I Dominicus Kurnuey of Lubec in the County  
of Washington & State of Massachusetts do testify  
& declare; that on or about the twenty first day  
of February in the year of our Lord one thousand  
seven hundred & eighty one, I enlisted into  
the service of the United States as a Private  
soldier at Wittery in said State, for the term  
of three years (under Joseph Ferrish the head  
of the class) & was mustered on or about the  
twelfth day of March following, I was mustered  
by Joseph Bragdon the muster Master. From  
thence I went to Boston & reported myself to  
Col John Crane commanding a Regiment of Artillery  
in the Massachusetts Line of the Army of the  
United States on the Continental Establishment,  
where I staid under his orders until the third  
of July following, & then marched for the  
North River with a detachment of his Regiment.  
Sometime in the month of September in the  
same year one thousand seven hundred and  
eighty one I was attached to Captain William  
Freadwells Company in said Colonel John  
Crane's Regiment of Artillery then lying at  
Planks or Verplanks point so called in which  
Company I continued to serve as a Private, until  
the twenty third day of December in the year  
one thousand seven hundred & eighty three,  
when I was honorably discharged, at West  
Point. my discharge, which was signed by  
Charles Knowles, Captain & Pay Master, has been  
lost or mislaid by time or accident. I further  
testify & declare that from my reduced cir-  
cumstances in life I am in need of assistance

of my father Col John Crane, who commanded

time I knew Dominicus Rumney, who was a private  
in Captain Treadwells Company of Artillery in my  
fathers Colonel John Cranes Regiment. The said  
Dominicus Rumney now lives in Lubec in said  
County & State, where he has lived many years,  
& is the same person who was a Private in my  
fathers Regiment of Artillery, as above stated, &  
served as a private during all the time I knew  
him, when in the Army, which was about two years.
