I Louis Winn of Kennebec in the County of York and State of Maine, aged eighty one years, do on oath declare in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine passed March 20 1838 intitled a "Resolve in favour of certain commissioned officers and others of the Revolutionary War, and the widows of such persons, that I am the widow of Samuel Winn late of Wells in said County, who died at Wells on the twenty eighth day of January 1818. That I have reason to believe and do fully believe that my said late husband did enter the army in the Revolutionary war as a Lieutenant in the spring of the year 1775 - and was during eight months in the Regiment of Col. Scamman - and afterwards, from the expiration of said eight months - he was in the Regiment of Colonel Sherburne until May 1779 - when he was honourably discharged, having been between four and five years in the service - I do further testify that the discharge herewith annexed is an original paper in the possession of my husband at his death

I do further declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe that my said late husband Samuel Winn was at the time of his said enlistment an inhabitant of said Wells, and that I do know that at the time of his decease as aforesaid he was an inhabitant of the State of Maine residing in Wells aforesaid, where he had resided from his birth That I have reason to believe and do fully believe that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, nor have I received since his decease, a grant

of land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth
of Massachusetts for his said service or any other service
during the Revolutionary war, and that I am therefore
justly entitled to the full benefit of said resolve.
