless open to view, tagged and plainly labeled with owner's name and residence, and accompanied by him, unless tagged with a transportation tag as hereinafter provided; nor shall any person or corporation carry or transport in any one day, as the property of one person, more than four partridge, nor a larger number of any migratory game birds than may legally be taken under federal regulations. Provided, however, it shall be lawful for a citizen of this state who has purchased a transportation tag, paying therefor five dollars, to take with him out of the state birds which he himself has lawfully killed. Provided, further, that any citizen of this state who has lawfully in his possession one pair of partridge, or one pair of migratory game birds, may send the same anywhere in this state without accompanying the same, by purchasing therefor a transportation tag, paying therefor fifty cents, and attaching said tag to the pair of birds. Provided, further, that no person shall under any of

the provisions of this paragraph send as aforesaid more than one pair of game birds or migratory game birds once in seven days.

Provided, further, that it shall be unlawful to hunt at any time, any curlew, wood duck, swan, or any shore bird, except as may be permitted under federal regulations.

(NOTICE. See page 116 for Federal regulations on migratory game birds.)

Sec. 56. Nets, traps, snares, and guns. (1929, c. 331, sec. 18.) No person shall hunt with net, trap, snare, or contrivance other than the usual method of shooting with a gun, which gun shall not be larger than number ten gauge, any bird of any variety in anywise protected by law and such prohibited implements or devices are contraband and may be seized and ordered destroyed as in the case of gambling devices.

Sec. 57. Use of live decoys and blinds. (1929, c. 331, sec. 19.) Not more than twelve live decoys shall be allowed in any one flock when hunting water fowl. Only one flock at the same time may be placed in the water by one boat or blind. No flock shall be placed nearer than fifty yards to a flock already set or being set.

No boat shall be allowed in said waters for hunting purposes earlier than one and one-half hours before sunrise, nor shall any duck decoys be allowed to remain in said waters between the hours of sunset and one hour before sunrise.

No artificial cover which is termed stationary blind or parts thereof used for gunning purposes shall be left or allowed to remain in the waters of Merrymeeting bay in the counties of Cumberland and Sagadahoc, or the tributaries thereof, excepting Kennebec River, within one mile of the waters of Merrymeeting Bay, between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise.

This section shall apply to the waters of the Kennebec river up to a point one mile above Swan Island.

(NOTICE. A recent Federal regulation provides that "in the hunting of wild geese not more than ten (10) live goose decoys may be used or shot over at any one gunning stand, blind, or floating device.")

Sec. 58. Other than game birds protected; "game birds" and "migratory game birds" defined. (1929, c. 331, sec. 20, 1931, c. 193, sec. 2.) No person shall have in his possession, living or dead, any wild bird, other than a game bird or a migratory game bird. No part of the plumage, skin or body of any bird protected by this section shall be sold or had in possession for sale. Nor shall any person take or needlessly destroy the nest or the eggs of any wild bird, nor have such nest or eggs in possession.

The English or European house sparrow, the common crow, and the hawks, owls and kingfishers, are not included among the birds therein protected; and for the purpose of this chapter the partridge, or ruffed grouse, only shall be considered a game bird, and the following only shall be considered migratory game birds: Anatidae or waterfowl, including brant, wild ducks, geese, and swans; gruidae or cranes, including little brown, sandhill, and whooping cranes; rallidae or rails, including coots, gallinules, and sora and other rails; limicolae or shorebirds, including avocets, curlew, dowitchers, godwits, knots, oyster catchers, phalaropes, plovers, sandpipers, snipe, stilts, surf birds, turnstones, willet, woodcock and yellowlegs; columbidae or pigeons, including doves and wild pigeons. Nothing in this section, however, shall be construed to affect in any way the protection of game birds or migratory game birds as provided in section fifty-five of this chapter.

Sec. 59. Hunting from boats. (1929, c. 331, sec. 21.) No person shall at any time use a boat propelled by any other mode than the ordinary sailboat, rowboat or canoe in hunting any sea birds, duck, or waterfowl in any inland or tidal waters of this state.

Sec. 60. Hunting of moose and caribou prohibited; importation. (1929, c. 331, sec. 24.) No person shall hunt or have in his possession any caribou or moose, or parts thereof. The commissioner of inland fisheries and game upon application of any person who has legally killed a caribou or moose beyond the limits of this state may issue a license permitting the importation of the same for consumption or mounting, but not for sale.

Sec. 61. Closed time on deer in certain counties. (1929, c. 331, sec. 25. 1931, cc. 63, 187, 232.) There shall be an annual closed season on deer in the county of Aroostook from December 1st of each year to October 15th of the following year, both days inclusive; and in the counties of Androscoggin, Cumberland, Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, Waldo and York, from December 1st of each year to October 31st of the following year, both days inclusive, and in the counties of Washington, Hancock, Penobscot, Somerset, Piscataquis, Franklin and Oxford, from December 16th of each year to October 31st of the following year, both days inclusive, except that on the island of Mount Desert, and in the town of Deer Isle, and in the town of Stonington, in the county of Hancock, and on Cross Island and on Scotch Island, in the county of Washington, and in Isle au Haut, in the county of Knox, and on Swan Island, in the county of Sagadahoc, and in game sanctuaries as established by law, where closed season is perpetual, during which said closed seasons, except as hereinafter provided, it shall be unlawful to hunt any deer or have in posses-

sion any part thereof; and no person shall during the open seasons above named, except as hereinafter provided, kill or have in possession, more than one deer or part thereof. A person lawfully killing a deer in open season shall have a reasonable time in which to transport the same to his home and may have the same in possession at his home in closed season.

If a deer is found doing actual, substantial damage to any growing cultivated crops, the cultivator of such crops may kill the deer and consume the same in his own family but not otherwise; but he shall not pursue the deer beyond the limits of his cultivated land in which the damage is being done. Whoever kills a deer in accordance with these provisions shall immediately give notice of such fact to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, and the character and estimated amount of damage done. Whoever shall cultivate any crops for the manifest purpose of killing deer under the provisions of this paragraph shall in no wise be protected thereby; and it shall be unlawful to place salt or any other bait or food in any place for the purpose of enticing deer thereto. Any dead deer found in the woods not having a tag identifying the owner thereof shall be subject to seizure and confiscation by the department.

Sec. 62. Dogs, jacklights, snares, traps, etc. (1929, c. 331, sec. 26.) No person shall at any time hunt with a dog, jacklight, artificial light, snare, trap, swivel, pivot or set gun, any deer, caribou or moose.

Sec. 63. Sale or possession of jacklights, or swivel, pivot, or set guns. (1929, c. 331, sec. 27. 1931, c. 43.) No person shall offer for sale, sell or purchase any jacklight, or light fitted for night hunting. No person shall have in possession any jacklight, swivel, pivot or set gun, nor any spear, trawl or net, except such as are authorized for the taking of suckers, eels, hornpouts and yellow perch.

Any person convicted of illegal night hunting shall forfeit such firearms, jack-lights, or any other equipment used or usable in the illegal night hunting at the time of such violation.

Sec. 64. Dogs hunting moose, caribou or deer. (1929, c. 331, sec. 28.) No person shall permit any dog owned by him to hunt moose, caribou or deer.

Sec. 65. Dogs chasing game shall be killed. (1929, c. 331, sec. 29. 1931, c. 51.) Any officer may kill a dog which he finds in the act of hunting moose, caribou or deer, or worrying any domestic animal, when said dog is outside of the enclosure or immediate care of its owner or keeper. Any owner of sheep, or custodian of sheep, shall have a right to kill a dog attacking said

sheep. Any person having any evidence of any dog hunting moose, caribou or deer, or of any dog kept and used for the purpose, or of any dog worrying, wounding or killing any domestic animal or fowl, or any red, silver, silver black, or black foxes in captivity, when said dog is outside of the enclosure or immediate care of his owner or keeper, may present said evidence to any trial justice or judge of any municipal court, which said trial justice or judge shall have power to issue a warrant against the owner of said dog, ordering him to appear before him and show cause why said dog should not be killed; and upon hearing the evidence in said case said court may order said dog killed. Any person may lawfully kill a dog which suddenly assaults him or another person.

Sec. 66. Transportation of deer beyond the limits of State. (1929, c. 331, sec. 30. 1931, c. 141.) No person shall sell or give away any deer or part thereof to be transported or carried beyond the limits of this state nor shall any person buy or accept as a gift any deer or part thereof to so transport the same; nor shall any resident of this state at any time carry or transport in any manner, or attempt to carry or transport in any manner, beyond the limits of this state any deer or part thereof.

Sec. 67. Transportation of deer within State. (1929, c. 331, sec. 31.) Except as herein provided no person or corporation shall at any time carry or transport any deer or part thereof unless open to view, tagged, and plainly labeled with the name and residence of the owner thereof, and accompanied by him while being transported and identified by him at one of the places which the commissioner of inland fisheries and game shall have designated by publication in the daily newspapers in the state. No person not the actual owner of such deer or part thereof, shall aid another in such transportation by representing himself to be the owner thereof, and it shall be prima facie evidence that said deer, or part thereof, that is being transported or carried in violation of this section, was illegally killed.

Sec. 68. Deer transportation tags. (1929, c. 331, sec. 32.) Any citizen of the state who has lawfully killed a deer may send the same to his home in his own name, or to any hospital in the state, without accompanying the same, by purchasing of an agent appointed therefor by the commissioner of inland fisheries and game a tag, paying therefor two dollars, and said tag shall be attached to the deer, or part thereof, being transported.

Sec. 69. Lumber camps not to serve deer as food. (1929, c. 331, sec. 33.) No owner or keeper of any camp, house, or other building, used partly or wholly in lumbering operations, or

employee thereof, shall use, consume, or have in possession at any time, at said camp, or serve to any employee thereof, any deer or moose or part thereof.

Sec. 70. Gray squirrels. (1929, c. 331, sec. 38.) There shall be an annual open season on gray squirrels from October first to October thirty-first inclusive of each year; provided that there shall be a perpetual closed season on gray squirrels within all public or private parks, and within the limits of the compact or built-up portion of any city or village.

Sec. 71. Wild hares or rabbits; snares and nets; transportation. (1929, c. 331, sec. 39.) The annual open season on wild hares or rabbits shall be from October first to February twenty-eighth in the counties of Androscoggin, Sagadahoc, Cumberland and York, and from October first to March thirty-first in all other counties. During these closed seasons it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt or have any rabbits or parts thereof in possession, except alive. No person shall set or use any snares or traps, or any other device in the hunting of wild hares or rabbits, or hunt the same in any except the ordinary method of shooting with guns; provided that box traps may be used during the open seasons provided by this section. No dead wild hares or rabbits may be transported beyond the limits of the State of Maine, except that the holder of a non-resident hunting license may transport wild hares or rabbits, legally killed by him, by virtue of the transportation tag attached to his said non-resident hunting license.

Sec. 72. Open season on fur-bearing animals; general provisions. (1930, Special Session, c. 368. 1931, c. 127.) The open season in the **northern counties** for hunting and trapping any fur-bearing animal (see NOTE) is from October 16 to January 31, both days inclusive; in the **southern counties** the open season is from November 16 to January 31, both days inclusive.

(NOTE: The open season on wild hares and rabbits will be found in section 71. There is no closed season on bob-cats, loup-cervier or Canada lynx, as there is a bounty on these animals provided by section 77. The open season on muskrat is provided in sub-section (a), following.)

(a) Provided that in the **northern counties** there shall be open seasons on **muskrat** from April 1 to April 30, both days inclusive, and from November 1 to November 30, both days inclusive; and that in the **southern counties** there shall be an open season on muskrat from March 20 to April 20, both days inclusive.

NORTHERN COUNTIES: Arrostook, Franklin, Hancock, Oxford, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Somerset, Washington.

SOUTHERN COUNTIES: Androscoggin, Cumberland, Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, Waldo, York.

(b) Provided, further, that it shall be unlawful for any person to set a trap at any time within twenty-five feet of, or to molest or destroy, a muskrat house.

(c) The black bear is hereby classified as a game animal, with an open season thereon in each county of the state corresponding to the open season on deer; except that bear may be legally taken, in any town, plantation or unincorporated place where a bounty has been, or may be, declared under the provisions of section 79.

(d) Provided, further, that it shall be lawful to hunt skunks and raccoons at night when accompanied by a dog and using a rifle not larger than the regular 22 caliber (the 22 caliber hi-power being hereby expressly prohibited), or a shotgun not larger than 12 gauge, using not larger than No. 2 shot, and a **kerosene light**, from October 1 to December 15, both days inclusive, in the counties of Androscoggin, Cumberland, York, Sagadahoc, Kennebec, Lincoln, Waldo, Knox, and Oxford only.

(e) Provided, further, that whoever at any time hunts or traps for or has in possession any beaver, or part thereof, (except as provided in the following section) and whoever molests or destroys a beaver house, or sets a trap within twenty-five feet thereof, shall be subject to the penalties of this chapter.

(f) Provided, however, that any person may lawfully kill any wild animal (other than beaver) or any wild bird found destroying his property.

(g) Provided, further, that fox hounds when properly collared, showing name and residence of the owner or keeper, may be trained under the supervision of their owner or keeper from September 15 to November 15.

(h) Provided, further, that nothing in this section shall be held to repeal any special muskrat law, now in effect, that relates to any particular stream or waters.

Sec. 73. Commissioner may declare open season on beaver and muskrat; transportation. (1929, c. 331, sec. 40. 1931, c. 257.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game may, upon written complaint of a water company, declare an open season upon beaver or muskrat that are polluting water supplies; or, on written complaint of a land owner, the commissioner may declare an open season upon beaver that are doing actual, substantial damage to property. During such open seasons it shall be lawful for any person holding a beaver trapping

license to trap beaver and muskrat without the consent of the land owner. Before said open season for beaver shall take effect, the commissioner shall cause a notice of such proposed open season to be published once in a newspaper printed in the county in which the land is located, and said commissioner shall also file a copy of said notice of open season with the clerk of the town or plantation in which such land is located, or, if the land is in an unorganized place, with the clerk of courts for the county in which the land is located. The commissioner may suspend said open season whenever it shall appear to him that the privileges are being abused. No person shall take beaver anywhere in the state at any time except during such open season as may be declared by the commissioner in accordance with the provisions of this section. It shall also be unlawful for any person to have in possession at any time any beaver, or part thereof, taken in violation of any provision of this section. It shall also be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to sell, give away, buy, accept as a gift, offer for transportation or transport any beaver skin or beaver skins unless each skin is marked with an official seal by the chief game warden of the department of inland fisheries and game in whose district such beaver skin or beaver skins were taken. All beaver skins shall be marked within thirty days from the closing of the open period.

Sec. 74. Muskrats, special provisions. (1929, cc. 186, 341. 1931, c. 73.) It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, trap, kill pursue or catch any muskrat, or muskrats, at any time in the stream running from Swetts Pond to Penobscot River in the town of Orrington in the county of Penobscot.

It shall be unlawful for any person to trap any muskrat or muskrats in Sourdabscook Stream from the point where the state highway crosses said stream in the village of Carmel in the town of Carmel, to its junction with the Penobscot River, or in any of the tributaries to said stream between the two points hereinbefore mentioned.

Whoever violates any provision of the two preceding paragraphs shall be subject to a penalty of not less than ten dollars and costs for each offense, and three dollars additional for each muskrat or part thereof hunted, killed, trapped, pursued, caught, or had in possession, in violation hereof.

For a period of four years from July 3, 1931, it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, trap, kill, pursue or catch any muskrat or muskrats in Wilson Lake or on the shores thereof in the town of Wilton or in the main stream known as Coos Brook which flows into said lake, from the lake up said stream to the Wilkins

bridge, so-called, or to have in possession during the same period any muskrat or muskrats or any part thereof taken in said waters. Whoever violates any provision of this paragraph shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than three hundred dollars, and costs for each offense and three dollars additional for each muskrat or part thereof hunted, killed, trapped, pursued, caught, or had in possession in violation hereof.

Sec. 75. Digging out foxes forbidden. (1929, c. 331, sec. 42.) No person shall at any time dig out, molest, or destroy, in any way, any fox den or hole, or set any trap in any such den or hole, or remove or cause to be removed from such den or hole any fox, except those enclosed in private fox ranches.

Sec. 76. Silver, silver black, or black foxes. (1929, c. 271.) Any person owning or breeding silver, silver black, or black foxes shall have the same property rights therein as enjoyed by owners or breeders of domestic animals.

No person shall enter an enclosure within which silver, silver black, or black foxes are kept for breeding purposes without the permission of the owner.

No person shall knowingly and wilfully kill, trap or injure any silver, silver black, or black fox owned by another person without the consent of the owner.

Sec. 77. Bounty on bob-cat, loupcevrier, and Canada lynx. (1929, c. 331, sec. 47. 1931, c. 142.) During the period commencing August first, 1931 and ending July 31, 1933, a bounty of twenty dollars for every bob-cat, loupcevrier or Canada lynx killed in any town shall be paid by the treasurer of state to the person killing it upon compliance with the following conditions:

No bounty shall be paid unless the claimant, within five days after he has killed such animal, or has returned from the hunting in which he killed it, exhibits to the town treasurer the entire skin thereof, with the ears, nose and tail thereon in as perfect a state as when killed, except natural decay, and signs a certificate under oath, which said treasurer may administer, stating that he killed such animal and the time and place within the state, and the treasurer shall thereupon cut off the whole of the tail from the skin and forward the same by mail to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, together with the claimant's certificate (in the form prescribed by sec. 77, c. 38, R. S.; blanks for this purpose may be obtained from the town treasurer. Upon the same blank will be found the form of certificate to be made out by the town treasurer.)

Upon receipt by the state auditor of a certificate from the commissioner showing that said commissioner has received the tail of the bob-cat, loupcevrier or Canada lynx from the treasurer sent

as aforesaid, together with said treasurer's certificate, said state auditor shall audit the claim for bounty and the same shall be paid forthwith by the treasurer of state to the claimant. The town treasurer for administering the oath to a claimant's certificate as above, and for forwarding the same with the tail of the animal to the commissioner shall be paid by the claimant the sum of twenty-five cents.

Sec. 78. Bounty on porcupines and hedgehogs. (1927, c. 249. 1929, c. 366. 1931, c. 249.) A bounty of twenty-five cents for each and every porcupine, or hedgehog, so-called, killed in any town or unincorporated place, in the state, shall be paid by the treasurer of such town to the person killing it, except that in the Maine Forestry District, such bounty shall be paid only in case such animal is killed between the fifteenth day of October and the first day of April in each year, both days inclusive. If the animal is killed in an unincorporated place, the bounty shall be paid by the treasurer of an adjoining town, if any, otherwise by the treasurer of the nearest town. No bounty shall be paid unless the claimant within two days after he has killed such animal or has returned from the hunting, in which he killed it, exhibits to the town treasurer the entire nose and feet thereof, in as perfect a state as when killed, and signs and makes oath to a certificate.

Not more than five thousand dollars a year shall be expended for porcupine bounties.

NOTE. Apply to Town Treasurers, or to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Game, for further information regarding this bounty.

Sec. 79. Bounty on bears in towns where damage is being caused to valuable domestic animals. (1929, c. 261.) When bear are destroying sheep, cattle or any other kind of valuable domestic animals in any town, plantation or unincorporated place and if compensation therefor is paid after July first, 1928, the assessors of such town or plantation may petition the commissioner of inland fisheries and game for authority to place a bounty on bears killed within such town or plantation or in any adjoining town, plantation or unincorporated place or places, and in the case of unincorporated places, a similar petition may be filed by the assessors of any adjoining town or of the nearest incorporated town where there are none adjoining, to place a bounty on bears killed within such unincorporated place. Upon receipt of the petition from the assessors, the commissioner of inland fisheries and game shall give due notice and hold a hearing. Unless said hearing discloses that damages to valuable domestic animals are

not being caused by bear, the commissioner shall authorize such bounty to be paid as hereinafter set forth, which shall continue in full force until the commissioner after due notice and hearing shall annul such authorization.

A bounty of twenty-five dollars for each and every bear killed in said towns or plantations shall be paid to persons killing the same. These bounties shall be paid by the treasurer of said towns or plantations.

No bounty shall be paid, unless the claimant, within twenty-four hours after he has killed such animal, exhibits to the town treasurer the entire animal or the skin of the animal, for the killing of which such bounty is claimed, with the nose thereof in as perfect a state as when killed, and signs and makes oath to a certificate.

NOTE: Apply to Town Treasurers, or State Treasurer, for further information regarding this bounty.

Sec. 80. Transportation of game by non-resident licenses. (1917, c. 219, sec. 60. 1919, c. 196, sec. 21. 1925, c. 195. 1927, c. 240, sec. 2.) Each deer hunting license, so-called, shall be provided with a coupon which shall permit the transportation of the carcass of one deer or part thereof, which coupon shall be divided into two sections lettered "A" and "B." The holder of a non-resident deer hunting license shall present to the agent of any transportation company his license, with the coupon attached. The agent shall detach section "A," cancel the same by writing or stamping thereon the date, place of shipment, and his name, and shall forward the same forthwith to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game at Augusta, Maine; section "B" shall likewise be cancelled and attached to the carcass, or part of the carcass, of the deer offered for shipment and shall remain attached to the same while it is being transported in this state.

Sec. 81. No game birds or animals shall be transported unless owner possesses license. (1929, c. 331, sec. 48.) It shall be unlawful for any person to offer for transportation to any carrier and no carrier shall accept for transportation any game birds or animals, unless such person shall have in his possession at the time a license as herein provided, duly issued to him under the provisions of this chapter.

Sec. 82. Transportation of deer and game birds; animals or birds transported shall be tagged. (1929, c. 331, sec 50.) No person, carrier, or agent shall receive for shipment, or transport, any carcass of a deer or part of the same, or any game birds, for a non-resident, except as provided in this chapter, or refuse

or neglect to detach and forward to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game the sections of the coupons as provided. Any person who has purchased a non-resident hunter's license may ship, once in thirty days, one pair of game birds, legally in his possession, to his home or to any hospital in this state, without accompanying the shipment, by purchasing of the duly constituted agent therefor a tag, paying him fifty cents, and by presenting said tag with the pair of game birds offered for shipment to the agent of the carrier, together with his non-resident hunter's license. Before accepting a pair of game birds for shipment, the agent of the carrier shall be satisfied that the person presenting the same is the person to whom the non-resident hunter's license offered for inspection was issued. No non-resident shall transport, or have transported, any wild animals or wild birds unless the same are properly tagged, said tags bearing the approval of a warden, deputy warden, or the commissioner.

AROOSTOOK AND SOMERSET COUNTY GAME PRESERVES

Under the provisions of Chapter 158 of the Resolves of 1929, the department of forestry and the department of fish and game, jointly, were empowered to set aside for a period of ten years a tract of land not to exceed four townships in each of the counties of Aroostook, Hancock, Penobscot, Oxford, Somerset and Washington as game preserves. These preserves to be located as far from the cleared area of the counties as possible and to consist in each case of a block of four townships unless by virtue of natural boundaries, a smaller area would in the judgment of the commissioners be advisable. All warden service and the necessary marking of lines shall be taken care of by the present force of the fish and game department. Fishing and camping to be allowed under the general law, but no hunting or trapping. It shall be unlawful to transport either firearms or traps across the boundaries of these preserves or engage in hunting or trapping within the lines as laid out by the department of forestry and the department of fish and game.

Aroostook Game Preserve, set aside on July 18, 1930, as follows: 12 Range 13, 12 Range 12, 11 Range 13, and 11 Range 12, all within the county of Aroostook.

Somerset Game Preserve, set aside on July 18, 1930, as follows: Sandwich Academy Grant; that part of Misery Gore lying between Sandwich Academy Grant and Misery Township; Misery Township; and the Ten Thousand Acre Tract, all within the county of Somerset.

Sec. 91. Hunting or possession of firearms within limits of game preserves forbidden; exceptions. (1929, c. 331, sec. 23. 1931, cc. 85; 225, sec. 26.) No person shall at any time hunt, chase, catch, kill or destroy any wild birds or wild animals or have in his possession firearms of any description within the limits of any game preserve or closed territory except as provided in this chapter, and except that the commissioner is hereby authorized to use such means as may seem necessary to exterminate vermin of any description in all game preserves and sanctuaries and in any other localities where damage is being done.

Sec. 92. Licenses for taxidermists. (1929, c. 331, sec. 52.) Resident taxidermists shall pay an annual license fee of five dollars. Unnaturalized, foreign-born residents shall pay an annual license fee of twenty-five dollars. Apply to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, at Augusta, for further information, and for application blank for such license.

Sec. 93. Licenses for dealers in deer skins and heads. (1929, c. 331, sec. 53.) Residents of this state may purchase, for an annual fee of twenty-five dollars, a license to buy and sell deer skins, and the heads of deer if not detached from said skins, during the months of January, October, November and December. Apply to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, at Augusta, for further information, and for application blank for such license.

Sec. 94. Dealers in furs. (1929, c. 331, sec. 54.) Residents of this state may purchase, for an annual fee of twenty-five dollars, a license to engage in the business of buying the skins of any fur-bearing animals. Apply to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, at Augusta, for further information, and for application blank for such license.

Sec. 95. Marketmen, provision dealers, etc., selling deer. (1929, c. 331, sec. 55.) Any marketman or provision dealer, proprietor of sporting camp, hotel or eating place, having an established place of business in this state, may annually purchase and have in possession at his place of business not more than two deer, lawfully killed or destroyed, or any part thereof, and may sell the same at retail to his local customers, and may sell the heads of such deer to any licensed taxidermist; provided, however, that he shall annually procure a license of the commissioner of

inland fisheries and game paying therefor five dollars. He shall keep a record, open to the inspection of wardens, of the name and residence of each person of whom he purchases any deer and the date of such purchase. Apply to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, at Augusta, for application blank for such license.

Sec. 96. Seizure of game for violation of law; disposition of same. (1929, c. 331, sec. 56.) Birds, fish, game, or fur-bearing animals, or parts thereof, found in possession of any person or corporation in violation of this chapter, shall be liable to seizure, and in case of conviction for such violation shall be forfeited to the state to be sold by the officer making such seizure for the benefit of the state. Any person whose fish or game has been seized for violation shall have the same returned to him on giving to the officer a bond, with resident sureties, conditioned that, if convicted, he will pay such fine and costs within thirty days. If he neglects or refuses to give such bond and take the fish or game, he shall have no action against the officer for such seizure or for the loss of the fish or game seized.

In case the warden making the seizure finds that the fish or game seized will be unsuitable for food, or other use, at the day fixed for the hearing on such seizure, he shall dispose of the same for consumption in this state, and shall hold the proceeds of such sale subject to order of the court. If the magistrate finds the claimant is not entitled to said fish or game, the officer making the seizure shall be ordered by the magistrate to forward the proceeds thereof to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game and by him to be paid to the treasurer of state.

Sec. 97. Officer seizing fish or game to report. (1917, c. 219, sec. 82.) In all cases, the officer making any seizure or sale of fish or game shall, within ten days, report to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game all the particulars thereof.

Sec. 98. Commissioner or wardens may make arrest or search without warrants. (1929, c. 331, sec. 57.) The commissioner of inland fisheries and game, wardens and deputy wardens may arrest, with or without a warrant, any person whom he has reason to believe guilty of a violation of any provision of this chapter, and with or without a warrant, may open, enter and examine all buildings, camps, vessels, boats, wagons, cars, motor vehicles, stages, tents, and other receptacles and places, and examine all boxes, barrels, and packages where he has reason to believe that birds, fish, game, or other wild animals, or parts thereof, taken or held in violation of this chapter, are to be found, and seize such birds, fish, game, or other wild animals, or parts

thereof, if any be found therein; but no dwelling house shall be searched for the above purposes without a warrant, and then only in the day time, and no sealed railroad car shall be entered for the above purposes without such warrant. Any magistrate may issue warrants to search within his jurisdiction any dwelling house or premises for the purpose above set forth; provided, however, that the commissioner shall, on or before the first day of October of each year, in writing, notify the superintendents of all transportation companies doing business within the state, of the names of the wardens and deputy wardens by them designated to exercise the right of search of railroad cars as herein provided.

Sec. 99. Disposition of money received under this chapter. (1929, c. 338.) All fines and penalties recovered and money received, or collected under any provisions of this chapter, shall be paid within thirty days by the person receiving the same to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, to be paid by him to the treasurer of state. Any officer or person who shall fail to remit within thirty days any fine or penalty, or any sum of money received under the provisions of the fish and game laws, shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution for each offense.

Sec. 100. Jurisdiction of offenses; court proceedings; penalties. (1929, c. 331, sec. 58.) Any officer authorized to enforce the inland fish and game laws may, without process, arrest any violator of said laws, and shall with reasonable diligence cause him to be taken before any trial justice or any municipal court, in the county where the offense was committed, or in any adjoining county, for a warrant and trial. Jurisdiction in such cases is hereby granted to all trial justices and all other courts to be exercised in the same manner as if the offense had been committed in that county.

Sec. 101. Jurisdiction. (1929, c. 331, sec. 60.) Trial justices, police and municipal courts within their counties shall have original and concurrent jurisdiction with the superior court in all prosecutions under any provision of this chapter.

Sec. 101-A. Fish and game wardens may accept personal recognizances in certain cases. (1931, c. 84.) Any warden of the department of inland fisheries and game making an arrest for any violation of any provision of this chapter at a point more than fifty miles distant from the nearest trial justice, police or municipal court having jurisdiction may accept the personal recognizance of the prisoner in the sum of not exceeding one hundred dollars for his appearance before the nearest trial justice, police or municipal court on a specified date and a deposit in

money to the amount of said recognizance. Said warden shall forthwith report all such recognizances and forward all such deposits to the court to which such recognizance is returnable.

If such person fails to appear in said court on the day specified, either in person or by counsel, the court shall order the recognizance and money deposited as aforesaid forfeited, and shall notify the commissioner of inland fisheries and game of said default and forfeiture who shall revoke any and all licenses or permits held by said respondent issued under the provisions of this chapter.

All money forfeited as aforesaid shall be immediately paid over to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game.

Sec. 102. Violations may be settled by commissioner; fines to be applied to department. (1917, c. 219, sec. 87.) The provisions of section 95 of chapter 50 (R. S.), relating to the powers of the commissioners of sea and shore fisheries, are hereby extended to the commissioner of inland fisheries and game.

Sec. 103. Violation by a corporation. (1929, c. 331, sec. 61.) In case of violation of any provision of this chapter by a corporation, the warrant may be served by an attested copy on the president, secretary, manager, or any general agent thereof in the county where the action is pending.

Sec. 104. County attorneys to prosecute violations. (1917, c. 219, sec. 89.) Each county attorney shall prosecute all violations of this chapter occurring within his county, when such cases may come to his knowledge, or when he may be so requested by the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, or any officer charged with its enforcement; such prosecution shall at all times be subject to the supervision and control of the commissioner.

Sec. 105. Testimony of participant. (1917, c. 219, sec. 90.) In any prosecution under this chapter, any participant in a violation thereof, when so requested by any officer instituting the prosecution, may be compelled to testify as a witness against any other person charged with violating the same, but his evidence so given shall not be used against himself in any prosecution for such violation.

Sec. 106. Reports on Court cases. (1929, c. 331, sec. 62.) Every magistrate or the clerk of the court before whom any prosecution under this chapter is commenced, or shall go on appeal, within twenty days after the trial or dismissal thereof, shall report in writing the result thereof and the amount of fines collected, if any, and disposition thereof, to the commissioner.

Sec. 107. Penalties. (1929, c. 331, sec. 64. 1931, cc. 207; 225, sec. 14.) Whoever violates any of the foregoing provisions and rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, or rules and regulations heretofore promulgated and still in force and effect, excepting only those for the violation of which specific penalties have been hereinbefore provided, may be punished by a fine of not more than three hundred dollars and costs, or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or by both said fine and imprisonment.

(a) Whoever violates any provision of this chapter relating to beaver shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars and costs for each beaver or skin involved, or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or by both said fine and imprisonment.

(b) Whoever violates the provisions of section forty-nine shall be punished by a fine of not less than two hundred dollars, nor more than three hundred dollars and costs, or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or by both said fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 108. Possession of firearms or fishing tackle prima facie evidence of violation by resident. (1919, c. 173, sec. 9. 1923, c. 121, sec. 7.) The possession of any firearm or fishing tackle in the fields or forests or on the waters or ice of the state by a resident of this state, unless the person having such firearm or fishing tackle in possession has in his possession a certificate of registration, duly issued to him and covering the period such firearm or fishing tackle is found in his possession, or gives satisfactory evidence of the issuance of such certificate, shall be prima facie evidence of hunting or fishing in violation of the laws of this state.

Sec. 109. Expiration date of licenses. (1931, c. 91.) All licenses and permits issued under the provisions of this chapter, with the exception of the thirty-day non-resident fishing license, shall expire on December thirty-first following the date of issue.

Sec. 109-A. Biennial revision of "Fish and Game" laws. (1931, c. 104.) As soon as practicable after the adjournment of the legislature, the revisor of statutes, with the assistance of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, shall issue a revision of all the public laws relating to inland fisheries and game. This revision shall take the place of chapter thirty-eight of the revised statutes of 1930 and all acts or parts of acts amending said chapter. It may be cited as "chapter thirty-eight of the revised statutes," and each revision shall replace the previous revision.

R. S. c. 129, sec. 37. Air Rifles. (1917, c. 302.) Whoever sells or gives away an air rifle to any child under the age of fourteen years shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty dollars. Municipal courts and trial justices shall have jurisdiction of violations in such cases.

R. S. c. 129, sec. 40. Selling firearms or dangerous weapons to children. (R. S. 1916, c. 120, sec. 34.) Whoever gives, furnishes or sells to any child (under the age of 16 years) any dangerous weapon or firearm, except in cases where the parents, guardians, teachers or instructors of children may furnish them with such weapons for hunting or target shooting outside the thickly settled portions of any town or city, or where such weapons may be used in any licensed shooting gallery, shall be deemed guilty of encouraging, causing or contributing to the delinquency or distress of such child and upon conviction shall be punished as provided in the preceding section,—(by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days.)

R. S. c. 142, sec. 13. Carrying of weapons without a license. (1917, c. 217.) No person shall in a threatening manner display any firearm, slung-shot, knuckles, bowie knife, dirk, stiletto or other dangerous or deadly weapon, nor shall wear under his clothes or concealed about his person any such firearm, slung-shot, knuckles, bowie knife, dirk, stiletto or other dangerous or deadly weapon unless first licensed so to do in the following manner.

R. S. c. 142, sec. 14. The chief of police or city marshal or in his absence, either of his captains of police of any city or the selectmen of any town, may upon written application issue to any person of good moral character, a certificate setting forth that such person has complied with the requirements of this law and that he has been duly licensed to carry such weapon or weapons. Said license shall continue in effect until revoked by the chief of police or by the selectmen of the town in which said license was issued.

R. S. c. 142, sec. 15. The provisions of section thirteen shall not be construed as prohibiting the carrying or wearing of such weapons by United States marshals, sheriffs and their deputies, constables and police officers and other officers charged with the enforcement of law.

R. S. c. 142, sec. 16. Whoever violates the provisions of this law shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars or imprisoned for not more than ninety days.

R. S. c. 23, sec. 16. Fish and game wardens may inspect records of poison sold. Whoever sells any poison mentioned

in section 16 of chapter 23 of the Revised Statutes, without the written prescription of a physician, shall keep a record of such sales, the name and quantity of the article sold, and the name and residence of the person or persons to whom it was delivered, which record shall be open to inspection by any inland fish and game warden.

R. S. c. 133, sec. 23. Penalty for assaulting an officer. (R. S. 1916, c. 121, sec. 23, as amended by 1917, c. 16.) Whoever assaults, intimidates, or in any manner wilfully obstructs, intimidates or hinders any sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, fish warden, inland fish and game warden or police officer while in the lawful discharge of his official duties, whether with or without process, shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not more than eleven months.

R. S. c. 133, sec. 25. Penalty for falsely assuming to be an officer. Whoever falsely assumes to be a justice of the peace, sheriff, deputy sheriff, health inspector or health officer, constable, inland fish and game warden, commissioner of inland fisheries and game or state highway police, and who acts as such or who requires anyone to aid him in a matter pertaining to the duties of such office, shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than eleven months, or by both said fine and imprisonment.

R. S. c. 11, sec. 35. Game wardens are fire wardens. (R. S. 1916, c. 8, sec. 34.) Fish and game wardens are hereby made state fire wardens; they shall, while in and about the woods, caution all sportsmen of the danger from fires in the woods, and extinguish all fires left burning by any one, if within their power; and shall give notice to any and all parties interested, when possible, of fires raging and beyond their control, to the end that the same may be controlled and extinguished.

R. S. c. 139, sec. 22. Trespass law. (R. S. 1916, c. 129, sec. 20.) Whoever wilfully enters on or passes over the garden, orchard, mowing land or other enclosed or cultivated land of another, between the first days of April and December, after being forbidden so to do by the owner or occupant of said land or his agent, either personally or by notice posted conspicuously on the premises, is guilty of trespass, and shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars, and section twenty-four (following) applies to violations of this section.

R. S. c. 139, sec. 21. The owner of such place, or any person employed in its cultivation, or rightfully in the possession thereof, may arrest any person found violating the preceding section, and carry him before any magistrate within the county where the arrest is made.

R. S. c. 5, sec. 166. Damages done to domestic animals by dogs or wild animals. (1931, c. 50.) Whenever any sheep, lambs or other domestic animals, *poultry not included*, owned by a resident of this state, are killed or injured by dogs or wild animals, such owner may make complaint thereof to the mayor of the city, or to one of the municipal officers of the town or plantation where such damage was done, within twenty-four hours after he has knowledge of the same. The complaint shall be investigated by the municipal officers, who shall make return of their findings to the town clerk, the commissioner of agriculture, and to the state auditor.

NOTE: Apply to municipal officers for further information.

R. S. c. 5, sec. 166-A. Damages to poultry by dogs or wild animals. (1931, c. 170.) Whenever any poultry owned by a resident of this state is killed or injured by dogs, skunks, foxes, weasels, or wildcats, such owner may make complaint thereof to the mayor of the city or to one of the municipal officers of the town or plantation where such damage was done, within twenty-four hours after he has knowledge of the same. The complaint shall be investigated by the municipal officers, who shall make return of their findings to the town clerk, the commissioner of agriculture, and to the state auditor.

NOTE: Apply to municipal officers for further information.

Resolves of 1929, c. 172. Damage to growing crops and orchards. The department of inland fisheries and game has a small annual appropriation covering damages done by deer, protected animals and birds, to growing crops and orchards. Apply to department for further information.

R. S. c. 11, sec. 38. Governor may suspend open season for hunting and fishing. (1931, c. 180, sec. 1.) Whenever, during periods of drought, it shall appear to the governor that hunting or fishing is likely to be a menace to the forests of the state, he may by proclamation suspend the open season for hunting or fishing *for such time and in such sections* of the state as he may in such proclamation designate, and prohibit smoking and building fires out of doors in the woods for the same time and sections; provided, however, that such suspension of open time shall not prohibit fishing from boats or canoes on ponds, lakes, rivers or thoroughfares.

R. S. c. 11, sec. 39. Smoking or building fires out of doors prohibited. (1931, c. 180, sec. 2.) During the time which shall by such proclamation be made a closed season, all provisions of law covering and relating to the close season shall be in force, and a person violating a provision of the same shall be subject

to the penalty therein prescribed. Whoever, during the close season fixed by proclamation of the governor, as provided in the preceding section, enters upon the wild lands carrying or having in his possession any firearms; or who catches any fish contrary to the provisions of this and the preceding section, or shoots any wild animal or bird for which there is no close season otherwise provided by law; or who smokes or builds fires out of doors in the woods, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs for each offense.

FEDERAL LAWS RELATING TO MIGRATORY BIRDS

Birds protected at all times under Federal Law. Migratory birds included in the terms of the convention between the United States and Great Britain for the protection of migratory birds, concluded August 16, 1916, are as follows:

1. **Migratory Game Birds:**

(a) Anatidae, or waterfowl, including brant, wild ducks, geese, and swans.

(b) Gruidae, or cranes, including little brown, sand-hill, and whooping cranes.

(c) Rallidae, or rails, including coot, gallinules, and sora and other rails.

(d) Limicolae, or shore birds, including avocets, curlews, dowitchers, godwits, knots, oyster catchers, phalaropes, plovers, sandpipers, snipe, stilts, surf birds, turnstones, willet, woodcock, and yellowlegs.

(e) Columbidae, or pigeons, including doves and wild pigeons.

2. **Migratory Insectivorous Birds:** Cuckoos; flickers and other woodpeckers; nighthawks or bullbats and whippoorwills; swifts; hummingbirds; flycatchers; bobolinks, meadowlarks, and orioles; grosbeaks; tanagers; martins and other swallows; waxwings; shrikes; vireos; warblers; pipits; catbirds and brown thrashers; wrens; brown creepers; nuthatches; chickadees and titmice; kinglets and gnat catchers; robins and other thrushes; and all other perching birds which feed entirely or chiefly on insects.

3. **Other Migratory Nongame Birds:** Auks, auklets, bitterns, fulmars, gannets, grebes, guillemots, gulls, herons, jaegers, loons, murres, petrels, puffins, shearwaters, and terns.

SEASONS ON MIGRATORY BIRDS

Waterfowl (except rails and gallinules, for which see below, and except snow geese, Ross geese, cackling geese, wood duck, eider ducks, and swans), **coot, and Wilson snipe or jacksnipe**, October 1 to December 31, inclusive.

Rails and gallinules (except coot), September 1 to November 30, inclusive.

Woodcock, October 1 to October 31, inclusive.

DAILY BAG LIMITS ON MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS

A person may take in any one day during the open seasons prescribed therefor not to exceed the following numbers of migratory game birds, which numbers shall include all birds taken by any other person who for hire accompanies or assists him in taking migratory birds; and in the case of ducks, geese, and brant when so taken these may be possessed in the numbers specified as follows:

Ducks (except wood duck and eider ducks), 15 in the aggregate of all kinds, and any person at any one time may possess not more than 30 ducks in the aggregate of all kinds.

Geese, (except snow geese, Ross geese, and cackling geese) **and brant**, 4 in the aggregate of all kinds, and any person at any one time may possess not more than 8 geese and brant in the aggregate of all kinds.

Rails and gallinules (except sora and coot), 25 in the aggregate of all kinds, but not more than 15 of any one species.

Sora, 25.

Coot, 25.

Wilson snipe or jacksnipe, 20.

Woodcock, 4.

No other migratory birds may be taken at any time except under permit for propagating, scientific, or banding purposes, or under an order of the Secretary of Agriculture to prevent injury to agricultural or other interests.

Time of Day and Methods. Migratory game birds may be taken each day from half an hour before sunrise to sunset during the open seasons prescribed therefor, *except that the hour for the commencement of hunting on the opening day of the season shall be 12 o'clock noon*, with a gun only, not larger than No. 10 gauge, fired from the shoulder, with the aid of a dog, the use of decoys, and from a blind or floating device, except that *in the hunting of wild geese not more than ten (10) live goose decoys may be used or shot over at any one gunning stand, blind, or floating device*; but nothing herein shall be deemed to permit the use of an automobile, airplane, power boat, sailboat, any boat under sail, any floating device towed by power boat or sailboat.

Federal Transportation Law. All packages in interstate commerce containing game animals or non-migratory game birds, or parts thereof, must be marked to show the names and addresses of the consignor and consignee and the nature of the contents,

and packages containing migratory birds must be marked with such addresses and the number and kind of such birds therein.

Sale. The Federal law prohibits the sale of all migratory birds throughout the United States except birds taken for scientific or propagating purposes and waterfowl raised on farms or preserves under permit from the Secretary of Agriculture. Feathers of wild ducks and wild geese lawfully killed, and of such birds seized and condemned by Federal or State authorities, may be purchased and sold for use in the manufacture of fishing flies, pillows, and mattresses, but not for millinery or ornamental purposes.

Permits for Propagation and other Purposes. Under appropriate permit from the Secretary of Agriculture, and when allowed by State law, migratory waterfowl may be captured at any time for propagating purposes, and waterfowl bred in captivity may be killed and the carcasses sold and used for food purposes. Waterfowl captured and bred in captivity may also be sold alive for breeding and exhibition purposes to the holders of permits. Under appropriate permit all species of migratory birds, except whooping cranes, trumpeter swans, and Eskimo curlew, may be taken for scientific purposes, and all species may be taken for banding. The Secretary of Agriculture may also issue orders permitting the killing of migratory birds to prevent serious injury to agriculture or other interests.

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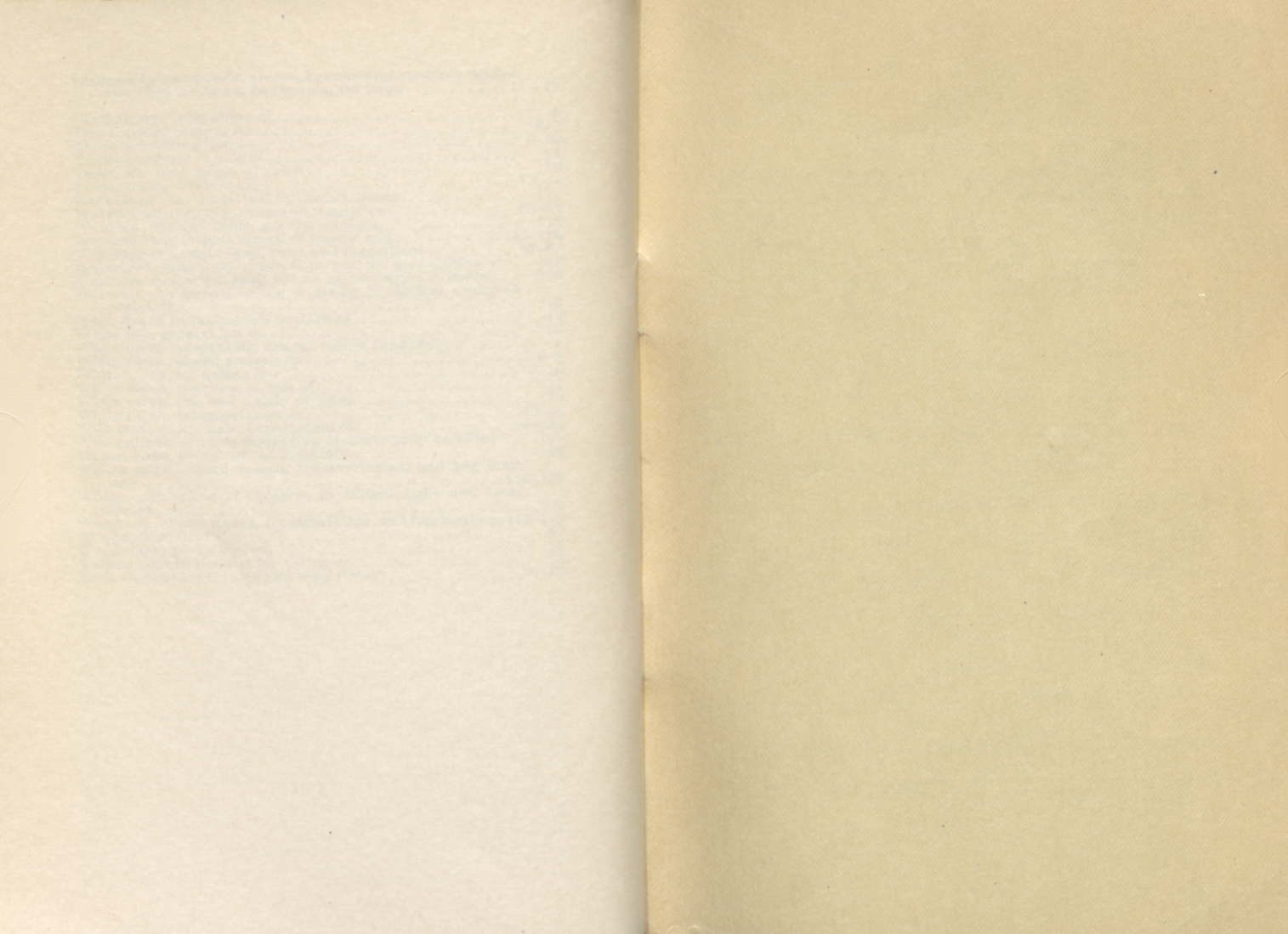
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LOOK before you SHOOT!
