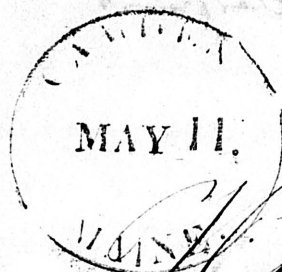

Camden May 10<sup>th</sup> 1836

Dear Sir

I understand that our Legislators have  
past a Resol<sup>n</sup> that every noncommissioned  
officer & private soldier of the Revolution-  
ary War who enlisted for during the war or  
for the term of three years and did actually serve  
three years and was an inhabitant of old Massach-  
-setts <sup>or</sup> proper should be entitled to two Hundred Acres  
of Land & on the 14<sup>th</sup> Day of February 1775  
volunteered as a minute man and on the 19<sup>th</sup> of the  
following <sup>Month</sup> chased the enemies of our beloved Coun-  
try from Lexington to Concord & from there back  
to Boston then went into Camp and was  
stationed at Cambridge & served untill 19<sup>th</sup> of  
December same year <sup>under Colonel James Montgomery</sup> when I was honorably  
discharged without loss of time I enlisted again  
for six Months and was stationed on Prospect Hill  
in the winter of 1776 & in the spring went on  
to Castle William now called Fort Independence  
fortifying that Place untill the last of June  
under the Direction & Superintendence of the  
late Governor Hancock  
July first same year I enlisted again under Elip-  
hett Baturall <sup>Capt</sup> for five Months and marched to tie-  
outanoga was in Col. Titcomb's Regiment of  
Newbury Port served till

first of December 1777 I enlisted again on 1<sup>st</sup> of  
December under Capt. Nathaniel Marsh of New-  
-bury for the term of four Months and marched  
to Danbury in Connecticut from there to White Plains  
near New York from there to Bound Brook in the  
State of New Jersey and was stationed there till the  
first Day of April and then I was discharged and  
home some time in April  
August <sup>1778</sup> I enlisted again under Capt. Page of the 1<sup>st</sup> New Jersey  
Regiment marched to Saratoga was in the last  
battle at the Capture of John Burgoyne & guarded  
the Prisoners down to Bunker Hill went into  
Boston was stationed there till first of April 1778  
when I was discharged. June about the 10<sup>th</sup> I enlisted  
for three Months under Capt. James McLoon of  
Telegraph Regiment marched to Rhode Island  
was at General Sullivan's Retreat returned home  
then made of September same year 25<sup>th</sup> of September  
under Capt. John Barry of the 1<sup>st</sup> New Jersey  
Regiment marched to Boston was stationed there  
till first of January 1779 I enlisted again the  
first of September 1779 for three Months ~~and~~ under  
Capt. McLoon and marched to serve on Fort Independence  
served about 12 Days was taken sick and sent home  
I served those 3 years and upward without hire or  
bounty or Clothing and I was a day without wages as the  
Paper Money was good for nothing. Now if you should  
think that I have embraced in the above I resolve  
please to drop me a line
