D. 1826 That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, *William Storer* did enlist in the army of the Revolution for the term of three years and served his time out and got his discharge

I do further on oath, declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, *William Storer*, was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of *the District of Maine*

and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in *Maine* aforesaid, where he had resided for *twenty* years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of Land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.

I William Storer of Wrentham in the County of Oxford Commonwealth of Massachusetts, a Citizen and Resident of the United States, testify and depose that I served in the war of the revolution against the common enemy as a private soldier on the Continental establishment about three years and eight months. I enlisted for eight months viz April or May A.D. 1780 into Capt Clarke's Company, Col Primes Regt. Genl. Madsen's Brigade, Massachusetts Line. I served out the time, and in the fifteenth February A.D. 1781 I again enlisted and was sent up to Fort Mifflin, and from thence to West Point and put into Capt Bates's Company, Col. Brooks's Regt & Genl. Elmer's Brigade in Mass Line, and served till the last day of Dec. A.D. 1783, when at West Point I was discharged by Genl. Mifflin. I have lost my discharge & know not where it is. I further state that from my reduced circumstances in life I am in need of assistance from my Country for support. Wm. Storer

I Obadiah True of Denmark, County of Oxford, do testify & say, that I am personally acquainted with William Storer the signer of the within affidavit, and know that he served as he has therein stated from July 1781 to May 1782 and I entertain no doubt but he served out the whole time as he has stated in said affidavit, and that he is in need of assistance from his Country for support.
