I Lemuel Montworth of <sup>Holbe in the County of</sup> ~~Waldoboro~~ ~~in the County of~~  
~~Waldoboro~~ and State of Maine do, upon oath, declare  
in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve passed  
by the Legislature of the State of Maine March  
17th 1835 entitled a "Resolve in favor of certain  
Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary war  
and the Widows of the deceased Officers and  
Soldiers, that I enlisted into Captain Jacob Hinds  
Company and Colonel ~~Driggs~~ regiment of  
Foot

on or about the first day of April 1775 and served about 20 months I then  
was discharged my term being up. I then enlisted in Col. Bussells Regt in the year 1777 during  
the war, I was drawn out of the army as a mechanic to work Iron for the use of the army  
during the war I was in the service about 6 months I do not receive  
from the State of Maine

And that I have received a pension as a revolu-  
tionary Soldier from the United States -

On this twenty first day of April A.D. 1878 before me the subscriber a Judge of the C.C.C.P. in the 2<sup>d</sup> Eastern Circuit in the State of Massachusetts & District of Maine, Sennel Wentworth of Hope in the County aforesaid personally appears & being solemnly sworn Declares - That he is now sixty four years old - that he is now and ever has been a resident Citizen of the United States - That he enlisted as a soldier of the Revolution in the month of May 1775 in the town of Chesterfield, State of New Hampshire in the Company commanded by Captain Jacob Huns in Col Reeds Regiment & General Pattersons Brigade, that he completed the right months service and then immediately enlisted again & served as before all the year 1776, and at the close of that year viz in the Month of December 1776 was honorably discharged at Newtown in the State of Pennsylvania

He further on oath declares that in the Month of January or February A.D. 1780 he again enlisted in the Service of the United States in the Town of Stoughton & State of Massachusetts and in pursuance of said enlistment, actually and faithfully served in the Army of the Revolution against the common enemy, & in the Massachusetts Line in Col Tappers Regiment & General Pattersons Brigade till the last of December A.D. 1780 making his last term of service more than nine months - and was honorably discharged at West Point in the State of New York by Brig General Patterson, but has lost his discharge, That he is in reduced circumstances & by reason thereof

thereof is in need of assistance from his Country for support- and therefore humbly asks to be placed on the Pension Roll as a private by virtue of the act of Congress of the United States entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary war". He further declares, that he was in the Battle at Bunkerhill.
