I George Webster of Richmond in the County of Lancaster and State of Maine, aged seventy four years, do, upon oath declare, in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 17, 1835, entitled a "Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers," that I enlisted in the year 1777 into Capt. Wheelwright's company of Col. Tappan's regiment of the Mass. line in the army of the Revolution for the period of three years & was discharged at New Windsor, New York, in the year 1780 having served the full period of three years & was honorable discharge as a private, for which service I am now on the pension roll of the United States of the Maine agency

I do further on oath declare that at the time of my said enlistment, I was an inhabitant of Kennebunk, then the District of Maine

and was on the 17th day of March, 1835, have been ever since, and am now an inhabitant of the State of Maine, residing in Richmond aforesaid, where I have resided for twenty years past. That neither I, nor any one claiming under me, has ever received a grant of Land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for my said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am justly entitled to the benefit of said Resolve.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts - I George Webb a citizen of the United States, aged fifty eight years, born in Saco, Maine, but now of Bowdoinham Maine, upon oath testify and declare that in November 1777 I enlisted as a private soldier, but served afterwards as a Sergeant, in the war of the revolution against the Common enemy, for the period of three years, upon the Continental establishment in Capt Wheelwright's Company, once Col Stapp's Regt. of the Massachusetts Line. This period I fully served out and then enlisted as a Substitute for John Kilbuck for during the war into the same Company and Regiment. I served until June 1783 and then took my final discharge from the Army at New Milford Conn above Westbury signed by Genl George Washington. My discharge I kept many years, but it is now lost, and not to my knowledge in existence. I was in the Battle of Monmouth and at Kings Bridge. From my reduced circumstances, I am in need of assistance of my Country for support. And I do hereby relinquish all my claims to any pension heretofore allowed me by the laws of the United States, if any, but I am not to my knowledge borne on any pension list whatever. I request that I may be placed upon the pension list for the district of Maine.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts. To the Honorable the Secretary of the Department of War of the United States. I the subscriber, being Chief Justice of the Circuit Court of Common Pleas, for the second Eastern Circuit of Massachusetts, embracing the counties of Andover, Haverhill and Vermont, do hereby certify to your Honor that George Webb, a citizen of the United States, resident in Bowdoinham in the said County of Lincoln, in the District of Maine, on the tenth day of April, A.D. 1818, made application to me to receive his declaration under oath, and produce the evidence as was in his power to produce; and to transmit the same, and the proceedings he do there to your Honor, that he might be placed on the pension list of the United States agreeably to the provisions of an Act, entitled an "Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war, passed March 18. Feb. 1818, which declaration and the other evidence produced by said applicant is herewith

unopposed. And I do further Certify to your Honor, that after a full
examination of the said applicant, and a careful consideration
of the evidence in the case, it appears to me that the said ap-
plicant did serve as a Non-Commissioned Officer in the town of
the Revolution until the end thereof, against the Common enemy upon
the Continental establishment, and for more than nine months, as
stated in his declaration aforesaid, and that from his reduced cir-
cumstances, he needs the assistance of his Country for support.

affixed, this twenty second day of May in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five.

I George Webber of Richmond in the County of Genesee being
the same person who made application in the month of April
last to the Land Agent of claims for land to which I am
entitled under the Resolve of Legislature of date of March
17. 1835 do hereby under oath make the following application
to my said declaration, that I enlisted in the year 1777 for
three years in Troopers Regt as stated in said application that
I served in said Regiment for the space of nearly two years
& then was called into the boat service and was attached
to Washingtons Barge for the remainder of the time being
about one year. that I remained in sd boat service until
my enlistment of three years was fully ended, having served
the full term of my enlistment. after my said enlistment expired
One John Kilbom who was a Sergeant in said Regt. & who had
enlisted for during war, came to me & requested me to answer
to his name as he wished to be absent a short time and could
not get a furlough & I consented & did duty for said
Kilbom (who did not return as he agreed) until the expiration
of the war & was discharged I think in the month of June
1783. having served during the Revolutionary war for more
than five years & six months. I took sd Kilbom plain &
perfectly recollect in the fall of 1780
